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Sheriff's Message

As we finish up yet another year, we are pleased to share with you our Annual Report for 2018. This report will highlight the amazing work and accomplishments for each of our divisions.

As Sheriff of Cache County, I am grateful for the community we live in and the citizens we serve. Our office has 128 full-time dedicated deputy sheriffs serving in corrections, patrol, investigations, School Resource, civil, courts, animal control and many other areas in our office. We also have 17 full-time dedicated civilian employees who support the operation of our office on a daily basis.

In the past few years, Cache County has seen some incredible growth. This growth brings new challenges we face every day. For example, an increase in the amount of traffic on the roads. New traffic lights seem to appear overnight, a trip "into Logan" can be an all-day adventure and the farmland we talk about, played in or fished are now replaced with homes, condos, businesses and town houses.

Our office and staff have done an amazing job adapting to all the demands placed on our office. Our current jail houses up to 370 inmates. Our daily average has been right around 300. The Cache County Jail is unique in that we contract with many other agencies for housing their inmates. We have contracts with Franklin County in Idaho, the US Marshals, Immigration (ICE), Salt Lake County and the Utah Department of Corrections.

Our Criminal Division has seen an increase in serious crimes such as robbery, sexual assaults, drug offenses and large scale property crimes. Due to the increase in these crimes, we added two additional investigators to our office to better serve our citizens.

With the addition of two new high schools in the past few years, we now have eight full time deputies assigned to the schools, and a full time deputy in each of the high schools.

With all the changes happening in our valley, I want to thank our staff for recognizing the issues and facing them head on.

We have a great group of elected officials on our County Council who have enabled us to grow as an agency and address these growing demands. We also have strong relationships with the elected officials in all of the communities we serve who truly have the best interest of their citizen's at heart.

Most of all, we live in the greatest county in the state. Our citizens and the support they have for our office is like nowhere else that I've seen. We cannot be successful in Law Enforcement without the positive relationships we have with our community.

