SHERIFF D. CHAD JENSEN

Sheriff Chad Jensen was hired as a deputy sheriff in April 1992 by Sheriff Sidney Groll. He began his career as a deputy assigned to the Jail Division and was later assigned to the Criminal Division as a patrol deputy. Prior to his promotion to Sergeant in 1998, Sheriff Jensen also worked as a detective in Investigations assigned to property crimes and crimes against persons. He also worked as an agent with the Cache-Rich Drug Task Force. As a sergeant, he was a patrol shift supervisor in the Criminal Division and later assigned as the sergeant over Investigations.

Sheriff Jensen was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant in 2004 and was assigned as the Criminal Division Commander. The Criminal Division includes Investigations, Patrol, School Resources, Gang Unit, Bike Patrol, Motors, and other law enforcement functions. While leading the Criminal Division, he worked directly with 13 contract cities and towns, the US Forest Service, Cache County School District, and Cache Valley Transit District. He has also been the division commander of the Support Services Division which includes Civil, Court Security, IT, Search and Rescue, and Mounted Posse. Two years prior to taking office, he was assigned as the jail commander.

Sheriff Jensen was one of the original SWAT Team members and later became the SWAT commander, spending 20 years of service with the team. Sheriff Jensen has worked, supervised and commanded in every division of the Cache County Sheriff's Office. Sheriff Jensen was sworn in as the twentieth Sheriff of Cache County on January 5, 2015.



LT. DOYLE PECK

Lieutenant Peck came to work for the Cache County Sheriff's Office in 1997 and has served his entire Law Enforcement career here. He worked his way up through the ranks as a patrol and corrections deputy. He served as Detective in Investigations for a number of years. After being promoted to sergeant he supervised in the jail and in the support services division as training sergeant. Since being promoted to the rank of Lieutenant in December of 2009 he has served as a jail commander and Admin/Support Lieutenant.



LT. MIKELSHAN BARTSCHI

Lieutenant Bartschi has been full-time with the Sheriff's Office since 2000. In 1997, he was a reserve deputy where he volunteered his time until he was hired as a patrol deputy in 2000. In end 2003, he was offered a chance to move to Investigations where we worked narcotics for a total of 3 years and general investigations for 3 years. He promoted to Sergeant in 2010 where he had the opportunity to learn about corrections. He spent 4 years as a Sergeant in our corrections division and was then moved back to patrol as a Sergeant. He has been our SWAT team commander and served a total of 10 years in various capacities in the SWAT team. In early 2018, he was promoted to lieutenant of the Patrol Division. Lieutenant Bartschi is a lifelong resident of Cache County. He has felt the calling to serve ever since he joined the Marine Corp Reserve out of high school.



LT. ROY HALL

Deputy Hall began his career with the Sheriff's Office in 2003 at the age of 22. He worked at the Sheriff's Office to pay for his university education, attending classes during the day and working graveyard shifts through the night. After he graduated from university with degrees in political science and history, he intended continuing onto law school but enjoyed his time at the Sheriff's Office, so he decided to stay and continue his career there. In 2007, he was promoted to the rank of sergeant, and in 2018, to the rank of lieutenant serving as Jail Commander, where he is currently assigned. He also serves as the Sheriff's Office Honor Guard Commander, having a deep and profound respect for all those who wear the badge, both past, and present.

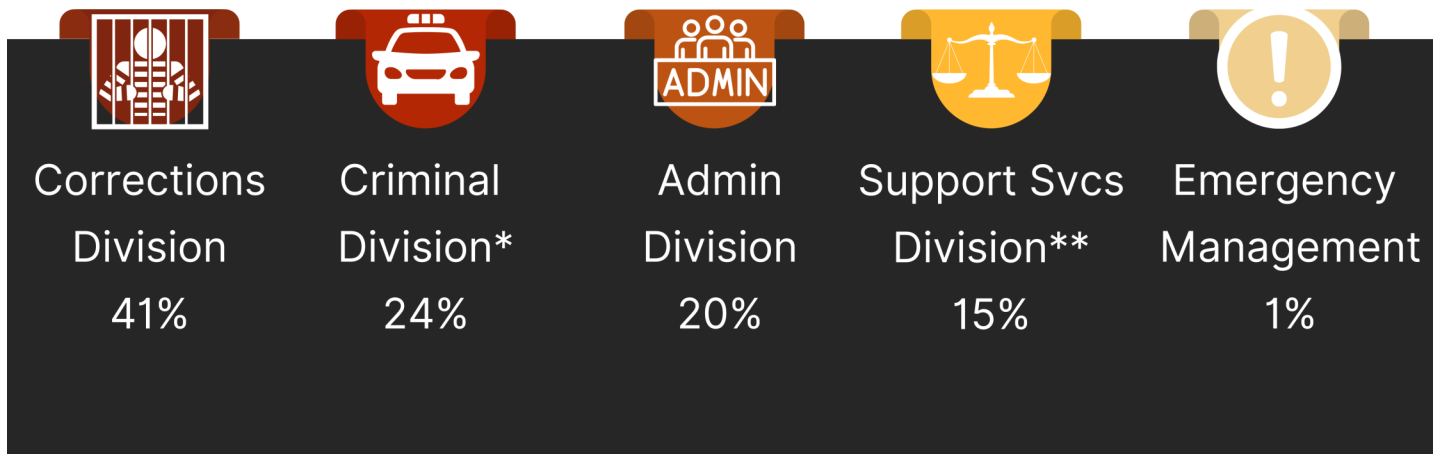
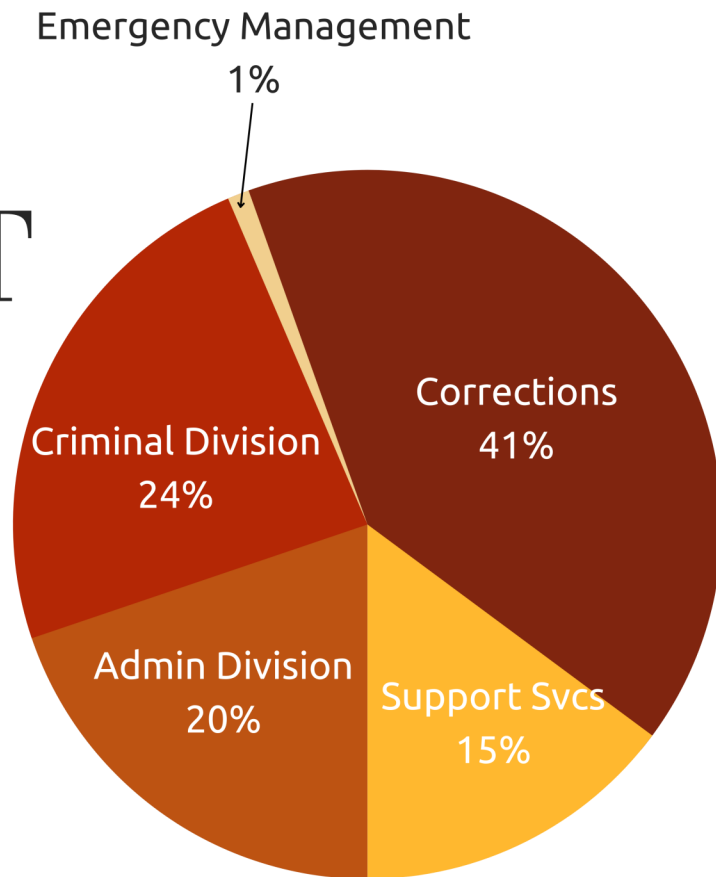

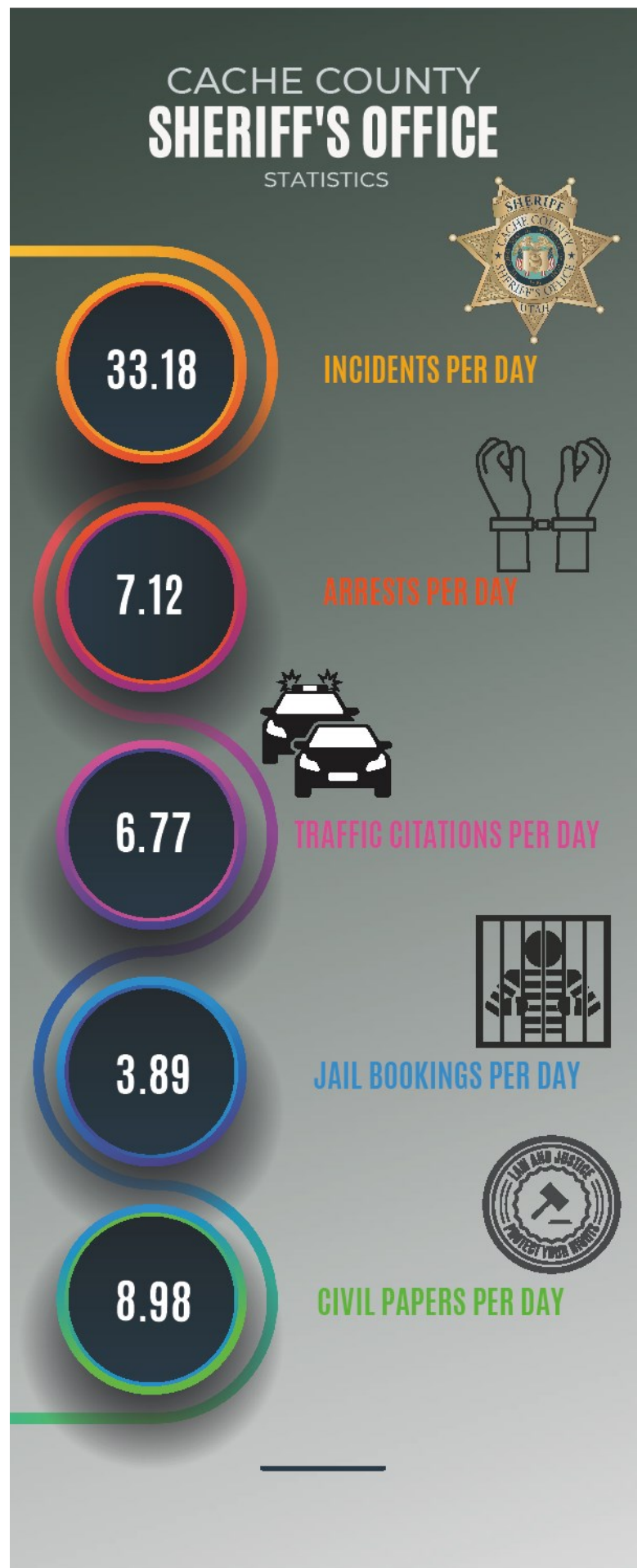

DEPUTIES PER 1,000 POPULATION

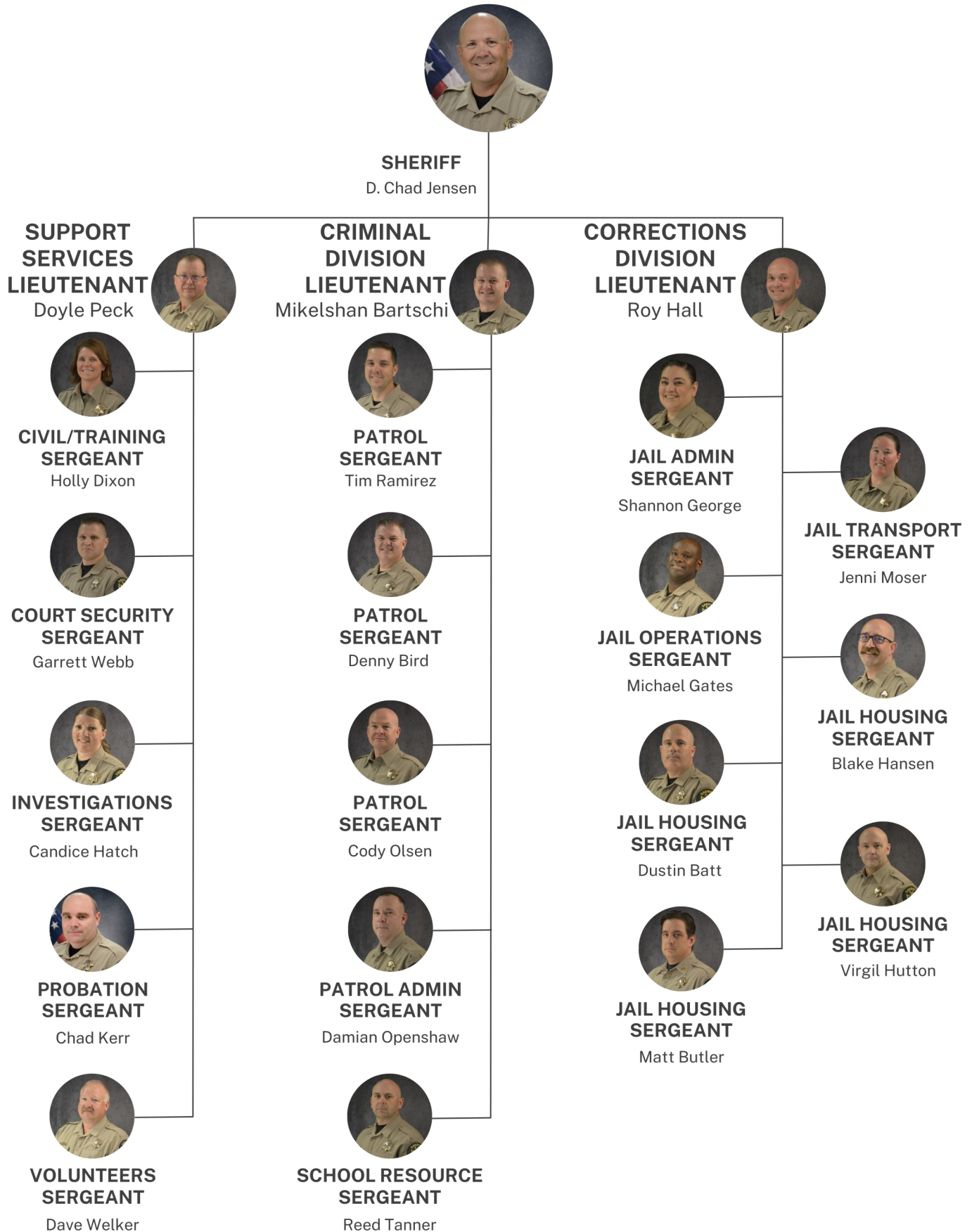

Deputy Jonathan Major Outstanding Achievement

The Outstanding Achievement Award is presented to a deputy or staff member who excels in the performance of their duty above and beyond that which is required during their daily course of work. They have exercised competence and have been able to inspire others to improve the quality of their work.

Deputy Major began his career with the Cache County Sheriff's Office as an experienced correctional deputy, previously working in another jail. His knowledge, experience, abilities, and ambition have benefited the Jail Division considerably over the past year.

Deputy Major is not only a top performer of the tasks a deputy would typically be assigned; he also volunteers for many extra assignments, including being an advisor for the Sheriff's Office Explorer program. He consistently produces high-quality results and settles for nothing less than the best.

Deputy Major is an alt TAC for the Utah Statewide Criminal Justice Information System for the Sheriff's Office and is heavily involved in instructing other deputies to become certified in the system. He teaches the state-certified Functional Behavior class to inmates each week, which helps inmates transition into society, lowering the possibility of reoffending.

Deputy Major became an armorer and has revamped the entire system for maintaining firearms and ensuring they operate perfectly. He is also a notary and uses this certification to alleviate some of the workload of the jail administrative assistants. Deputy Major is an outstanding asset to the Sheriff's Office and Cache County.

Sergeant Shannon George Outstanding Achievement

In the 19 years Sergeant George has served the citizens of Cache County, she has worked in several assignments and has become a wealth of knowledge and a great asset to the sheriff's office.

Previously, Sergeant George had been the inmate transportation sergeant. During those five years, she became an expert in this capacity. After being reassigned to Jail Administration, Sergeant George took it upon herself to spend hours creating help sheets for her replacement. She spent hours with the new transport sergeant, helping to train them in how to perform their tasks while at the same time learning her new job duties as Admin Sergeant. She has been tasked with maintaining jail policy, being the tac for the sheriff's office, and being the inmate grievance sergeant. She often fills in for other sergeants when they are unavailable. Because of her knowledge and experience, she can function in almost any position in the jail division.

It was a hectic and challenging year for Sergeant George, but she rose to the challenge. Her willingness to train and help others learn is commendable. Sgt George's drive to tackle any assignment she is asked to do is admirable. The quality of her work is unmatched. All her peers respect her, as she always answers their calls for assistance and guidance.

Deputy Michael Christiansen
Outstanding Achievement

The Outstanding Achievement Award is presented to a deputy or staff member who excels in the performance of their duty above and beyond that which is required during their daily course of work. They have exercised competence and have been able to inspire others to improve the quality of their work.

On February 17, 2022, deputies working in the jail booking area smelled smoke and immediately began a search to find where the smoke was coming from. They saw that it was coming from the laundry room. The smoke became considerably worse, and it became necessary for deputies to evacuate inmates from the laundry room, inmate medical cells, civilian staff, and portions of booking.

The cause of the fire was found to be a pile of hot laundry contained in a laundry bag. This laundry began to smolder unnoticed by the inmate workers in the laundry room until it started to burn.

Deputy Christiansen assisted in evacuating inmates from the laundry room, inmate medical cells, and portions of booking. Once individuals had been moved to safety, Deputy Christiansen returned to the laundry room, where he removed the flaming bag, burning his hand in the process, and extinguished the fire.

Deputy Christiansen played a significant role in preventing further bodily injury to inmates and staff and reduced the damage to the jail facility.

Deputies Colby Nielsen, Sage Peery, and Dallin Burt
Lifesaving Ribbon

The Lifesaving Ribbon is presented to an employee who was directly involved in saving the life of another, for actions, if not taken, would have most likely resulted in the death of a person, whether on or off duty.

On January 2, 2022, a medical event involved an inmate in the jail. Deputy Nielsen was working in pod control at the time. An inmate was in their cell with the door closed and began having a seizure. The inmate pushed their emergency button just as they fell to the floor. Deputy Nielsen answered the call and attempted to contact the inmate through the intercom, with no response. When he could not get a visual of the inmate, he concluded that the inmate must be lying on the floor and may have something seriously wrong with him.

Deputy Nielsen immediately radioed booking deputies Deputy Burt and Deputy Peery for an immediate response to check on this inmate. When the Deputies arrived, they found the inmate unresponsive and struggling to breathe. Deputy Peery's training and experience led him to believe this medical event may result from an opiate overdose, and he made an emergency call for Narcan to be delivered to the cell. The Deputies rolled the inmate on his side to clear fluid from their airway.

Medical personnel arrived shortly after and began treatment. After administering a dose of Narcan, the inmate began to regain consciousness. The inmate was then transported to Logan Regional Hospital for further medical assistance. This inmate would likely have died if it had not been for the quick thinking, actions, and excellent communication performed by Deputy Nielsen, Deputy Burt, and Deputy Peery.

Deputy Skylar Limb Medal of Valor

The Medal of Valor is presented to a deputy for outstanding bravery in the line of duty, where the employee risks loss of life with knowledge of the danger involved or where a reasonable person would assume life and personal safety was in great danger.

On March 21, 2021, the Cache County Jail experienced its first-ever inmate escape. During outside recreation, an inmate escaped the Jail, defeating three security fences and fleeing on foot. This was an unprecedented experience for all who responded to assist.

When the radio traffic alerted staff of the escape attempt, Deputy Limb responded with his rifle to the outside of the facility, providing cover to the Jail's perimeter. Efforts to contain the inmate were unsuccessful, and the inmate fled westbound on foot.

Deputy Limb found himself in a unique strategic position and pursued the inmate. He communicated with Incident Command the inmate's location, appearance, direction of travel, etc. Deputy Limb continued to track the inmate through swampy and cold terrain while relaying important information to Incident Command, allowing responding units to set up a solid perimeter to contain the inmate and bring him back into custody.

The inmate had armed himself with a wooden club and commented that he'd rather die than stay in Jail. This indicated he'd rather be involved in a deadly force incident with deputies than return to Jail. This made the situation extremely dangerous, but despite this, Deputy Limb continued his pursuit until the inmate was apprehended. These actions define not just the type of deputy he is but the content of his character and the values he upholds.

Sgt. Virgil Hutton and Deputies Cordell Ballard, Sage Peery, Skylar Limb, Brittani Egbert, Jacquelyn Kessel and Zach Checketts Unit Citation

On Sunday, March 21, 2021, an inmate escaped the Cache County Jail, successfully overcoming three security fences during his outside exercise period. Jail Day-Shift responded quickly to the incident and saw it successfully through to the end. Because of their quick response, in conjunction with the help of personnel from other agencies, the inmate was safely apprehended a very short time later, and the safety and security of the Jail and its inmates were never compromised. Their response was vital in bringing this escape to a swift and successful end. They all exhibited noteworthy acts that rose above and beyond their regular duties. I am honored to present these deputies with the Unit Citation Award.