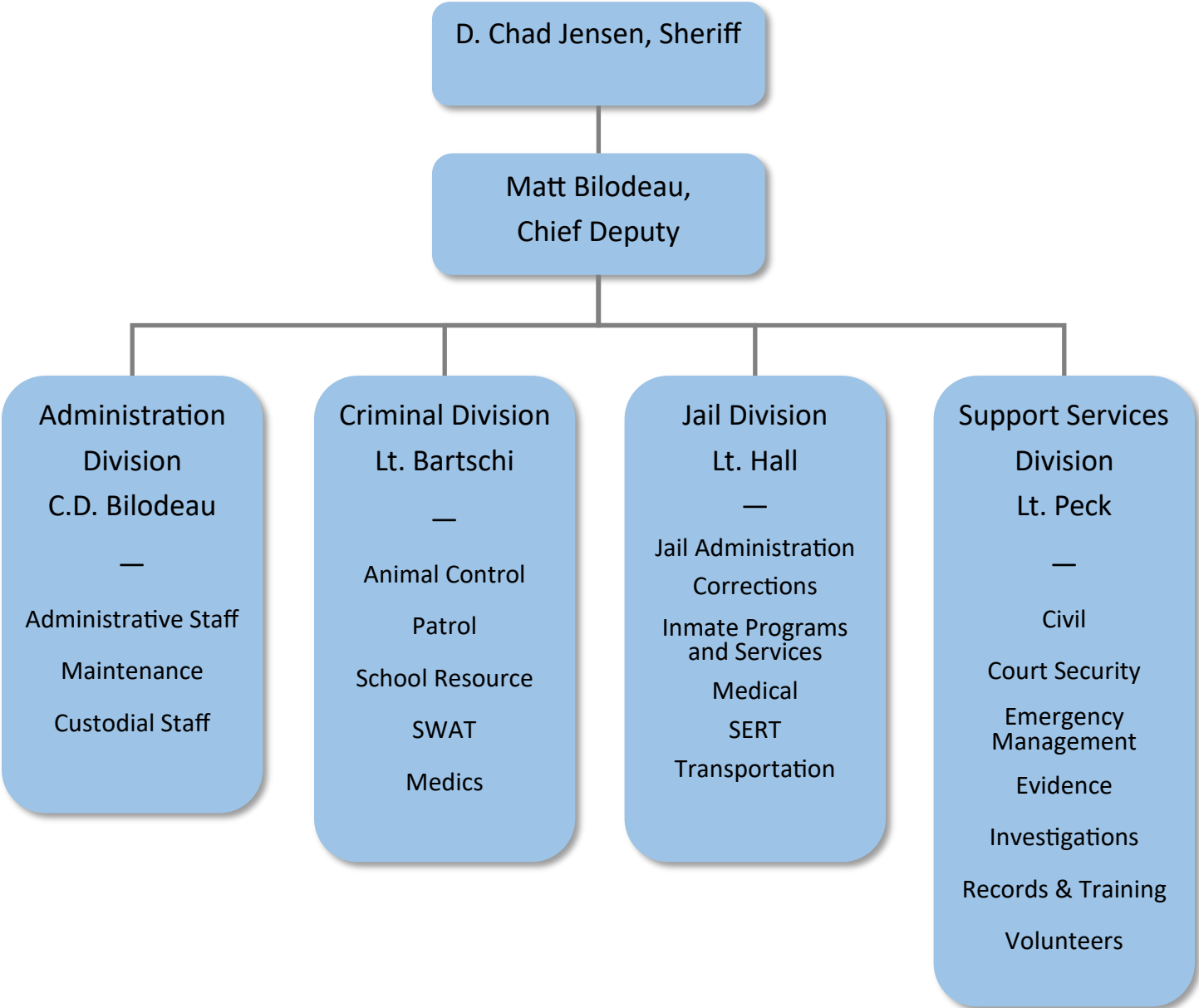

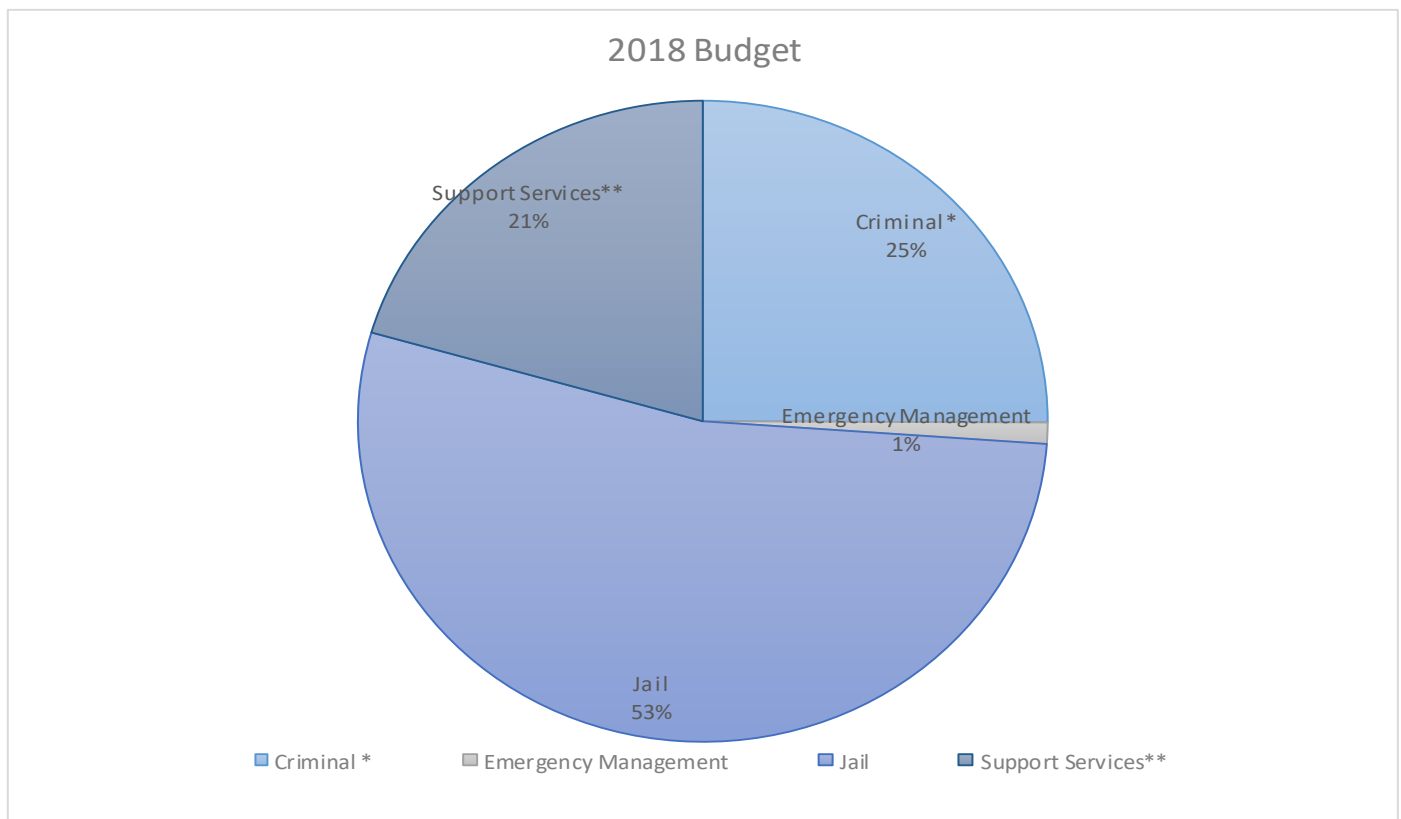

2018 BUDGET

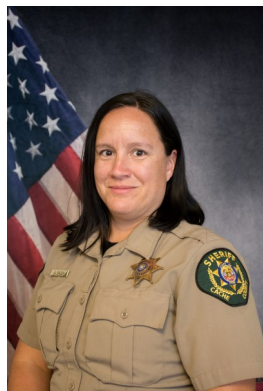


Troy Liquin, Deputies Association President's Award

When Troy Liquin was a new Detective assigned to focus on Domestic Violence crimes, he displayed empathy and a strong will to make a change. During this time Troy created lasting relationships with outside agencies and personnel serving the victims of Domestic Violence. He took on issues of improving Domestic Violence investigations, trainings, and documentation in our office. Troy focused his effort to provide better services to the victims of Domestic Violence.

Troy has been a part of the local Domestic Violence Committee working with different entities to provide services to victims of Domestic Violence. In no small feat, Troy testified twice, in 2016 and 2017 to the State Legislative appropriations committee, helping to secure funding for the Lethality Assessment Protocol.

Troy's dedication to bridging the gap between victims and obtaining those resource available locally, has been immeasurable to the Office, the community, and most importantly the victims.



Daniel Hulse, Annette Baugh, Helene Salanoa and Colton Peterson, Lifesaving Award—Jail Division

On November 14th an inmate called into the Pod Control room. Deputy Salanoa recognized that there was something wrong with the inmate and contacted Deputy Annette Baugh who was working pod floors at the time. Deputy Baugh responded to the cell the inmate was in and found him struggling to support himself with a sheet tied around his neck. It was later found that he had changed his mind while trying to commit suicide and had been able to push the button in his cell.

Deputy Baugh requested additional help and Deputies Hulse, Johnson, and Peterson responded to assist. They entered the cell and were able to work together as a team to support his weight while getting the sheet untied. This inmate's life was saved due to the quick response of these deputies.

Jaime Garcia, Outstanding Achievement Award—Jail Division

In December 2016, the Cache County Jail began accepting detainees from Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE). Many of these detainees struggle with the English language, and a large number of the detainees speak Spanish.

Deputy Garcia has borne the brunt of dealing with a wide variety of issues caused by the large influx of Spanish-speaking detainees. He has been placed in booking countless times and has become an expert in the booking process. His hard work ethic and command of the Spanish language has enabled him to process hundreds of detainees over the last year.

Along with booking Spanish-speaking individuals, Deputy Garcia also works hard to keep up with inspecting postcards written in Spanish and English. Many times, he has continued to work on these necessary assignments instead of taking a much-needed break. His work ethic is an example to all staff, as is his positive personality. Those that work with Jaime have commented on how easy he is to get along with and how hard he works. It is high praise when fellow deputies ask to work with another deputy because of these valuable traits.



KellyAnne Leavitt, Outstanding Achievement Award—Jail Division

KellyAnne has been an integral part of keeping the Cache County Jail in compliance with the Utah Jail Standards. In 2010, the Utah Sheriff's Association collaborated with Gary DeLand and Associates to provide jails with a set of standards that, if followed, would assist in reducing liability. These standards have increased yearly and now include over 550 standards in 14 different sections. Proofs must be provided showing compliance in action, not just word, with the standards and policies.

The Department of Corrections has also adopted over 250 of these standards, and agencies housing state inmates must prove compliance. KellyAnne is instrumental in maintaining the documentation needed to show compliance with all of these standards. She has worked with deputies to help them find and input proofs into the AARMS system, allowing the Cache County Jail to maintain compliance with these standards.

In addition to this large project, KellyAnne is also a resource to deputies for a wide variety of issues. Her duties include: providing access and training to the Securus Call Platform, being a valuable resource with the inmate accounting software, ordering inmate supplies, providing technical support for office machinery, ordering staff supplies, and many more. There have been countless times when deputies have told others with questions to contact KellyAnne. She has always provided valuable assistance, even when her many job duties pull her in different directions.



Denny Bird has shown great dedication to serving the residents of Cache County. He gives every case his fullest effort, making sure justice is served to the victims of the most heinous crimes Cache Valley sees.

Detective Bird has worked hard to support other detectives, and has also shown a commitment to the development of other deputies through training and example. When called on, Denny makes himself available day or night to assist when he is needed.

In addition to his duties as an investigator, Denny has maintained his passion as a crisis negotiator, recently obtaining his national certification for Phase III Crisis Negotiation.



On October 18, 2017, Deputy Johnson was working in the Hyrum area when an emergency medical situation in Providence was called out over the radio: a male in his early 20s was unresponsive and not breathing.

Deputy Johnson immediately responded to Providence. He learned the patient's condition was possibly caused by a drug overdose, likely from methamphetamine or heroin. Deputy Johnson was the first to arrive on scene and was met by a distraught father. The patient's girlfriend was attempting CPR, but the patient was still not breathing on his own. Deputy Johnson took over and continued CPR. After a few minutes, the patient began to breathe on his own. When the paramedics arrived, they administered Narcan, a

lifesaving medicine that can reverse the effects of an opioid overdose. The patient was later transported to the hospital for further treatment.

Prior to leaving the scene, one of the paramedics commented to the patient and his family that had it not been for the efforts of Deputy Johnson, the outcome of the patient's health and safety may have been very different.

A couple weeks later, this same patient overdosed again, and again medical personnel were able to save his life. Deputy Johnson decided to file criminal charges in an effort to get the patient the help he needed to overcome his addictions.

Casey Sutherland, S.T.A.R. Deputy of the Year Award

The S.T.A.R. Deputy of the Year Award is presented to a deputy sheriff who during the year has rendered valuable and commendable service to a community through the S.T.A.R. Deputy Program. S.T.A.R. stands for Sheriff's Town and Area Representative.

Deputy Sutherland has done a great job serving the residents of Mendon. In a letter to the Sheriff's Office, Mendon City Mayor Ed Buist said this:

"Deputy Sutherland has been a wonderful Sheriff's Office liaison to Mendon City the last several years. I have had the opportunity to work closely with him for most of my tenure as mayor. He rarely misses a city council meeting. During those meetings, he

shares information that is valuable to the council. He is willing and prepared to take concerns from the council and citizens, and then follows up and does what he can to solve issues or problems. He is a man of his word. If he says he will follow up on something, he does.

We have trusted each other with personal cell numbers and often confer to solve issues. He may not always answer immediately, but he quickly gets back with me and is willing to help in any way possible. Whether by phone or email or text, he is always willing to check in with me to see how he can help.

One of my favorite things about Deputy Sutherland is that he has become vested in our town. Every year at our Pioneer Day celebration, he is part of our parade. Then he sets up a booth to interact with our citizens, which is very informative, interactive, and fun. The kids in town look forward to his booth every year.



Bryce Chesnut, Lifesaving Award—Patrol Division

On December 20, 2017, Deputy Chesnut responded to a medical call with a female patient who was not breathing and had no pulse. He arrived at the same time as medical personnel and began administering CPR to the patient. When the medical staff relieved him, Deputy Chesnut provided emotional support to the patient's husband at the scene.

Your actions undoubtedly aided in the patient receiving the medical care she needed at the hospital to recover and return home to her family. You demonstrated professionalism and empathy, and exemplified the high standards the Sheriff's Office and our profession require. I have no doubt that, given these circumstances again, you would choose to per-

form at this high level again.

In this particular case, your actions helped save the life of a friend and former employee of the Sheriff's Office, for which we are all grateful.

Brooks Nielsen and Tyson Nielsen, Lifesaving Award—Patrol Division

On March 30, 2018, Deputies Tyson Nielsen and Brooks Nielsen responded to a report of a male individual covered in blood and knocking on the complainant's window. Both Tyson and Brooks arrived on scene less than two minutes after receiving the call. Tyson was first on scene, and quickly discovered the victim had a gunshot wound to his left leg, and possibly a second gunshot wound to his right leg. Tyson could see the victim was in dire need of medical attention as he was no longer responsive to verbal

stimuli. Tyson grabbed a pair of sheers and a tourniquet from his vehicle as Brooks arrived. Tyson quickly updated Brooks on the situation. Brooks immediately applied the tourniquet to the left leg, and was preparing a second tourniquet for the right leg when medical personnel arrived and took over the care of the victim.