Deputy Mike Richardson
Deputy of the Year

The Deputy of the Year Award is presented to a deputy or other staff member for exceptional or distinguished service during the year.

Deputy Mike Richardson has been a deputy for over 17 years and a School Resource Officer for the past seven. He has served in many specialty positions, including SWAT. Deputy Richardson is a professional who consistently works to improve to meet the mission ahead. His peers regard him as a high performer who holds himself to the highest standards.

Deputy Richardson has been on light duty a few times during his career. During one of these times, he took on the daunting task of expanding the training curriculum and improving the patrol Field Training Process.

The High School administration recognized Deputy Richardson for proactively building professional relationships every chance he got. A vital part of the Sheriff's Office's mission is working cooperatively with the citizens we serve. These high school administrators were quoted as saying, "Deputy Richardson's organization and preparedness keep him communicating with all high school team members. Deputy Richardson has demonstrated a willingness to jump in and create a team environment that helps others feel at ease".

Deputy Dallas Neibert
Lifesaving Ribbon

The Lifesaving Ribbon is presented to an employee who was directly involved in saving the life of another, for actions, if not taken, would have most likely resulted in the death of a person, whether on or off duty.

On February 26, 2022, Deputy Dallas Neibert responded to a medical emergency where an individual was reported as having suffered from a gunshot wound. Deputy Neibert was the first to arrive and had the foresight to grab his patrol medical kit before entering the scene. He located the patient and discovered that the patient was alive but bleeding profusely from a gunshot wound. Deputy Neibert used the medical supplies from his kit to apply pressure and dress the wound while communicating with the patient and updating dispatch of the patient's condition until EMS arrived and took over lifesaving efforts. Deputy Neibert kept control of the scene, speaking with witnesses and the complainant, who was distraught and suffering from shock while still managing to locate and secure the weapon until additional units arrived.

Deputy Neibert demonstrated a high level of leadership, professionalism, compassion, and control under pressure, which contributed to preserving life, scene security, and evidence.

Deputies Michael Hepworth and Kevin Schaaf Lifesaving Ribbon

On November 20, 2021, Deputy Michael Hepworth and Deputy Kevin Schaaf were dispatched to an incident at Newton Reservoir involving juveniles drinking. When deputies arrived, they found that most juveniles had already departed. At this time, a couple of the juveniles still on-scene mentioned to Deputy Hepworth and Schaaf that they could not locate their friend, who had been highly intoxicated.

At this time, the two deputies and the two friends began searching for the juvenile. When they located the unconscious juvenile lying in some brush, they weren't sure if he was breathing. The deputies then summoned medical to the location, where medical could get the juvenile the help he needed. Had the deputies not located the juvenile when they did, he would have been left outside in temperatures below 30 degrees and possibly died from exposure and/or alcohol poisoning. Deputy Hepworth and Deputy Schaaf should be commended for demonstrating their commitment to community protection.

Deputies Matt Hansen and Enrique Meza Lifesaving Ribbon

On July 13, 2021, Deputy Matt Hansen and Deputy Enrique Meza were dispatched to a call regarding a suicidal subject. When they arrived, they found the subject in a closet, standing on his tip-toes, with a rope wrapped tightly around his neck, struggling to remain conscious. Deputy Hansen lifted the subject high enough to relieve the tension on the rope, allowing Deputy Meza to cut him down.

Deputies Hansen and Meza's actions demonstrated a high level of leadership, professionalism, compassion, and control under pressure. The subject stated that he was on the verge of losing consciousness and would have died without their quick response.

SUPPORT SERVICES DIVISION

Detective Kevin Bennett Outstanding Achievement

The Outstanding Achievement Award is presented to a deputy or staff member who excels in the performance of their duty above and beyond that which is required during their daily course of work. They have exercised competence and have been able to inspire others to improve the quality of their work.

Over the past two years, Detective Kevin Bennett has worked diligently overseeing domestic violence cases for the Cache County Sheriff's Office. He has reviewed every domestic violence case to ensure that no victim falls between the cracks. As part of the review, he ensures that all criminal charges have been examined and that every victim is made aware of the services available. Detective Bennett also ensures that the Victim's Advocates are aware of each victim to help them with their needs.

Detective Bennett works diligently to educate other deputies regarding domestic violence statutes. He provides pamphlets with information on stalking and other similar crimes to help deputies better understand how to help victims when responding to these types of calls.

Detective Bennett is also part of the county-wide Domestic Violence Response Team. He works hard with the other team members to help survivors of domestic violence crimes move forward with their lives. Multiple team members have expressed their appreciation for the time and effort Detective Bennett provides to this team.

Probation Unit Unit Citation

In 2020, the Cache County Sheriff's Office started a probation unit to serve the citizens of Cache County better.

The challenges faced by the Probation Unit continued to grow. All team members have required a combined effort to meet and successfully deal with these challenges. These challenges have included:

- Taking on the Work Diversion program from the jail and integrating it into the world of probation;
- Implementing the 24/7 Sobriety Program in Cache County;
- Learning to write Pre-Sentence Investigation reports for various criminal offenses.
- Managing a caseload of an average of 50-plus offenders per agent;
- Learning new legal standards that are specific to probation, such as probation violation holds, probation-specific search and seizure laws; conducting assessments for case management and treatment; and,
- Working with many different agencies with the common goal of helping an offender gain a desire to change their lives, support their families, gain employment, and become clean and sober.

The Probation Unit is ever-changing. They have moved on from just learning a new facet of law enforcement and corrections to having success stories of offenders who have been able to change their lives. County probation is now a program that is in place in over seven counties, with the success of Cache County being a model agency to follow.

Greg Hughes, Greg Hartly, and Jeff Hartly Sheriff's Medal

The Sheriff's Medal is presented at the discretion of the Sheriff to an employee or citizen for service with distinction under extraordinary circumstances during an emergency or special operation or for other exceptional service to the Sheriff's Office.

I have had the honor of working with Greg Hughes, Greg Hartley, and Jeff Hartley for the past two years. They have been an invaluable asset to me and every Sheriff and Law Enforcement officer in our state. During the legislative seasons of 2021-2022, Law Enforcement faced 262 law enforcement-related bills. Because of their expertise in the legislative system and their relationships with legislators, we successfully worked with many lawmakers on their bills to make positive changes. We were also able to dismiss many bills that were damaging to public safety.

Other significant accomplishments include:

- Repealing bail reform.
- Rewriting the bail schedule and legislation.
- Working on bills to outline sanctions for parole and probation inmates.
- Creating duties for public and private supervision agencies.
- Passing legislation for jail contracting.
- Putting in place a long-term legislative plan for funding.
- Defeating the death penalty repeal bill.
- Defending every citizen's second amendment rights and certifying 19-year-olds Corrections and Special Function certification to help with recruitment and retention problems in our state.

This work and these accomplishments were not done for political expediency but from a genuine point of caring for the safety of every citizen in our state. Every one of these accomplishments has had a significant positive impact on our county and how Law Enforcement is administered to our citizens.

Emergency Operations

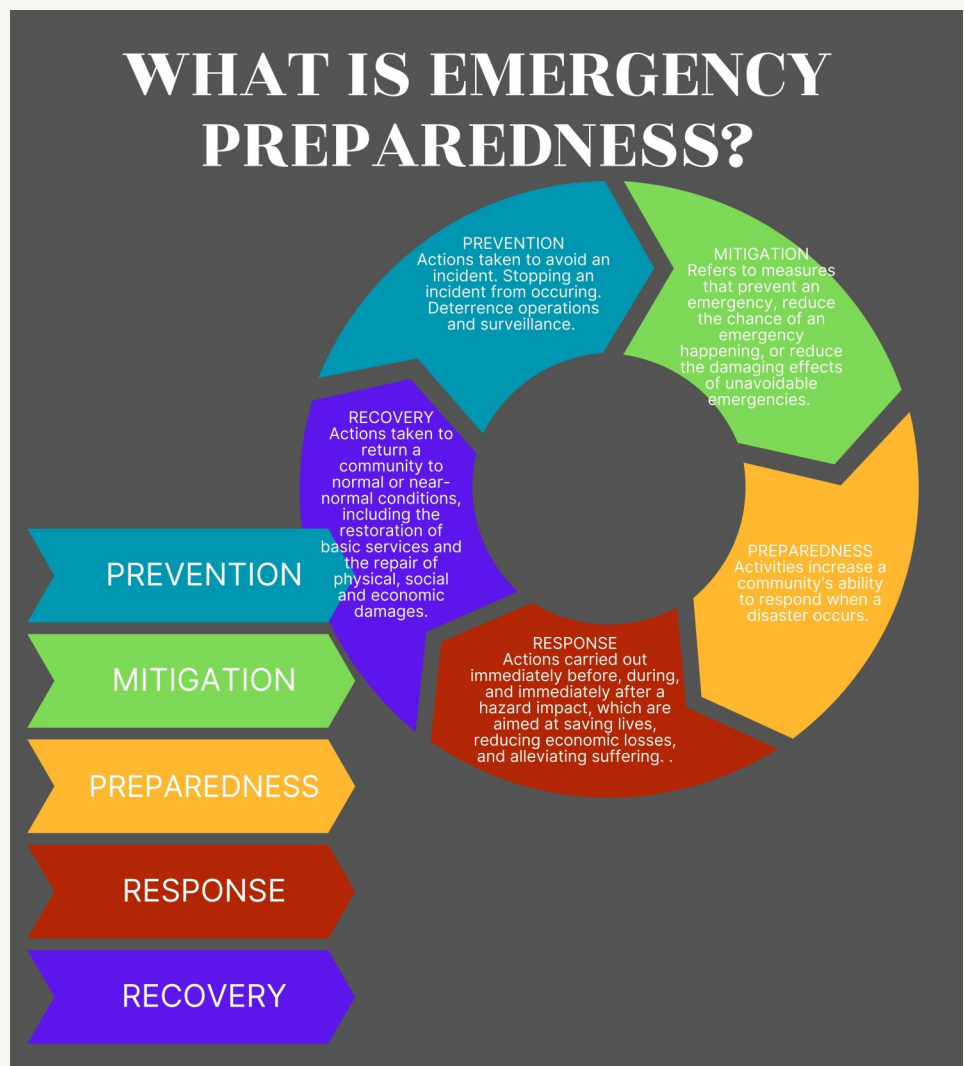
The Cache County **Emergency Operations Center (EOC)** is located at the Sheriff's Office Complex, and is managed by the Cache County Office of Emergency Management. The EOC serves as the central point for exercising direction and control by County government, and for coordinating emergency response and recovery operations during times of emergency or disaster.

Floods, earthquakes, severe storms, landslides, hazardous material spills, and search and rescue operations are examples of emergencies or disasters that may require centralized direction and control through the EOC. This centralized direction and control is facilitated through the efforts of emergency responders, staff, volunteer agencies, non-governmental organizations, and elected and appointed officials who have assigned emergency support and coordinating responsibilities within the EOC. Coordination of activities ensures that all tasks are accomplished with little or no duplication, and with the highest probability of success.

Day-to-day operations include maintaining situational awareness and disseminating information. The EOC is ideally suited for this because of numerous phone lines and other communications capabilities. Day-to-day operations may also include managing Amber Alerts. If an Amber Alert is ordered in the County, the EOC serves as the call center for receiving tips and gathering information related to the alert. The EOC will serve as the central point of disseminating Amber Alert information to the public.

The EOC is equipped with emergency supplies, communications equipment, computer-based reference materials, and activity logs. It has backup power and lighting, along with the other tools necessary to function in emergency or disaster situations. The EOC is also equipped to serve as an alternate Emergency 911 Dispatch Center.

To ensure all response and recovery tasks are accomplished with the highest probability of success, the EOC facilitates a county-wide "Training and Exercise" program. Within the past year, training has been provided to a number of emergency responders, staff, volunteers, faith-based groups, and elected and appointed officials.

ANIMAL CONTROL

The Cache County Sheriff's Office contracts with 11 cities and towns for a variety of animal control services. In August 2015, the position was designated as a civilian position rather than a sworn deputy position. We now have three full-time animal control positions.

PATROL

Since the election of Cache County's first Sheriff in 1857, the primary mission of the Sheriff has been to preserve the peace and make all lawful arrests. The deputy sheriffs in Patrol continue a strong commitment to that mission. The Cache County Sheriff's Office contracts with 14 cities and towns, the U.S. Forest Service, Cache County School District, and Cache Valley Transit District to provide law enforcement services.

SCHOOL RESOURCE

There are eight deputies that work in the School Resource unit; one supervisor and seven deputies. Two of these deputies teach a N.O.V.A. program over a 14-week period at the elementary schools in the Cache School District. The other five deputies and the school sergeant respond to calls for service within the schools which otherwise would have to be handled by a patrol deputy.

MEDICS

The Sheriff's Office was the first organization in the state to get a licensed Paramedic Tactical Rescue Unit license. We brought on part-time employees who are full-time paramedics. They have attended our basic SWAT course and regularly attend our SWAT training. These medics are trained to go into mass casualty events and work to save lives. They bring a wealth of knowledge and experience to our organization and continue to prove invaluable in our planning for any catastrophic events.

ANIMAL CONTROL

Sgt. Denny Bird

Animal Control is a service provided by the Criminal Division under the direction of the administrative sergeant. Three full-time civilian employees working in the Animal Control unit respond to animal calls and patrol for animal problems. In 2022, Animal Control responded to 1,538 incidents in Cache County.

Contract cities receiving this service benefit from accurate documentation of ongoing problems and nuisances that may fall through the cracks with an on-call animal service. Other advantages of having a law enforcement employee assigned to this service are a working relationship with the various city prosecutors and access to all the resources of the Sheriff's Office to safely and humanely handle animals.

The **School Resource unit** consists of seven deputies and one sergeant. Deputies are assigned to work with the staff and students at the high schools (Sky View, Mountain Crest, Ridgeline, and Green Canyon) and middle schools (South Cache, North Cache, and Spring Creek). Two deputies teach the NOVA program at the elementary schools in the Cache County School District. The **School Resource** deputies investigate crimes within the schools and work with school administrators on safety issues concerning the schools. They also provide a level of security within the schools by their presence. The School Resource deputies also work with the Bear River Health Department by conducting alcohol compliance checks.

N.O.V.A.

The acronym N.O.V.A. stands for Nurturing, Opportunities, Values, and Accountability. The mission of N.O.V.A. is nurturing youth to seek out positive opportunities, to internalize good values, and to accept accountability for life choices. N.O.V.A. assists parents, families, and communities in protecting youth from the potentially devastating effects of illegal drug use, violence, and negative media exposure.

The N.O.V.A. program is taught over a 14-week period with deputy sheriffs in the classrooms usually once a week. Topics covered include drugs and alcohol, opportunities and accountability, moral courage, self-esteem, heroes, anger management, teasing, bullying, evaluating media such as television, movies, video games, internet safety, music, and gangs.

Alcohol Compliance Checks

The Cache County Sheriff's Office, in cooperation with the Bear River Health Department, conduct alcohol compliance checks in accordance with the EASY alcohol program funded by the State of Utah. Checks are conducted four times per year. The purpose of the checks is to prevent the sale of alcohol to underage youth.

How Compliance Checks Work

A youth, at least 18 years of age, goes into a retail store that sells alcohol and tries to purchase alcohol. The buyer is instructed to be honest and follow a particular set of rules outlined by the State of Utah. If a purchase is made, the store clerk is cited or referred to court, and administrative action is taken by the state against the store, which may include fines and suspension of licenses.

Compliance

In 2022, approximately 19 retail stores were checked four times throughout the year. Out of 76 attempts to purchase alcohol by an underage buyer, four buys were successful. The retail stores of Cache Valley were 95% compliant in not selling alcohol to underage buyers.

Patrol division includes:

STAR Deputy - The STAR (Sheriff's Town and Area Representative) Deputy Program was developed to provide each citizen with a direct link to the Sheriff's Office. A STAR Deputy is assigned to each city in the county. The Deputy attends the monthly city council meetings and assists them with things such as Neighborhood Watch, National Night Out Against Crime, and anything else the city is in need of. Citizens are encouraged to contact their STAR Deputy with any questions or concerns they may have.

Motors - Given their inconspicuous presence and maneuverability, the motors are an effective tool for general traffic enforcement. After specific traffic problems or issues are communicated to the motor deputies through input from citizens or other deputies, concentrated enforcement activity is initiated to resolve their concerns. The motors are also placed into service for parades, city celebrations and events, National Nights Out, and military and funeral escorts.

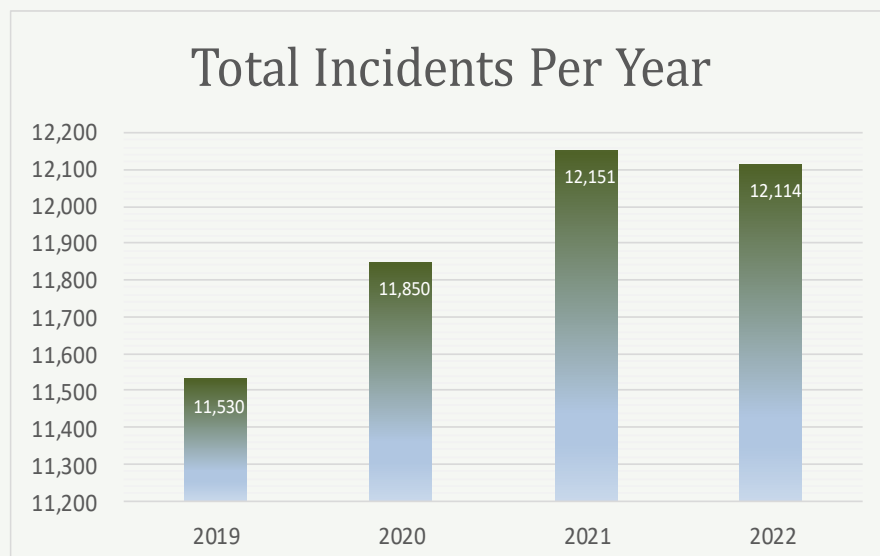
K9s - The Cache County K9 Division consists of two K9s and their handlers. Responsibilities include tracking criminal suspects, drug detection and general patrol duties. They also go to schools, fairs and other public events to demonstrate the important work they do.