Tyson's quick observation of the gunshot wound and accurate assessment of the victim's health permitted life-saving measures to be taken immediately. Brooks' timely and appropriate application of the tourniquet possibly saved the victim's life.



Chad Kerr, Purple Heart Award & Outstanding Achievement Award—Patrol Division

Purple Heart Award—On November 3, 2017, then Deputy Chad Kerr responded to Sky View High School to assist with a Life Skills student who had become unruly and assaulted some of the staff. The student had been temporarily detained by school staff, but escaped their custody and fled campus toward a neighborhood.

The student was later located and detained by officers from Smithfield Police Department. While in custody, the student began acting strangely, sobbing and hyperventilating. Smithfield PD discovered that a teacher's aide had been assaulted, suffering injuries to her face from a head butt by the student.

When Deputy Kerr arrived, he explained to the student that he wouldn't be taken to Detention if the student calmed down. The student's behavior escalated to an out of control state, and he had to be restrained. As Deputy Kerr attempted to handcuff the student, the student threw his backward, striking Deputy Kerr in the face with the back of his head with great force. Deputy Kerr was stunned by the blow, but with help from the Smithfield officers, was able to restrain the student.

Deputy Kerr suffered a concussion, a cracked cheekbone, and a chipped tooth. In addition to the injuries sustained in the incident, Deputy Kerr suffered continued headaches for an extended period of time after the incident.

There is no pleasure in giving an award for injuries sustained on the job, but I thank you for your dedication to the Sheriff's Office and the law enforcement profession, and award the Purple Heart to Sgt. Chad Kerr.

Outstanding Achievement Award—Patrol Division—Deputy Kerr has been assigned to the School Resource unit since 2011. In the seven years he worked in this position, Deputy Kerr worked with the Explorers and Peer Court. He was also assigned to multiple high schools. When the administrators of Sky View High School were moved to the new Green Canyon High School, they specifically asked that Deputy Kerr be allowed to remain in his position at the new school due to his demonstrated professionalism and dedicated service to the schools. The trust he developed with the students and administrators is evident in the way they talk and interact with him.

Shane Jones, assistant principal at Green Canyon High School, said, "Chad brought two components to the job every day that made him so valuable at the high school level. First, he was the epitome of a team player...and went beyond expectations to support the administration...The second component was his ability to reach and work with high school students. As our Principal, Dave Swenson, likes to always say, 'We are in the kid business.' Chad understood this and was able to keep our schools safe and establish relationships with students. He held students accountable for behaviors at the same time as taking every opportunity to help students learn from their mistakes. It was very satisfying and reassuring to see some of our more challenging students have such a great relationship with our resource officer...He is very deserving of this recognition and we would love to have him back at any time in the future."



Travis Ricks, Outstanding Achievement Award—Patrol Division

In the last year, Deputy Ricks has grown and developed into the expected type of leader necessary to perform in the K9 deputy position. He had a steep learning curve, having to prove his ability to perform well in a very short time.

The K9 unit faced adversity this last year, and Deputy Ricks did not wither from the daunting challenges that faced him. He accepted the unsolicited position as the K9 team lead. He chose to grow and excel in this position, seeking feedback and putting himself in new situations so he could learn from those experiences. His desire to increase his job knowledge is evident, and his professionalism has been proven.

The K9 position is given a great deal of leeway to best meet the needs of law enforcement in the valley. Deputy Ricks is always accessible and strives to be the most reliable K9 operator available. His demonstrated professionalism, responsibility, and trustworthiness are in keeping with the highest standards of our profession and office.

Virgil Hutton, Deputy of the Year Award

The Deputy of the Year Award is presented to one deputy or other staff member for exceptional or distinguished service during the year.

Deputy Hutton came to the Cache County Sheriff's Office from Florida. As a transplant to the valley, he has successfully embodied the mission we strive to accomplish of working cooperatively with the citizens we serve.

During the time Deputy Hutton has been assigned to Patrol, he has worked to develop into an exceptional resource and asset to the Sheriff's Office. He has received continued high praise from the community of Hyrum. The mayor and city manager often comment on Hutton's drive, determination, and willingness to serve. In the last year, he worked with Hyrum to purchase a camera system to aid in crime reduction.

Deputy Hutton looks for ways to help accomplish the Sheriff's Office mission. He improved his criminal interdiction skill set to the point he was able to make multiple DUI arrests while working day shift. He continues to focus on community protection by helping the courts apprehend defendants who failed to appear in court. He is part of the Fugitive Apprehension Team, a cooperative effort between the Sheriff's Office and AP&P.

Deputy Hutton has demonstrated one of the key characteristics of leadership; that is to learn and improve. He has successfully implemented the concepts he has learned to serve the residents of Cache Valley.

Deputy Hutton is a prime example of what every law enforcement officer should strive to be. He is community oriented, patient, listens and works with everyone in the community he serves. He focuses on solving problems, and is a conduit for communication between citizens and city officials. His enthusiasm for our profession is evident and we are proud to have Deputy Hutton as part of our Sheriff's Office family.

Robert Hanselman, Citizen's Award of Valor

The Citizen's Award of Valor is presented to a private citizen in recognition of his valor in assisting a Cache County Sheriff's Office deputy in the performance of his duties.

On April 17, 2018, deputies from the Cache County Sheriff's Office were investigating a protective order violation involving a resident of River Heights. The suspect also had an active warrant for his arrest.

The deputies were interviewing the suspect when he fled into a nearby residential area on foot. The deputies gave chase, and Bob Hanselman, a local citizen, saw the pursuit as he was driving by.

Bob immediately slammed on his brakes, threw his truck into reverse, and cut the suspect off from running further north. Bob then chased the suspect into an undeveloped subdivision where he cornered the suspect in between his vehicle and a gravel pit. Bob jumped out of his truck and held onto the suspect until deputies caught up with him.

Bob's quick thinking and action resulted in a timely arrest by the deputies.

In Loving Memory

Lt. Brian Locke



Lieutenant Brian Locke was hired with the Cache County Sheriff's Office in September of 1986. He started his career as a jail deputy, and in his 32-year career served in every division in the Cache County Sheriff's Office. Brian promoted to Sergeant in 1997 and then in 2004 to Lieutenant.

For many years, Brian was a very active board member with the Utah Peace Officers Association. He served as Legislative Chair of the Utah Law Enforcement Legislative Committee and passionately followed and tracked every bill and piece of legislation impacting law enforcement. He was active in the Ride for the Fallen and attended this event many times honorably representing the Sheriff's Office.

For almost 20 years, Brian worked for the State of Utah as a Regional Medical Examiner. His years of law enforcement experience and his compassionate ability to communicate brought a calming presence to those he worked with and the families affected by tragic events.

On October 6, 2018, Brian was involved in UTV accident in Paradise Dry Canyon. The UTV he was driving rolled approximately 50 yards, pinning him under the machine for an extended period of time. Search and Rescue crews assisted medical personnel in removing the machine and Brian was transported to Logan Regional Hospital. Despite every effort to save his life, Brian succumbed to his injuries.

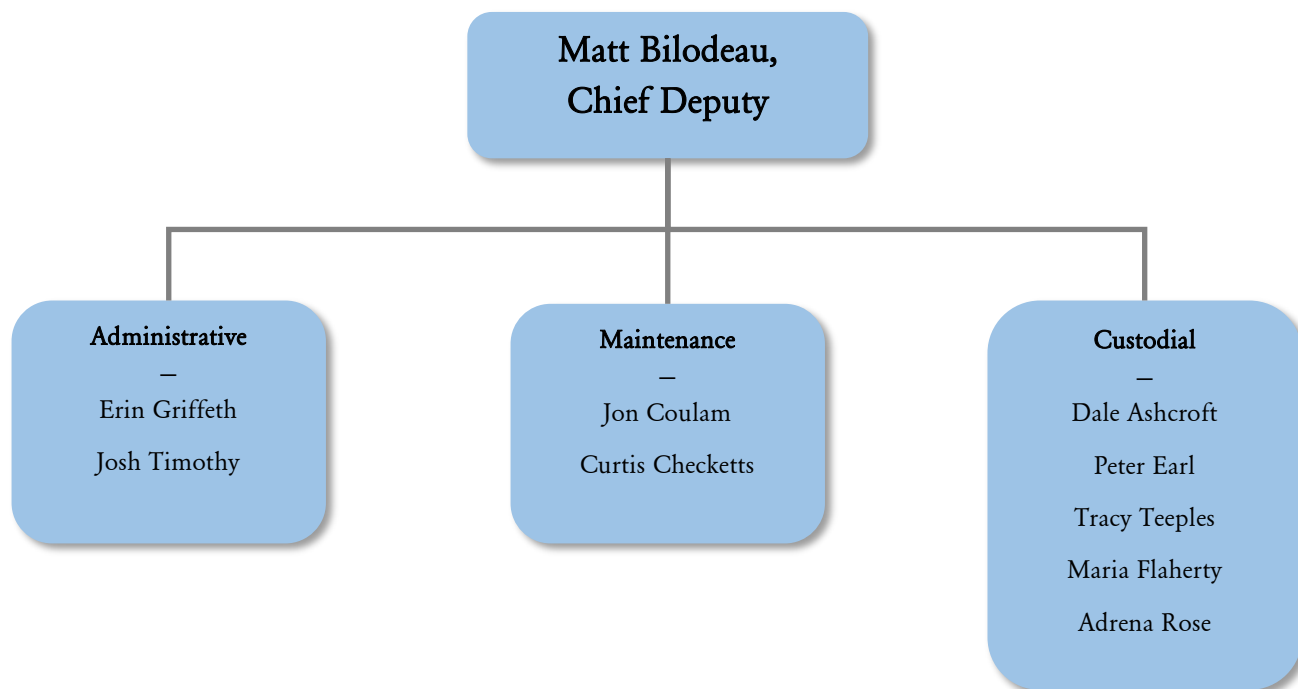

The **Community Liaison** is responsible for the Sheriff’s Office interaction with the public. They facilitate booths at public events, social media, represent the office at coalition meetings and help to encourage seat belt safety.