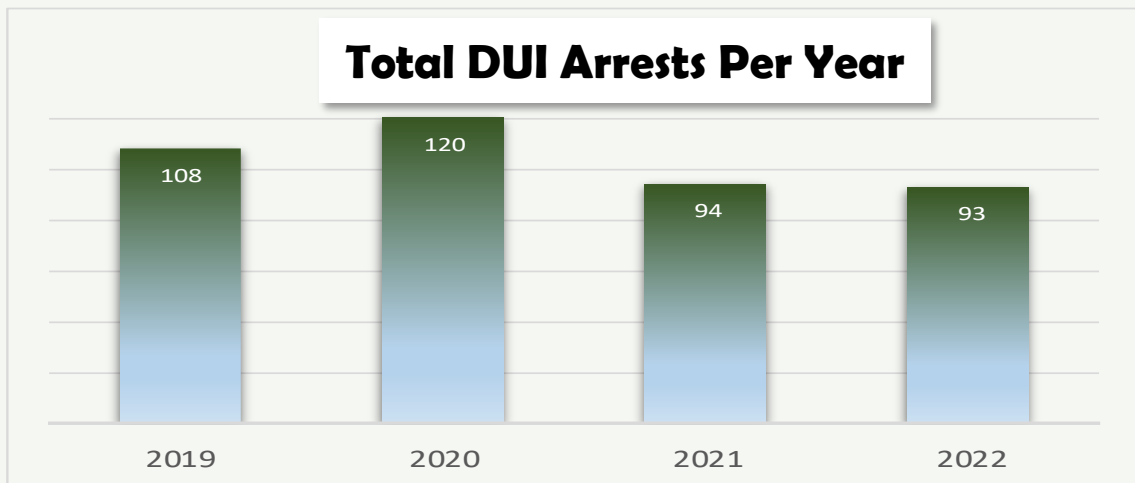
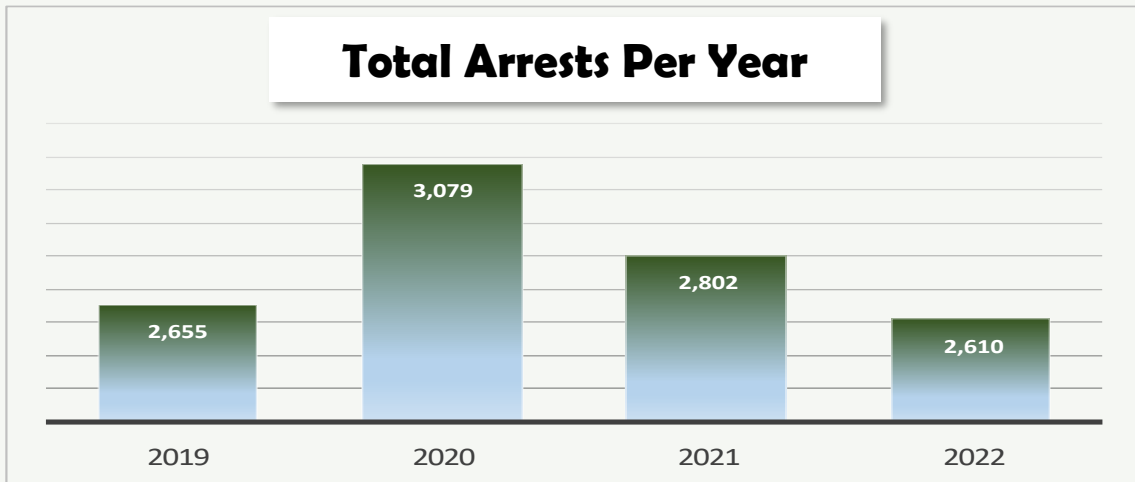
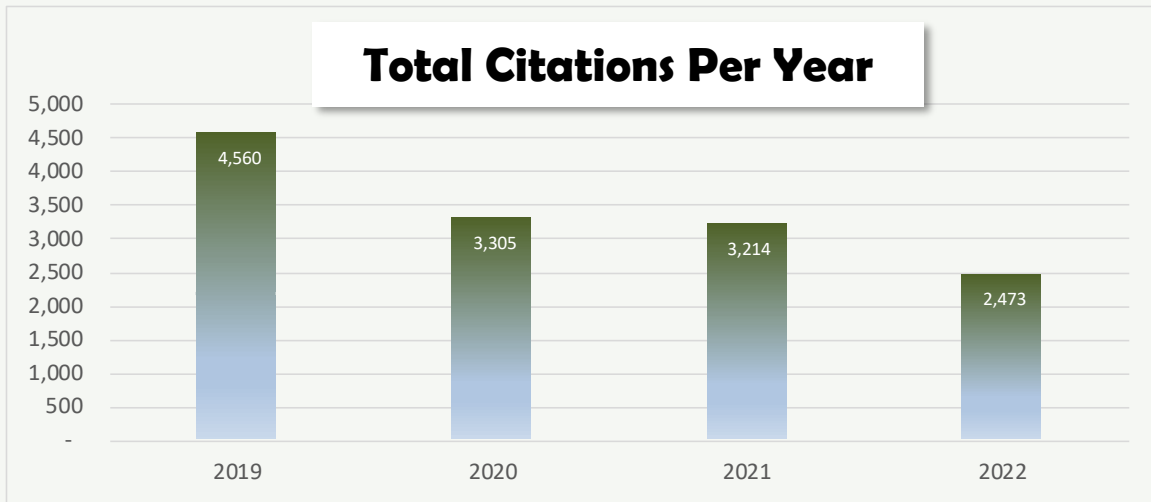
SWAT - The Cache County Sheriff's Office SWAT (Special Weapons and Tactics) team is a highly trained group of deputies tasked with the responsibility of handling and resolving extremely high-risk situations. Utilizing team tactics, special weaponry, specialized equipment and other tactical skills, the SWAT team handles hostage rescue operations, armed and barricaded suspects, high-risk warrant entries and any other situation requiring the team's skills and abilities.

The peace officers assigned to Patrol have a strong commitment to the preservation of peace and making lawful arrests. They uphold that mission by gathering intelligence on criminals, investigating their activities, and ultimately arresting and prosecuting them. The lives and liberties of Cache County's residents are further protected by the Patrol unit's response to public emergencies of many varieties, traffic enforcement, public safety, crime prevention programs, and civil dispute resolution.

In addition to preserving the peace and making arrests, Patrol deputies are a representative of the Sheriff in the communities that the office serves. The Sheriff's Town and Area Representative (STAR) Deputy program was organized to enhance communication and service between the Sheriff's Office and the individual communities. Each deputy is assigned to a particular city or town, and together they work to resolve community issues.

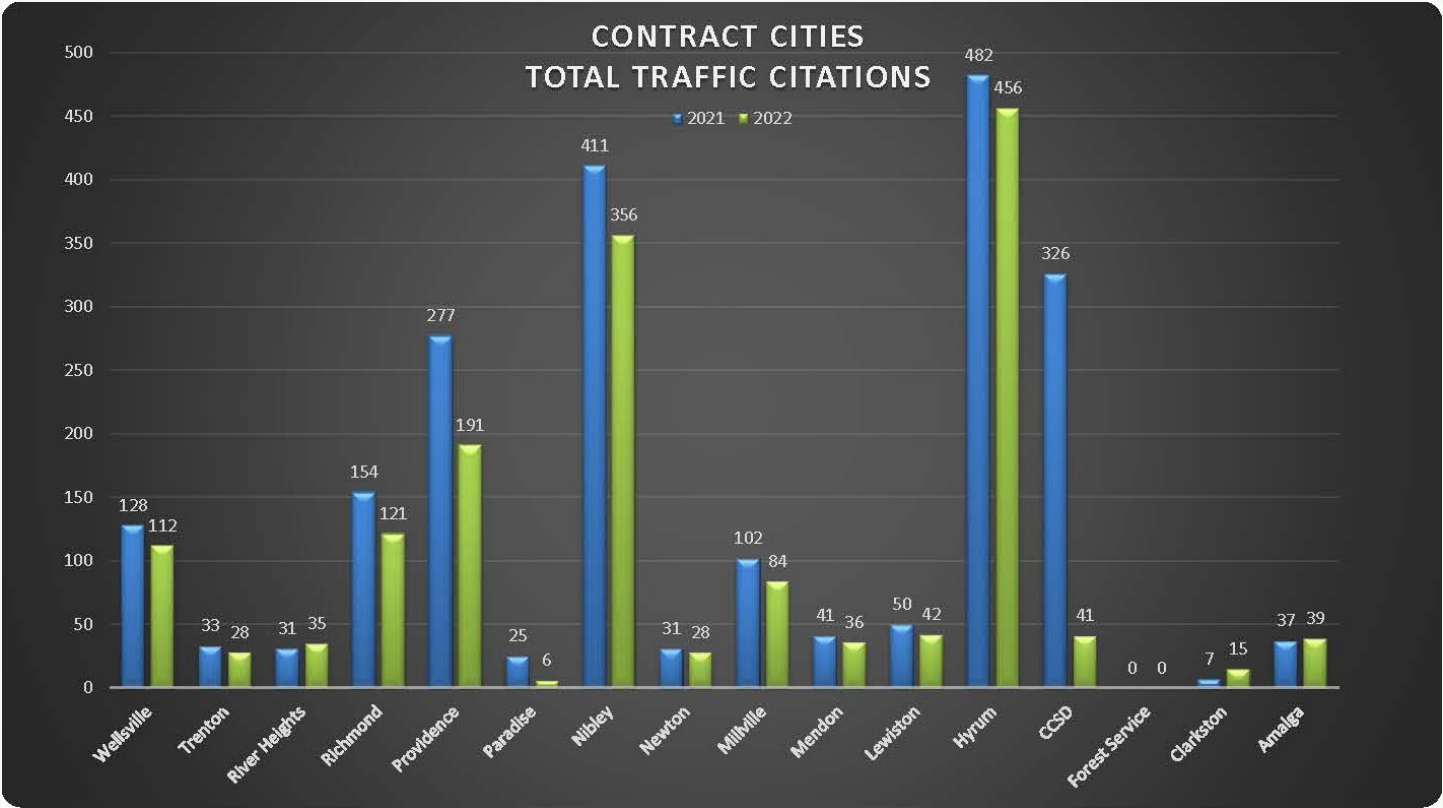
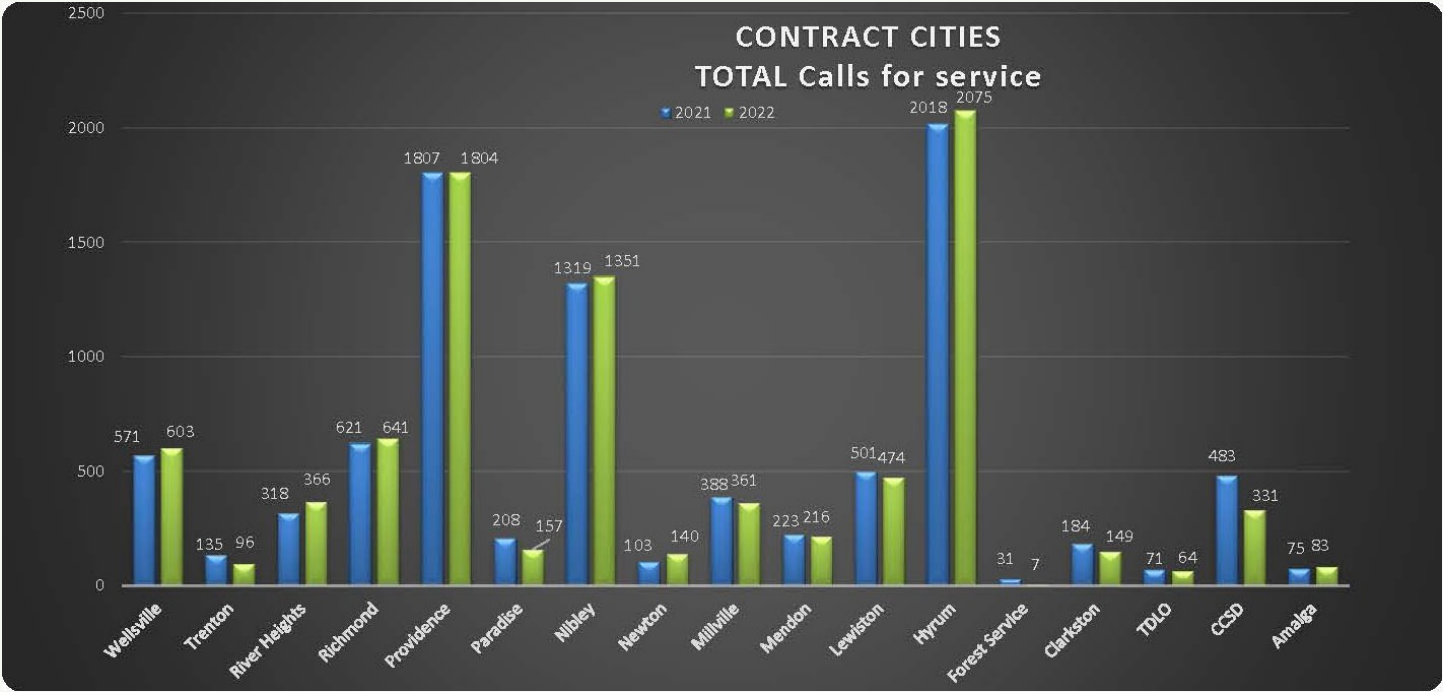

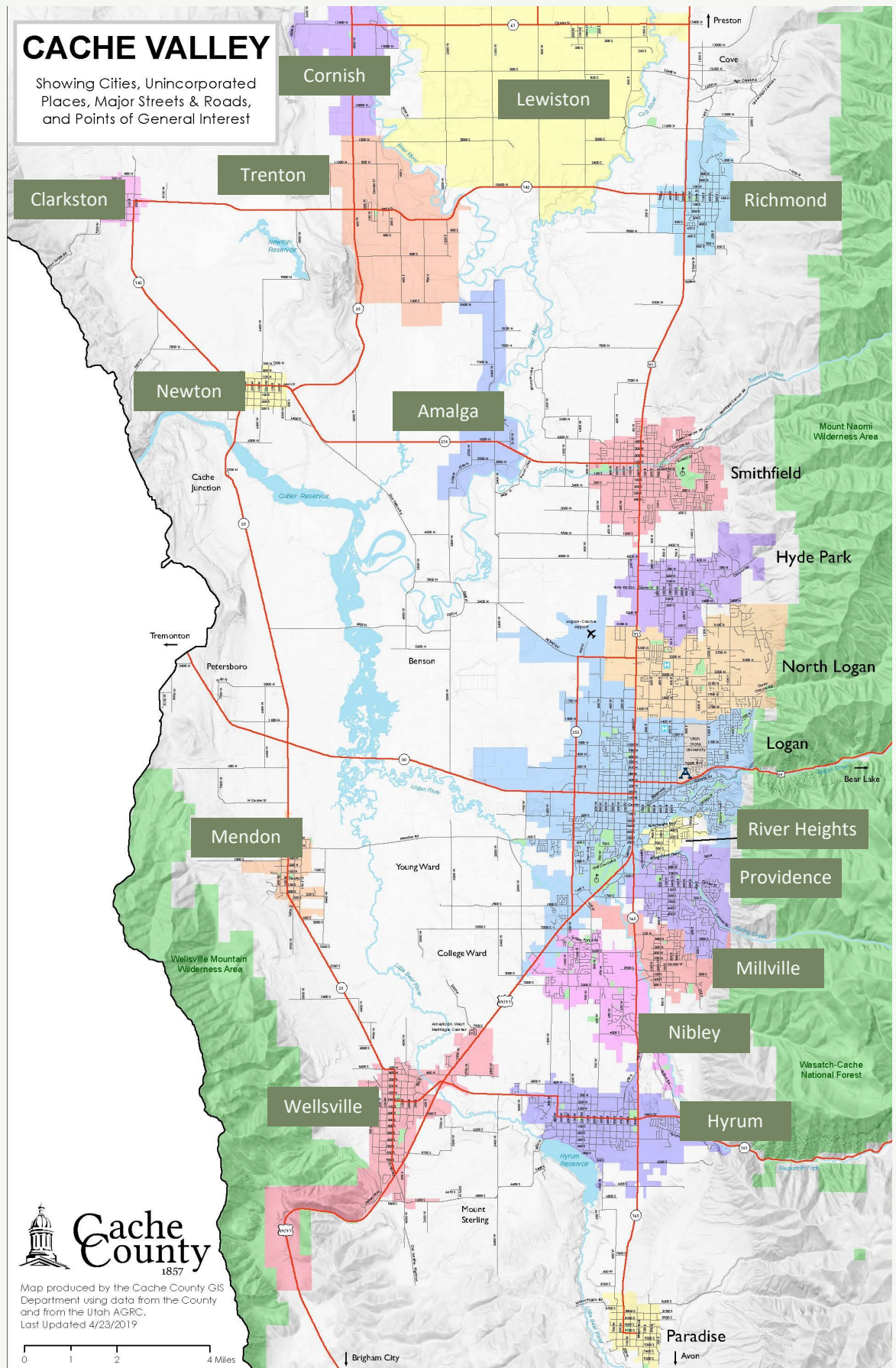
CONTRACT CITIES

Transportation deputies are responsible for transporting inmates to court appearances, medical and dental appointments, Utah State Prison, or the Utah State Hospital.

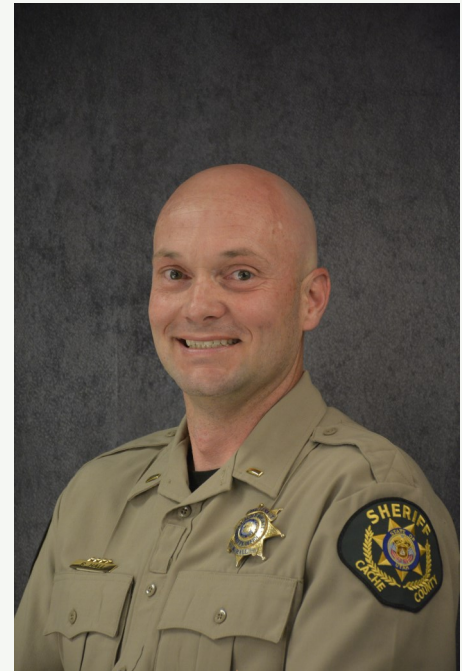

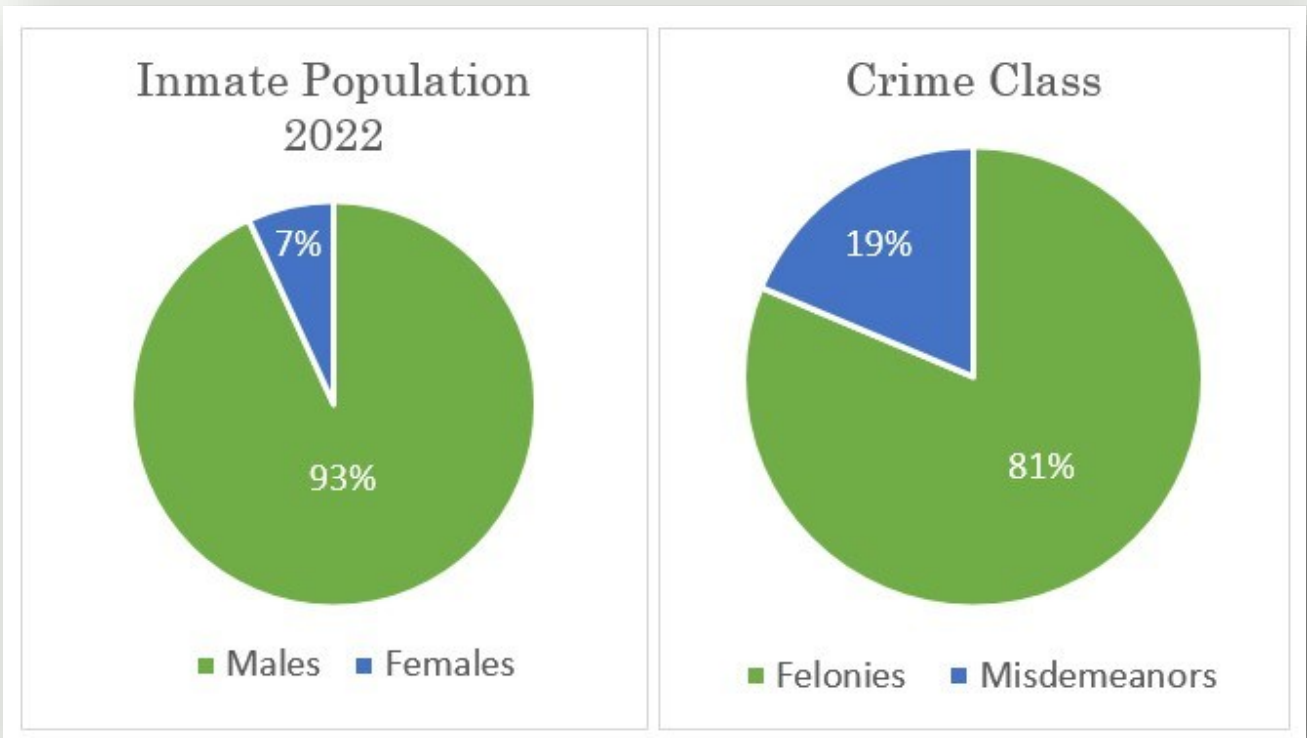

Corrections deputies ensure that the jail is a secure, humane, and fair environment for inmates. The deputies work to create a positive opportunity for inmate behavioral change and reintegration into society. All inmates are treated in a courteous manner, without regard to personal prejudice by reason of gender, race, religion, or political affiliation. The deputies are responsible for the day-to-day functions within the jail.

It is the mission of the Cache County Jail to provide inmate housing while upholding the values and ethics of the Cache County Sheriff's Office. This is done by providing a constitutionally acceptable environment that will ensure safety and security to the community, staff, and inmates. The accomplishment of these goals and other mandated court requirements is facilitated through cost-effective management. The qualified staff creates a positive atmosphere where participating inmates may advance to a less restrictive environment.

It is the responsibility of the Sheriff and his employees to provide services to fulfill the requirements of the United States Constitution, Utah State statutes, and decisions of all courts of jurisdiction.



The Sheriff's Office has several work programs in place for inmates. The public appreciates the service given and the overwhelming majority of inmates in the programs feels a sense of accomplishment.

Inmate Work Programs

There are 40 positions within the jail for inmates to work. Inmates allowed to work within the facility do so in the kitchen, laundry, library, and as janitors. Inmates allowed to work outside the facility work at the American West Heritage Center, Sheriff's Office greenhouse, County Fairgrounds, Logan Landfill, and Zootah. There are also work crews that work with supervision on the county and Sheriff's Office grounds. Inmates working outside of the jail provided approximately 4,469 work hours this year.