Maintenance

The Sheriff’s Office maintenance staff are responsible in keeping the Sheriff’s Office property, equipment and buildings in good condition through preventive maintenance and ongoing repairs.

Custodial

Animal Control

The Cache County Sheriff’s Office contracts with twelve cities and towns for a variety of animal control services. In August 2015, the position was designated as a civilian position rather than a sworn deputy position. We now have two full-time animal control positions.

Medics

The Sheriff’s Office was the first organization in the state to get a licensed Paramedic Tactical Rescue Unit license. We brought on part-time employees who are full-time paramedics. They have attended our basic SWAT course and regularly attend our SWAT training. These medics are trained to go into mass casualty events and work to save lives. They bring a wealth of knowledge and experience to our organization and continue to prove invaluable in our planning for any catastrophic events.

Patrol

Since the election of Cache County’s first Sheriff in 1857, the primary mission of the Sheriff has been to preserve the peace and make all lawful arrests. The deputy sheriffs in Patrol continue a strong commitment to that mission.

School Resource

There are eight deputies that work in the School Resource unit; one supervisor and seven deputies. These deputies respond to calls for service within the schools which otherwise would have to be handled by a patrol deputy.

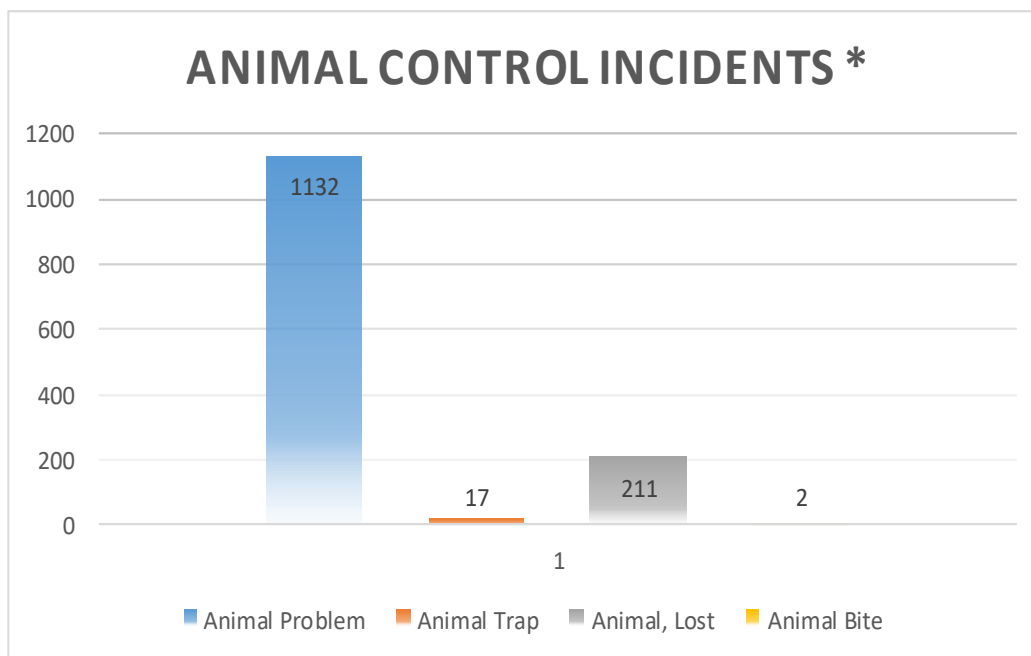


ANIMAL CONTROL

Animal Control is a service provided by the Criminal Division under the direction of the administrative sergeant. There are two full-time civilian employees working in the Animal Control unit that respond to animal calls and patrol for animal problems.

Cities receiving this service benefit from accurate documentation of ongoing problems and nuisances that may fall through the cracks with an on-call animal service. Other advantages of having a law enforcement employee assigned to this service are a working relationship with the various city prosecutors and access to all the resources of the Sheriff's Office to safely and humanely handle animals.

In 2018, Animal Control responded to 1,713 incidents; 66% of which were in our contract cities and towns, with 33% occurring in various other locations throughout the county.

What does Cache County Animal Control do?

Our goal is to help ensure the people and animals of Cache County are happy and healthy.

Our services include:

- ◇ Using microchip reader technology to get animals back home
- ◇ Impounding lost or stray animals
- ◇ Enforcing rabies and city license registration
- ◇ Ensuring the roadways are clear of animal hazards
- ◇ Stopping animal cruelty and abuse
- ◇ Educating the citizens of Cache County on animal control city ordinances



PATROL

The peace officers assigned to **Patrol** have a strong commitment to the preservation of peace and making lawful arrests. They uphold that mission by gathering intelligence on criminals, investigating their activities, and ultimately arresting and prosecuting them. The lives and liberties of Cache County's residents are further protected by the Patrol unit's response to public emergencies of many varieties, traffic enforcement, public safety, crime prevention programs, and civil dispute resolution.

In addition to preserving the peace and making arrests, Patrol deputies are a representative of the Sheriff in the communities that the office serves. The Sheriff's Town and Area Representative (STAR) Deputy program was organized to enhance communication and service between the Sheriff's Office and the individual communities. Each deputy is assigned to a particular city or town, and together they work to resolve community issues.

The Patrol Division consists of 25 deputies and four sergeants. With a total of 11,426 calls for service this year, the Sheriff's Office deputies (patrol, animal control and school resource deputies, 47 total) responded to an average of 243 incidents per deputy.



SCHOOL RESOURCE



The **School Resource** unit consists of seven deputies and one sergeant. Deputies are assigned to work with the staff and students at the high schools (Sky View, Mountain Crest, Ridgeline, Green Canyon and Cache) and middle schools (South Cache, North Cache, Spring Creek, and White Pine). Two deputies teach the NOVA program at the elementary schools in the Cache County School District.

The School Resource deputies investigate crimes within the schools and work with school administrators on safety issues concerning the schools. They also provide a level of security within the schools by their presence.

The School Resource deputies also work with the Bear River Health Department by conducting alcohol compliance checks.

Alcohol Compliance Checks

The Cache County Sheriff's Office, in cooperation with the Bear River Health Department, conduct alcohol compliance checks in accordance with the EASY alcohol program funded by the State of Utah. Checks are conducted four times per year. The purpose of the checks is to prevent the sale of alcohol to underage youth.