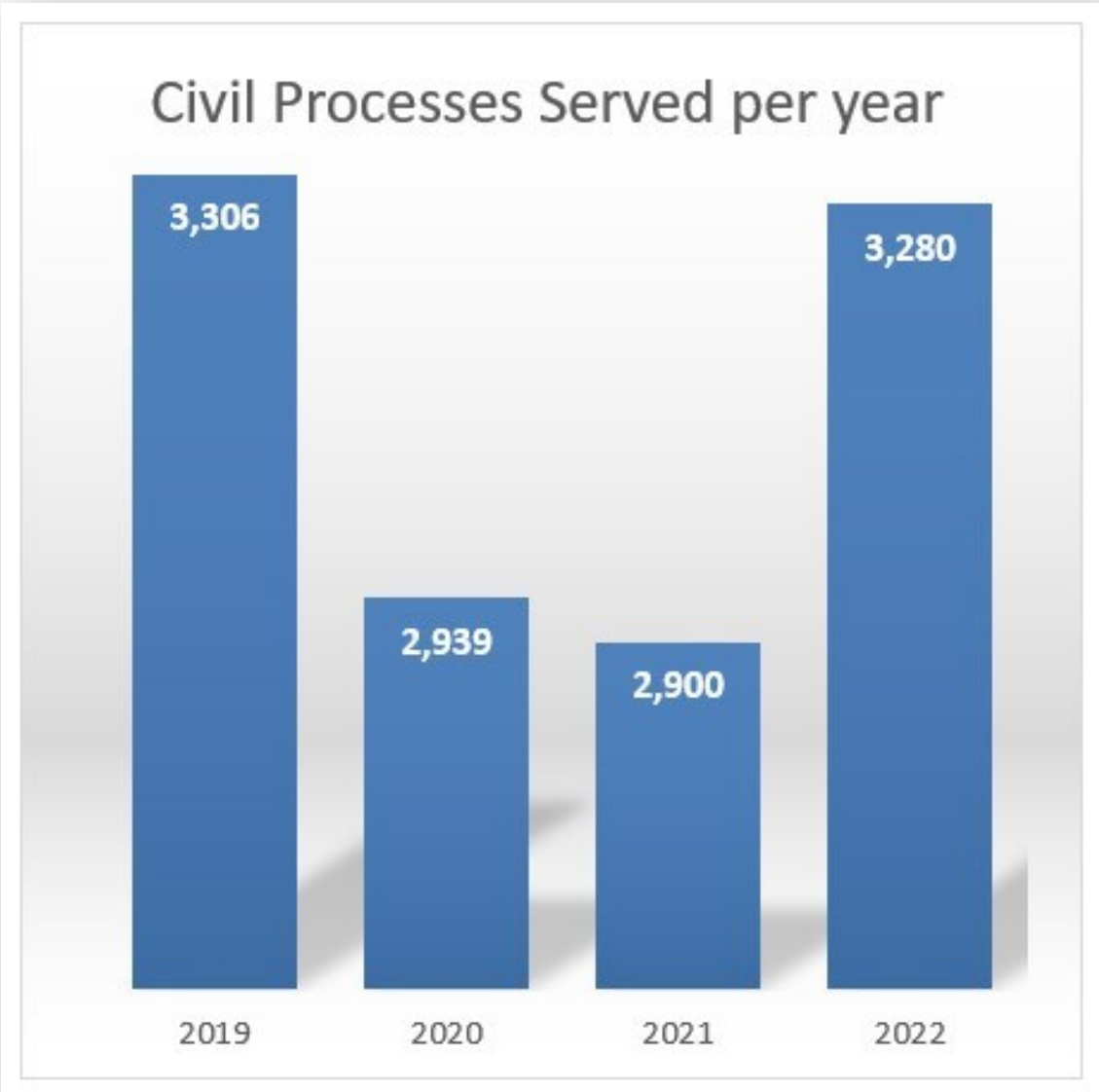

The **Civil** unit provides timely service of all processes brought to the Sheriff's Office, as well as executing court orders relative to civil litigation. Additionally, criminal processes, including bench warrants, summons, and orders are served by this unit.

Civil also takes possession of property pursuant to court orders, conducts Sheriff's sales, and generally serves as the enforcement arm for the civil courts.

Enforcement and management of civil law cases is unique to the Sheriff's Office and is a major responsibility, as well as a major liability, for the Sheriff.

The Sheriff's Office provides two distinct services to the District Court, Juvenile Court, and some justice courts of the First Judicial District. First, deputy sheriffs serve as the bailiff of the court, whose primary duty is to ensure the safety of the judge and court staff. Additionally, bailiffs help maintain order in the courtroom.

Second, deputy sheriffs provide the security of the court complex. This is accomplished through the deputy's uniformed presence in and around the complex. Additional measures include the use of handheld and stationary magnetometers (metal detectors), intelligence gathering, processing of persons or situations which may pose a threat to the security of the court, and arresting violators of the law in or near the court complex.

The deputy sheriffs assigned to the courts enjoy an excellent working relationship with judges, court clerks, attorneys, and patrons.

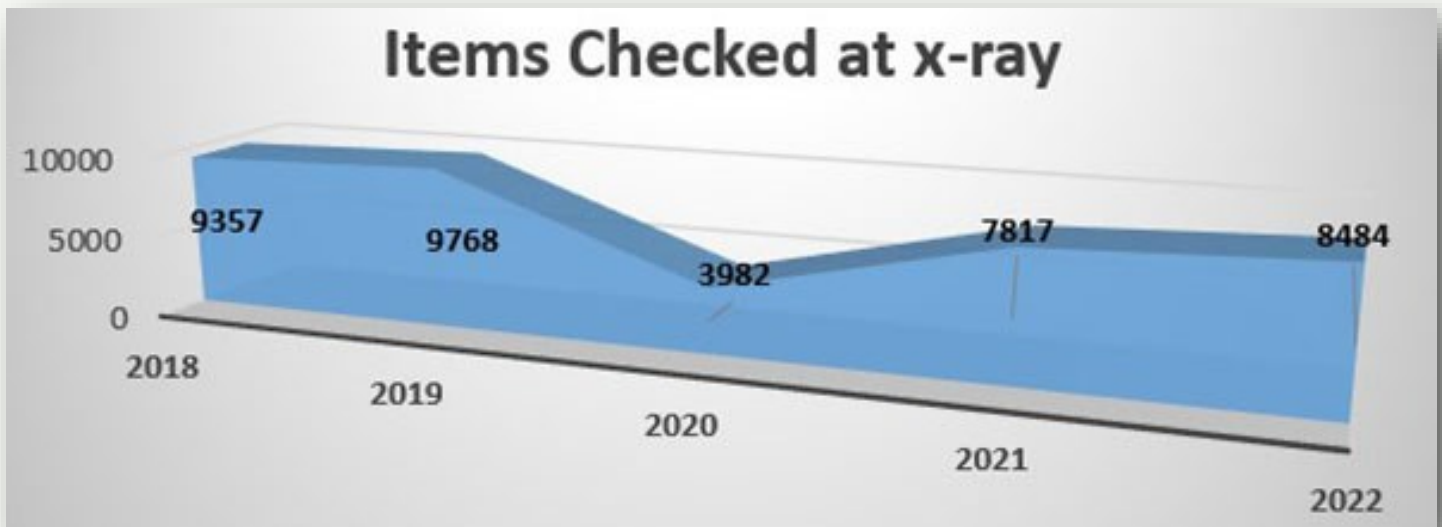

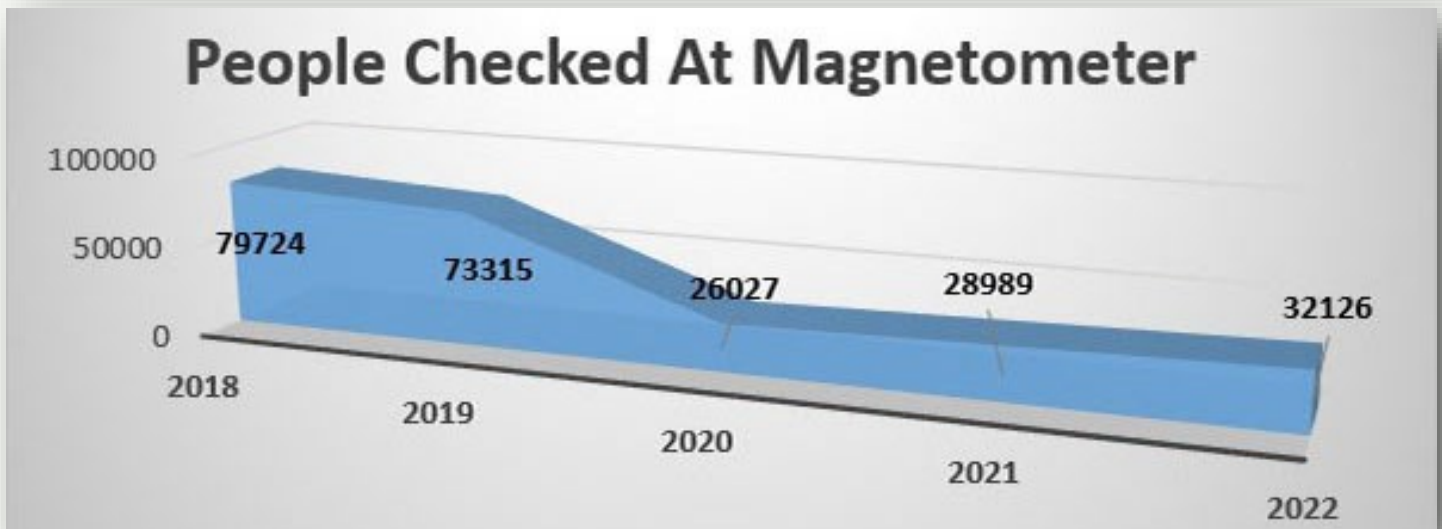

The detectives assigned to **Investigations** are responsible for investigating major crimes in the county.

NIBRS

The concept of National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) was developed by the FBI in the 1980s to provide more comprehensive data for the management of crime in our society. In a NIBRS system, computerized data systems are utilized to collect more detailed information about the crimes that occur. The availability of detailed information stored in a law enforcement agency's records management system database makes for a more comprehensive analysis of criminal activity. The Utah Incident Based Report System was implemented in 1991. In January 2021, all agencies were required to submit using the NIBRS format. The data accepted by the Utah repository is also forwarded to the FBI's NIBRS repository where it is used to depict criminal activity nationwide.

The data from the NIBRS system is not directly comparable to the data from the Summary reports which were retired at the end of 2020. All offenses that occur in a criminal episode are reported, not just the most serious offense. NIBRS data includes the three following categories:

Crimes Against Persons

Crimes Against Persons are those offenses collected in NIBRS whose victims are always individuals. One offense per victim is counted in a Crime Against Person.