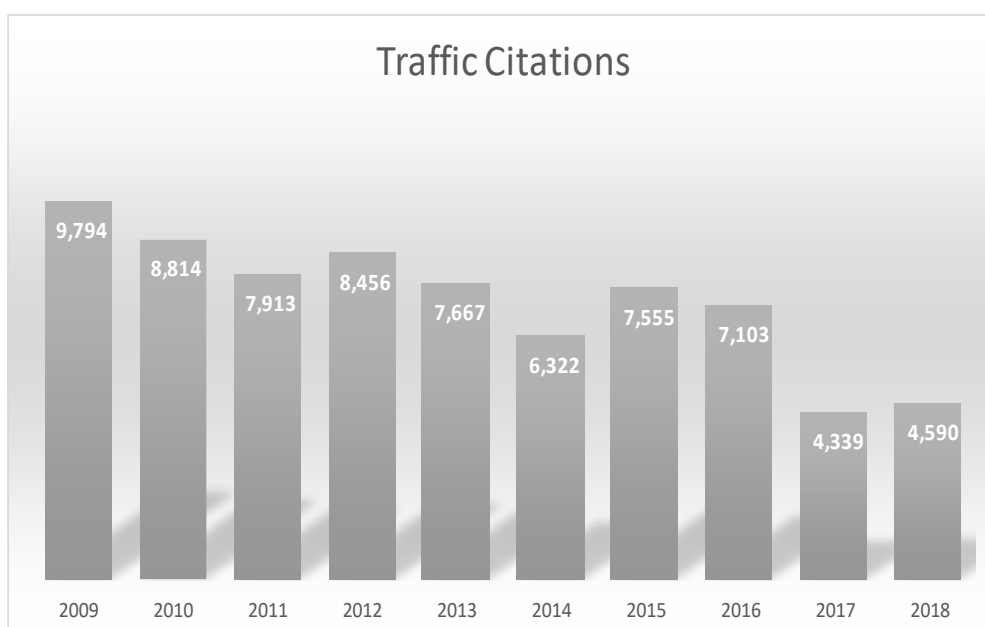
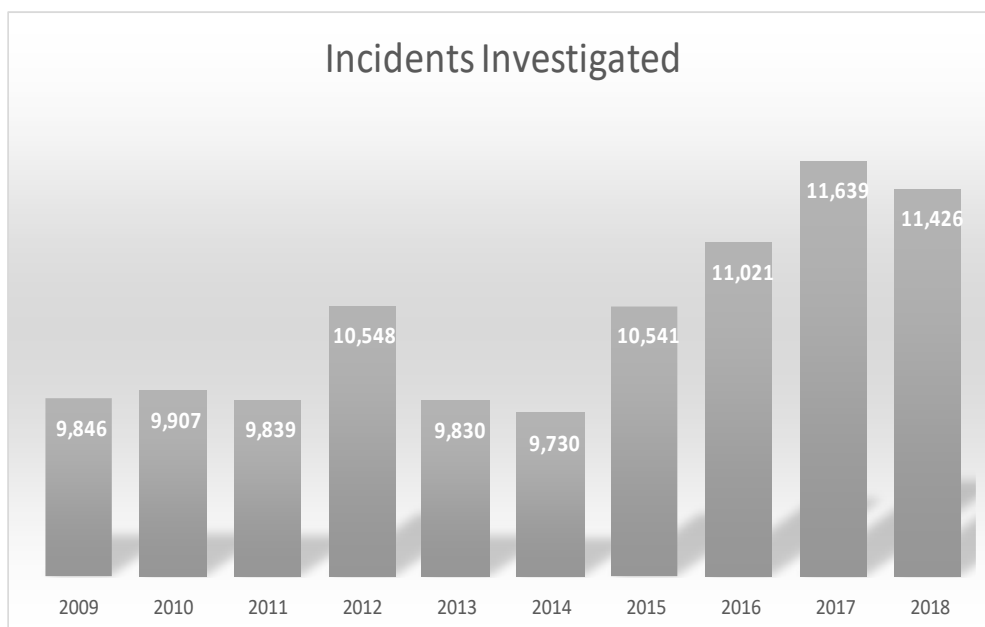
How Compliance Checks Work

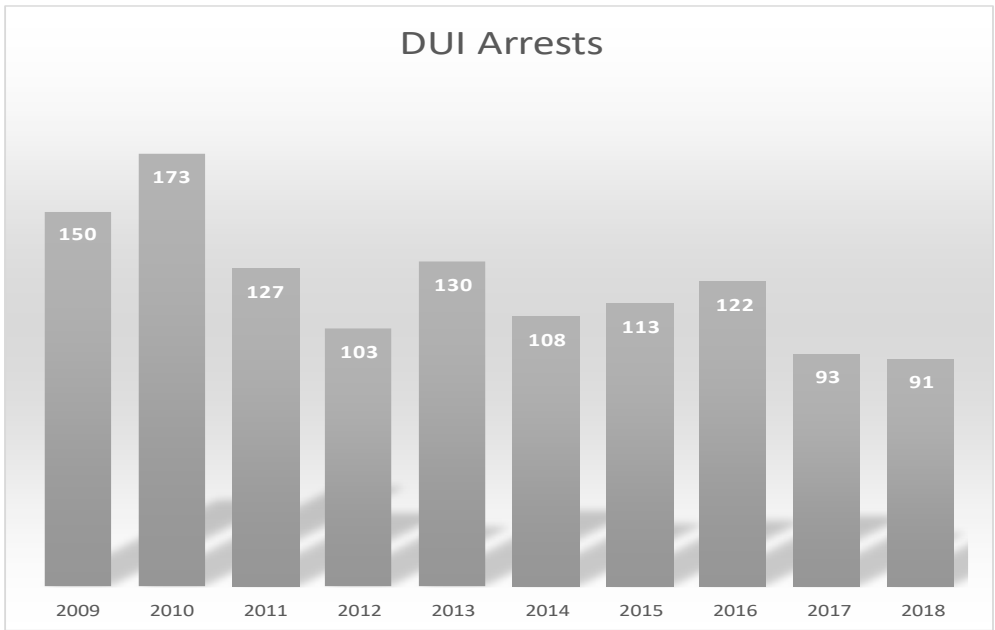
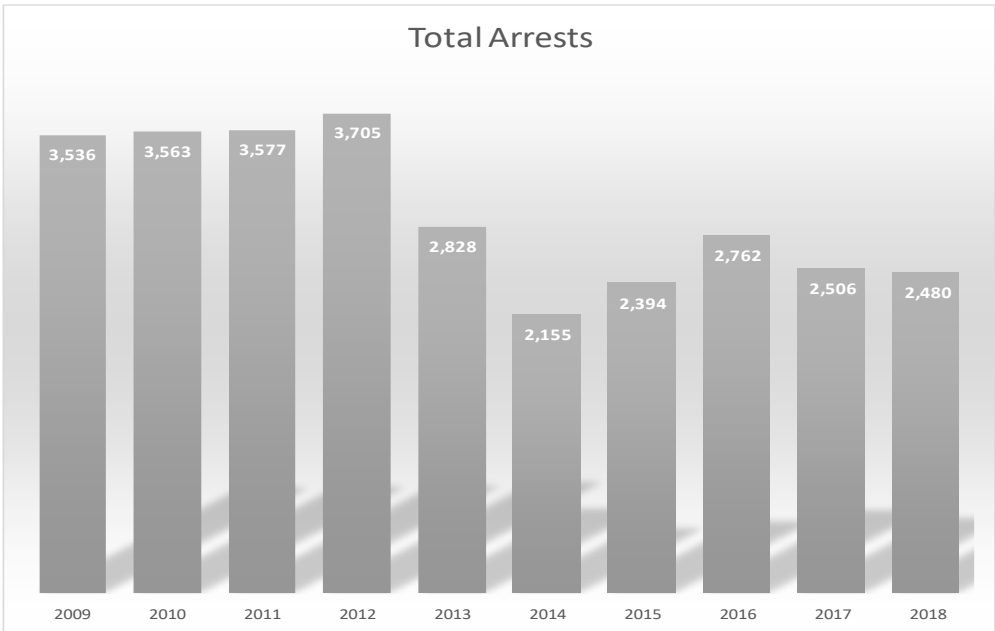
A youth, at least 18 years of age, goes into a retail store that sells alcohol and tries to purchase alcohol. The buyer is instructed to be honest and follow a particular set of rules outlined by the State of Utah. If a purchase is made, the store clerk is cited or referred to court, and the store is fined by the city in which the violation occurred.

Compliance

In 2018, approximately 19 retail stores were checked four times throughout the year. Out of 74 attempts to purchase alcohol by an underage buyer, three buys were successful. The retail stores of Cache Valley were 96% compliant in not selling alcohol to underage buyers.

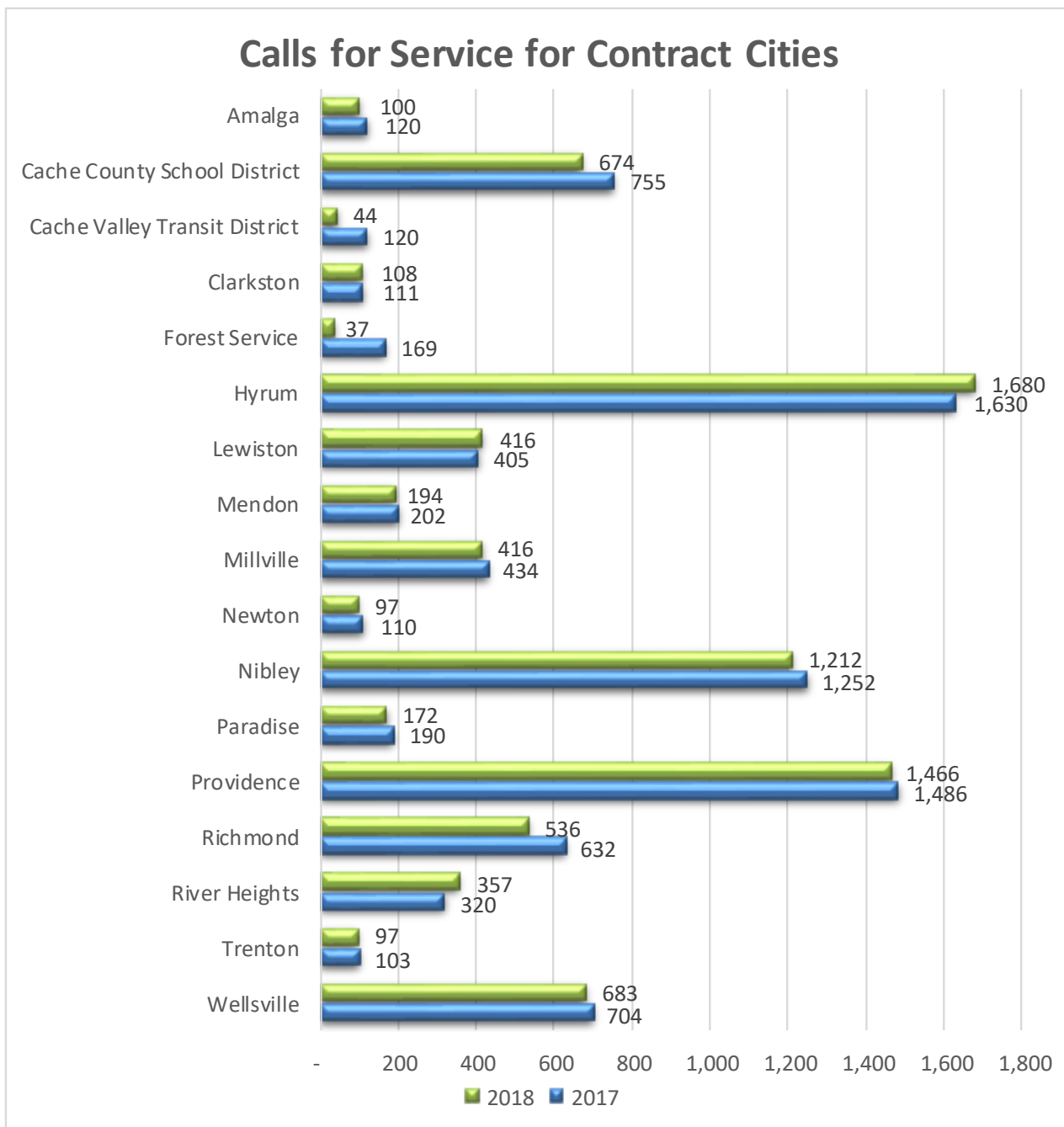


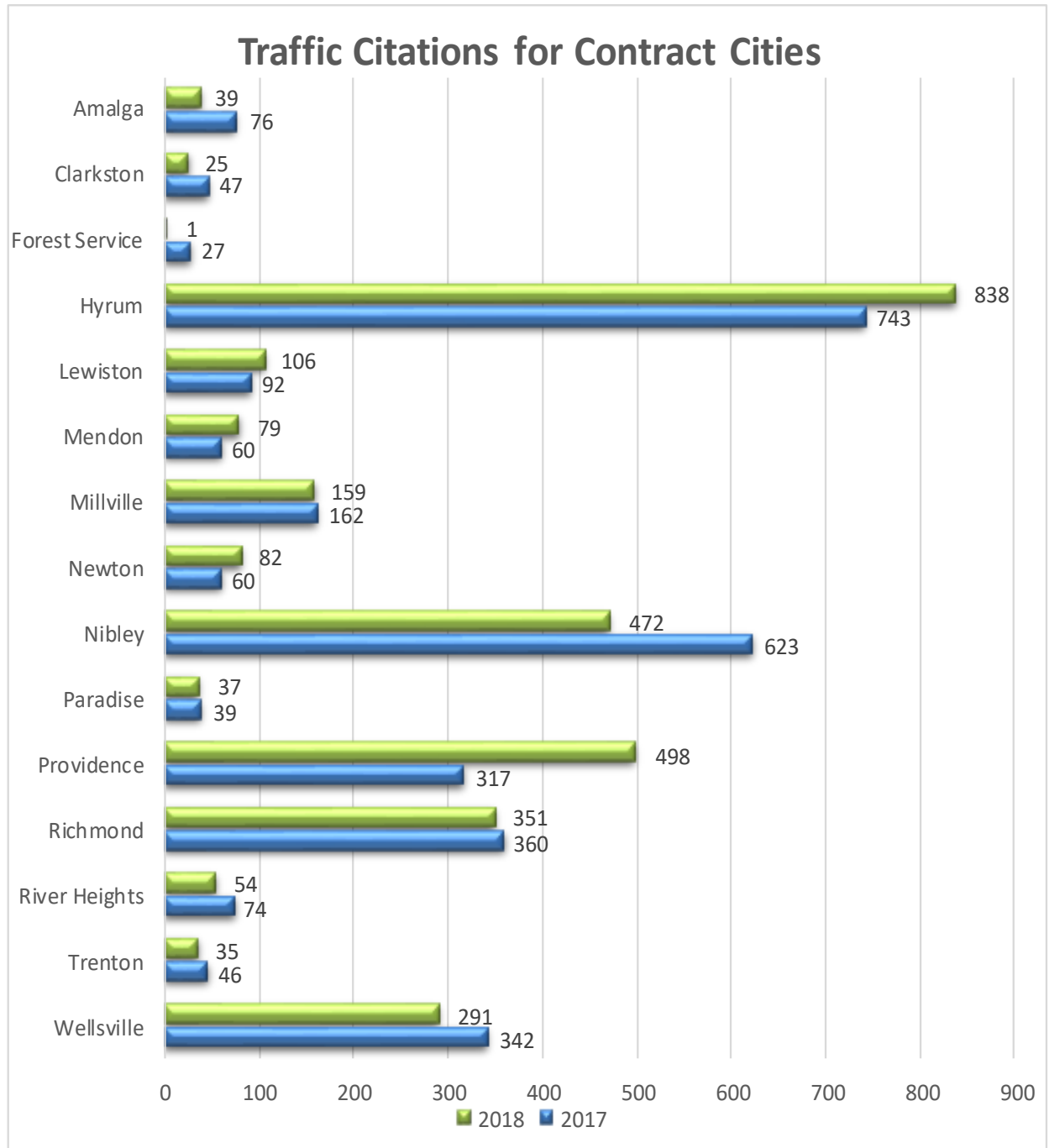




CONTRACT CITY NUMBERS

Administrative Staff

The administrative staff is responsible for inmate accounting, including the processing of bail, medical billing, Pay-for-Stay, and billing other agencies for housing. The jail accreditation program is also managed through the Administration office.

Corrections

Corrections deputies are responsible for the safety and security of all inmates and staff within the Cache County Jail. Their duties also include booking inmates in and out of the facility and inmate recreation.

Inmate Programs and Services

Inmate Services is responsible for inmate commissary, inmate programs, classification, work release, work diversion, greenhouse, and county worker programs.

Medical

The medical staff is responsible for all inmate medical care.

Transportation

Transportation deputies are responsible for transporting inmates to court appearances, medical and dental appointments, Utah State Prison, or the Utah State Hospital.

CORRECTIONS



Corrections deputies ensure that the jail is a secure, humane, and fair environment for inmates. The deputies work to create a positive opportunity for inmate behavioral change and reintegration into society. All inmates are treated in a courteous manner, without regard to personal prejudice by reason of gender, race, religion, or political affiliation. The deputies are responsible for the day-to-day functions within the jail.

It is the mission of the Cache County Jail to provide inmate housing while upholding the values and ethics of the Cache County Sheriff's Office. This is done by providing a constitutionally acceptable environment that will ensure safety and security to the community, staff, and inmates. The accomplishment of these goals and other mandated court requirements is facilitated through cost effective management. Qualified staff create a positive atmosphere where participating inmates may advance to a less restrictive environment. It is the responsibility of the Sheriff and his employees to provide services to fulfill the requirements of the United States Constitution, Utah State statutes, and decisions of all courts of jurisdiction.

INMATE PROGRAMS

The Sheriff’s Office has several work programs in place for inmates. The public appreciates the service given and the overwhelming majority of inmates in the programs feels a sense of accomplishment.

Inmate Work Programs

There are 40 positions within the jail for inmates to work. Inmates allowed to work within the facility do so in the kitchen, laundry, library, and as janitors. Inmates allowed to work outside the facility work at the Food Pantry, American West Heritage Center, Sheriff’s Office greenhouse, County Fairgrounds, Logan Landfill, and Willow Park Zoo. There are also work crews that work with supervision on the county and Sheriff’s Office grounds. Inmates working outside of the jail provided approximately 12,000 work hours this year.

Work Diversion

Work Diversion is another work program that offers opportunities for those sentenced to do community service. This program is being used by many of the local courts including First District Court, Logan Municipal Court and other justice courts. This program provides many benefits to the court system, the community and to the individuals sentenced to the program.

In 2018, a total of 6,642 hours of community service were offered to 15 different organizations in Cache Valley. These service hours provided for work to be done that otherwise would have had to be paid for by local tax payers. The Work Diversion program focuses its efforts in assisting non-profit and government agencies, which maximizes the benefit to local tax payers.

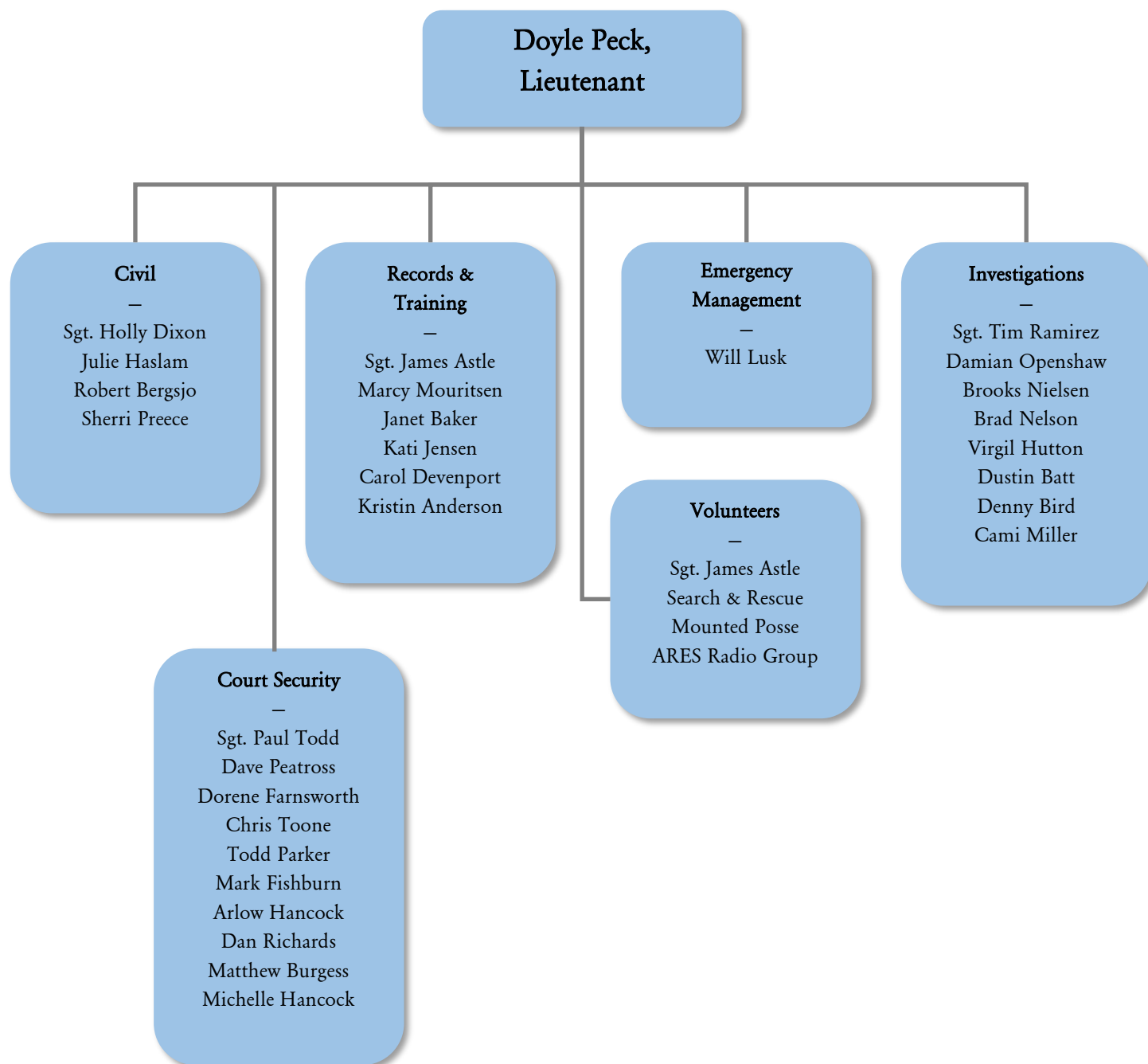
At the same time, this program provides an alternative means of punishment other than incarceration. Many of the individuals who are sentenced to this program are young adults who have committed minor infractions ranging from traffic violations to alcohol violations. These young adults do better working off their fines and punishments than spending several days in jail. By being sentenced to the work diversion program, they can provide a visible benefit to the community, work off fines that otherwise would be financially burdensome while avoiding negative life lessons that too many incarcerated individuals seem to want to provide to newer inmates.

SUPPORT SERVICES DIVISION

Civil

The employees in the Civil office are dedicated to the service of civil and some criminal processes and papers.

Court Security

Court Security provides general security for the First District Court complex and bailiff services for the courtrooms.

Emergency Management

Emergency Management is responsible for operating the County EOC and coordinating countywide disaster efforts.

Evidence

The evidence custodian manages and maintains the Sheriff's Office evidence storage.

Investigations

The detectives in Investigations are tasked with investigating the major crimes that occur in the county, focusing on felonies, rape, child abuse, drugs, computer crimes, fraud, and other major cases.

Records and Training

Records is charged with keeping all records of the Sheriff's Office. Most records are kept on file for five years and some are retained indefinitely. The training department coordinates training for the entire office.

Volunteers

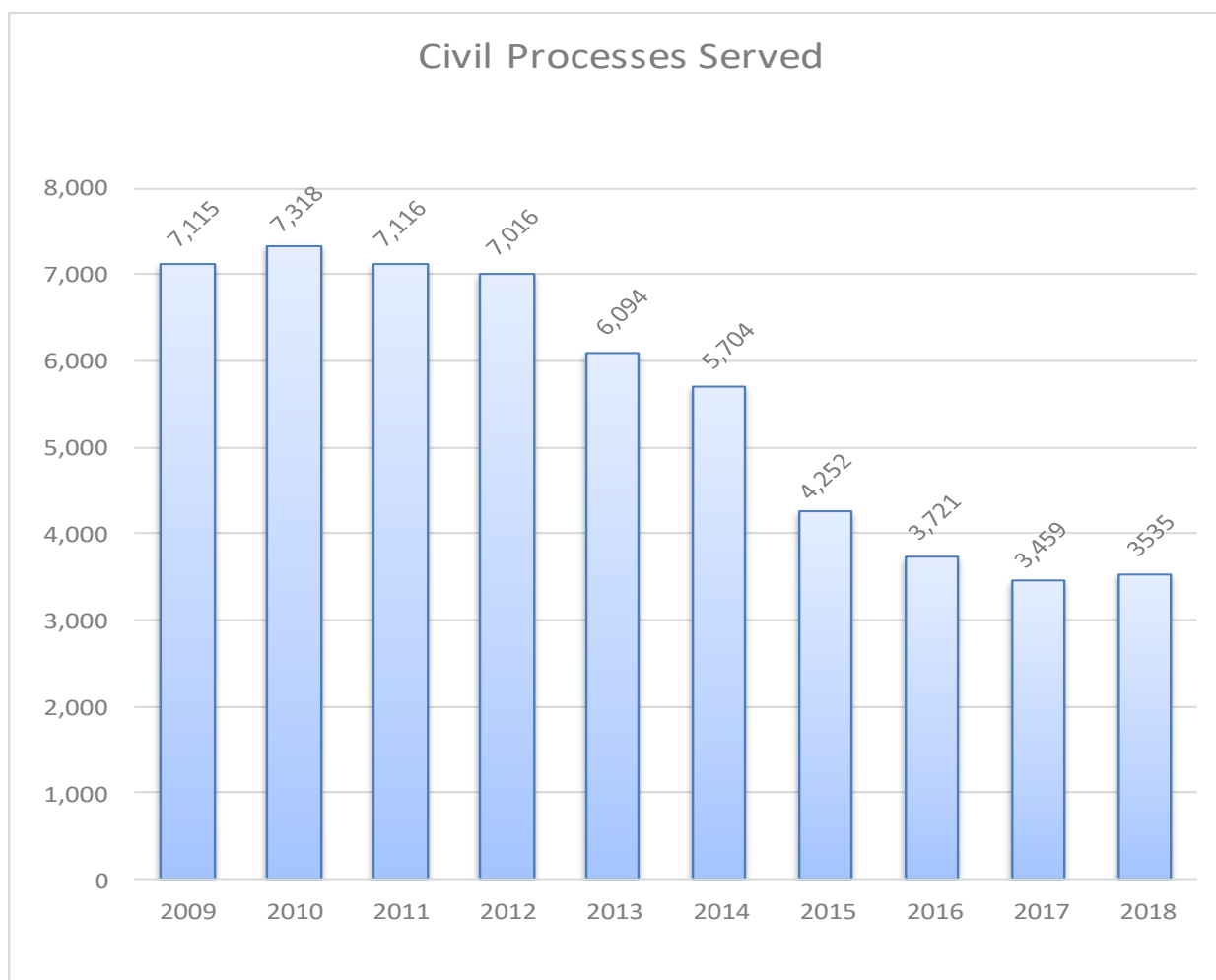
The volunteer coordinator is responsible for all volunteer groups such as Search and Rescue, Mounted Posse, and ARES.

CIVIL

The **Civil** unit provides timely service of all processes brought to the Sheriff's Office, as well as executing court orders relative to civil litigation. Additionally, criminal processes, including bench warrants, summons, and orders are served by this unit.

Civil also takes possession of property pursuant to court orders, conducts Sheriff's sales, and generally serves as the enforcement arm for the civil courts.

Enforcement and management of civil law cases is unique to the Sheriff's Office and is a major responsibility, as well as a major liability, for the Sheriff.



COURT SECURITY

The Sheriff’s Office provides two distinct services to the District Court, Juvenile Court, and some justice courts of the First Judicial District.

First, deputy sheriffs serve as the bailiff of the court, whose primary duty is to ensure the safety of the judge and court staff. Additionally, bailiffs help maintain order in the courtroom.

Second, deputy sheriffs provide the security of the court complex. This is accomplished through the deputy’s uniformed presence in and around the complex. Additional measures include the use of handheld and stationary magnetometers (metal detectors), intelligence gathering, processing of persons or situations which may pose a threat to the security of the court, and arresting violators of the law in or near the court complex.

The deputy sheriffs assigned to the courts enjoy an excellent working relationship with judges, court clerks, attorneys, and patrons.

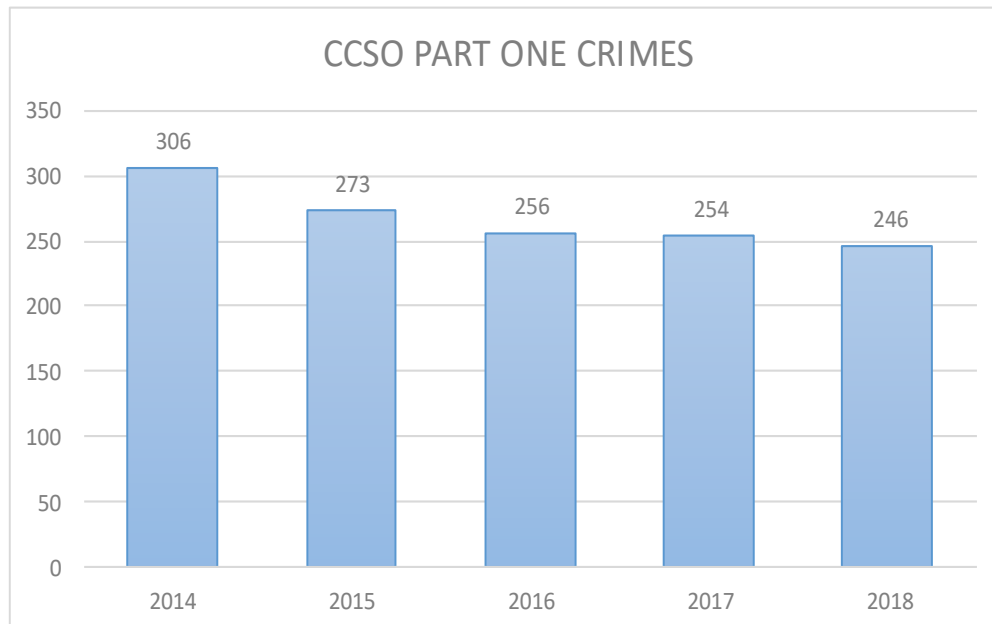


INVESTIGATIONS

The detectives assigned to **Investigations** are responsible for investigating major crimes in the county. The Sheriff's Office also assigns one detective to be a member of the Cache/Rich Drug Task Force, which enforces drug crime in Cache and Rich counties.

Part One Crimes

In 1930, the FBI was tasked with collecting, publishing and archiving statistics for Part One (major) crimes, namely aggravated assault, burglary, larceny (theft), robbery, rape, vehicle theft, arson and homicide. These major crimes are the most serious and are complex to solve. The most recent crime index statistics available are for 2017. The Cache County Sheriff's Office has a crime index rate of 5.26 per 1,000 people (total number of Part One crimes divided by the service population multiplied by 1,000).

CACHE/RICH DRUG TASK FORCE

The **Cache/Rich Drug Task Force** investigates drug related crimes in both Cache and Rich Counties. The Cache/Rich Drug Task Force is made up of five full-time law enforcement officers: three detectives from the Logan City Police Department, one detective from the Cache County Sheriff's Office, and one Logan City Police Department sergeant to supervise the task force. The Cache/Rich Drug Task Force gets part-time help from the Rich County Sheriff's Office, Smithfield Police Department, North Park Police Department, Utah State University Police Department, and the Cache County Attorney's Office. They also work closely with Adult Probation and Parole, the Division of Child and Family Services, and other local, state, and federal agencies.

In 2018, the Task Force investigated 291 incidents, executed 73 search warrants, and provided 25 drug education/prevention presentations throughout the year. The Task Force made 216 arrests; the primary offenses were for methamphetamine, heroin, marijuana, firearms violations, and controlled prescription medication, among various other charges.



Pictured Above: Agent Openshaw wrote a search warrant for a residence in Logan. Due to significant criminal history by some of the occupants, as well as the alleged violations, the warrant was served by members of the LCPD and CCSO SWAT teams. During the subsequent search, the following evidence was discovered; a large quantity of methamphetamine and drug paraphernalia, parts of a methamphetamine lab, and an active indoor marijuana grow operation including grow lights and temperature regulating equipment. Six adults were arrested and charged with various drug crimes and child endangerment. One of the individuals had recently given birth to a baby that tested positive for methamphetamine and there were other children living in the home.

EMERGENCY OPERATIONS

The Cache County **Emergency Operations Center (EOC)** is located at the Sheriff's Office Complex, and is managed by the Cache County Office of Emergency Management. The EOC serves as the central point for exercising direction and control by County government, and for coordinating emergency response and recovery operations during times of emergency or disaster.

Floods, earthquakes, severe storms, landslides, hazardous material spills, and search and rescue operations are examples of emergencies or disasters that may require centralized direction and control through the EOC.

This centralized direction and control is facilitated through the efforts of emergency responders, staff, volunteer agencies, non-governmental organizations, and elected and appointed officials who have assigned emergency support and coordinating responsibilities within the EOC. Coordination of activities ensures that all tasks are accomplished with little or no duplication, and with the highest probability of success.

Day-to-day operations include maintaining situational awareness and disseminating information. The EOC is ideally suited for this because of numerous phone lines and other communications capabilities. Day-to-day operations may also include managing Amber Alerts. If an Amber Alert is ordered in the County, the EOC serves as the call center for receiving tips and gathering information related to the alert. The EOC will serve as the central point of disseminating Amber Alert information to the public.

The EOC is equipped with emergency supplies, communications equipment, computer-based reference materials, and activity logs. It has backup power and lighting, along with the other tools necessary to function in emergency or disaster situations.

The EOC is also equipped to serve as an alternate Emergency 911 Dispatch Center.

To ensure all response and recovery tasks are accomplished with the highest probability of success, the EOC facilitates a county-wide "Training and Exercise" program. Within the past year, training has been provided to a number of emergency responders, staff, volunteers, faith-based groups, and elected and appointed officials.

EMERGENCY MGMT—VOLUNTEERS

Emergency Management maintains and assists in training a large pool of volunteer groups. Three groups that are used extensively to aid the Sheriff's Office are the Cache County Sheriff's Mounted Posse, Search and Rescue, and the Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) group.

ARES Radio Group

In 2018, the **ARES Radio group** has 39 active members. These volunteers donated 1,144 hours to the citizens of Cache County.

Mounted Posse

The **Mounted Posse** volunteers represented the Sheriff's Office in different events throughout the year, most notably at the Cache County Fair. In addition to their formal events, the Posse also supports their own self-funded family assistance program during the Christmas season every year.

Search and Rescue

In 2018, The Cache County Sheriff's Office **Search and Rescue** Unit responded to 43 Search and Rescue incidents including:

- 22 Off Road Medicals
- 4 Water Rescues
- 3 Wilderness Search & Rescue
- 1 Back Country Aircraft Accident
- 13 Lost Person Searches

Search and Rescue volunteers donated almost 1,600 hours on searches. While some searches took only a few hours, others had multiple days of operations.

Search and Rescue volunteers attended 83 trainings and community events during the year, logging over 2,880 documented training hours and 300 documented hours donated to local community events.

Search and Rescue has two volunteer members who are also SAR canine handlers. They conducted another 49 separate K9 SAR training events. Both K9s certified on NASAR Avalanche Rescue and one canine is certified as a FEMA Disaster Responder (K9). Hundreds of hours a year are donated by the handlers to train their personal canines to be used for search and rescue needs.

The Cache County Sheriff's Office Search and Rescue team is made up of 42 volunteers. These volunteers not only donate their time, but use of personally owned vehicles, trailers, ATVs, UTVs, snowmobiles, watercraft and other equipment.

The Cache County Sheriff's Office continues to rank in the top six most active search and rescue teams in the

state of Utah. By Utah state law, the Sheriff of each county is required to manage all search and rescue operations in their county. This would be an enormous cost to the taxpayers if it were done with paid staff.