Crimes Against Property

Crimes Against Property are offenses in which the object of the crime is to obtain something such as money, property, or some other benefit. Examples include Robbery, Bribery, and Burglary. One offense is counted for each distinct operation of a Crime Against Property except for Motor Vehicle Theft, where one offense is counted for each stolen vehicle.

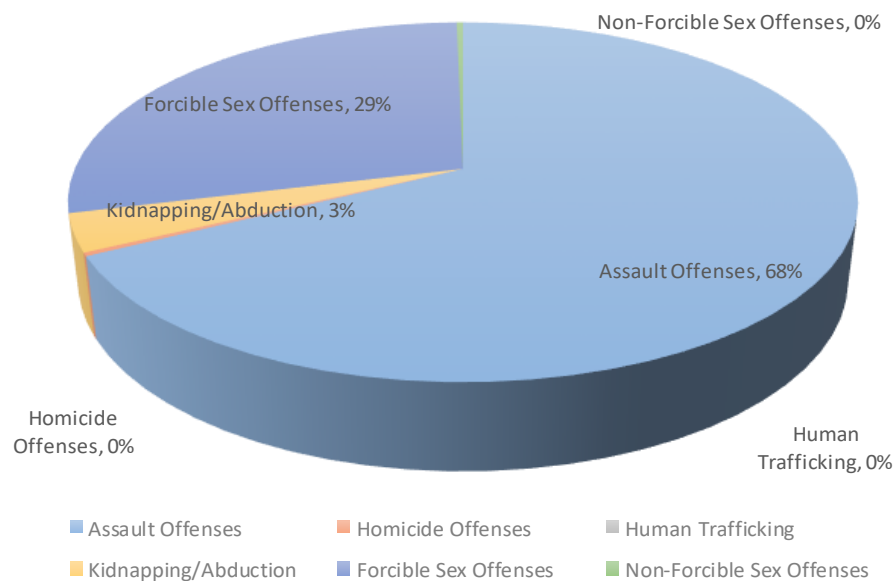
Crimes Against Society

Crimes Against Society are offenses that are classified as those that represent society's prohibition against engaging in certain types of activity. These are not crimes against persons because they do not actually involve an injured party; nor are they against property because property is not the object of the crime. This category includes things such as drug/narcotic offenses, gambling offenses, pornography/obscene material and prostitution offenses.

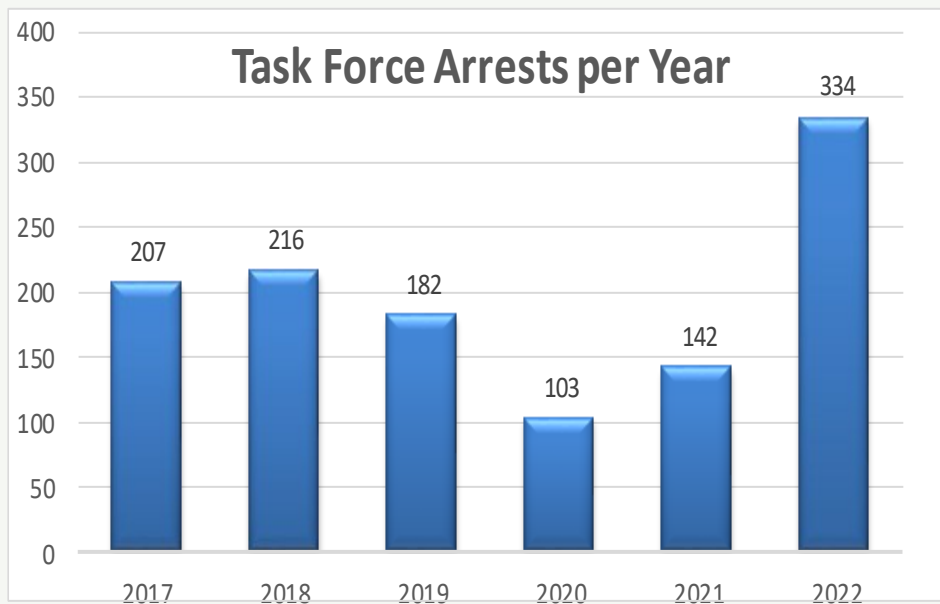

CACHE RICH DRUG TASK FORCE

The **Cache/Rich Drug Task Force** investigates drug related crimes in both Cache and Rich Counties. The Cache/Rich Drug Task Force is made up of five full-time law enforcement officers: three detectives from the Logan City Police Department, one detective from the Cache County Sheriff's Office, and one Logan City Police Department sergeant to supervise the task force. The Task Force also works closely with a Special Agent from the Department of Homeland Security Investigations (HIS) who has been assigned to the Cache County area. The Cache/Rich Drug Task Force also works with the Rich County Sheriff's Office, Smithfield Police Department, North Park Police Department, Utah State University Police Department, and the Cache County Attorney's Office, as well as with Adult Probation and Parole, the Division of Child and Family Services, and other local, state, and federal agencies.

In 2022, the Task Force investigated 483 incidents, executed 59 search warrants, and provided 21 drug education/prevention presentations throughout the year. The Task Force made 334 arrests; the primary offenses were for methamphetamine, heroin, marijuana, firearms violations, and controlled prescription medication, among various other charges.



Case Highlights:

C/S Sale/Man-In In October, the Task Force received information about an individual who was distributing cocaine at the Cache Bar. The individual was identified, and Agents were able to conduct controlled purchase of cocaine from the suspect. Agents developed probable cause for a search warrant for the suspects residence where one hundred twenty-seven grams of cocaine, a half-pound of psilocybin mushrooms, and fourteen thousand dollars in cash was seized.

C/S Sale/Man-In In December, Agents learned the Cache County Jail received mail addressed to an inmate, which appeared to be suspicious. The mail appeared to be legal documents from an attorney office, during further inspection they noticed several of the pages were thicker than others. Agents thoroughly inspected the paperwork and discovered forty Suboxone strips hidden in the paperwork. The inmate who was to receive the mail was charged with possession with the intent to distribute in a correctional facility. Agents have identified the sender of the mail and are currently seeking criminal charges.

C/S Sale/Man-The Task Force assisted the Department of Homeland Security after a suspicious package was reported at a local shipping store. The packaged was opened and one kilogram of cocaine/fentanyl was discovered. The case is currently active.

PROBATION UNIT

Sgt. Chad Kerr

The Cache County Sheriff's Office **Probation** Unit's primary responsibility is to provide a chance for adult offenders to remain in the community through a structured supervision program while providing for community protection. Through this supervision, the offender has the chance to learn the necessary skills to become a member of society that will live within the normal bounds and rules expected of all citizens.

Probation Unit Description:

Founded in July 2020, the Cache County Sheriff's Office Probation Unit took on the supervision of two different programs: pretrial supervision and probation. County probation is able to fill a gap that currently exists between Adult Probation and Parole and private probation companies, specifically dealing with medium to high-risk misdemeanor adult offenders.

The pretrial supervision program is for those adults who have been charged with a criminal offense but have not yet gone through the court process and are found guilty of that offense. Instead of waiting in jail for this process to occur, these individuals are released to the community and placed on a supervision program with the Probation Unit.

Probation is for those adult offenders who have been found guilty of a criminal offense. For many, being placed on probation is an option that can be done in lieu of jail time. While on probation, offenders are held to a set of conditions that helps to keep them accountable while providing treatment options that will hopefully help them in making a positive change in their life.

The Probation Unit is also responsible for writing presentence investigations to help provide the court with information that can help them make fair sentencing. These investigations include: reviewing criminal histories, conducting validated needs/risk assessments on the offender, interviewing offenders, and gathering victim impact statements, and other information that can help the court in reaching their sentencing decision.

Work Diversion

Work Diversion is another work program that offers opportunities for those sentenced to do community service. This program is being used by many of the local courts including First District Court, Logan Municipal Court, and other justice courts. This program provides many benefits to the court system, the community, and to the individuals sentenced to the program.

In 2022, 1,056 hours of community service were offered to 15 different organizations in Cache Valley. These service hours were provided by 132 individuals, for work to be done that otherwise would have had to be paid for by local taxpayers. The Work Diversion program focuses its efforts on assisting non-profit and government agencies, which maximizes the benefit to local taxpayers.

At the same time, this program provides an alternative means of punishment other than incarceration. Many of the individuals who are sentenced to this program are young adults who have committed minor infractions ranging from traffic violations to alcohol violations. These young adults do better working off their fines and punishments than spending several days in jail. By being sentenced to the work diversion program, they can provide a visible benefit to the community, and work off fines that otherwise would be financially burdensome while avoiding negative life lessons that too many incarcerated individuals seem to want to provide to newer inmates.

Sgt. Dave Welker

Emergency Management maintains and assists in training a large pool of volunteer groups. Three groups that are used extensively to aid the Sheriff's Office are Search and Rescue, Explorers and the Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) group.

Search and Rescue

In 2022, The Cache County Sheriff's Office **Search and Rescue** Unit responded to 24 Search and Rescue incidents including; 13 off road medicals (which included three fatal injuries and one fatal aircraft accident), nine missing or overdue person(s) and two out of county Search and Rescue Support Missions.

Search and Rescue volunteers donated 3,128 hours on searches. While some searches took only a few hours, others had multiple days of operations. Search and Rescue volunteers attended 51 trainings and community events during the year, logging 2,182 documented training hours.

Search and Rescue has five volunteer members who are also SAR canine handlers. Both K9s certified on NASAR Avalanche Rescue and one canine is certified as a FEMA Disaster Responder (K9). Hundreds of hours a year are donated by the handlers to train their personal canines to be used for search and rescue needs.

The Cache County Sheriff's Office Search and Rescue team is made up of 38 volunteers. These volunteers not only donate their time, but use of personally owned vehicles, trailers, ATVs, UTVs, snowmobiles, watercraft and other equipment.

The Cache County Sheriff's Office continues to rank in the top six most active search and rescue teams in the state of Utah. By Utah state law, the Sheriff of each county is required to manage all search and rescue operations in their county. This would be an enormous cost to the taxpayers if it were done with paid staff.

ARES Radio Group

In 2022, the **Amateur Radio Emergency Services® Group (ARES)** had 39 active members. These volunteers are licensed amateurs who have registered their qualifications and equipment, with their local ARES leadership, for communications duty in the public service when disaster strikes. They have donated 1,215 hours to the citizens of Cache County.

Explorer Program

Law Enforcement Exploring prepares young men and women for a career in law enforcement by providing educational training on the duties, concepts, purpose, and objectives of the law enforcement profession. The program provides experiences in leadership, career orientation, and community service.

The purpose of the program is to help young adults choose a career path within law enforcement and to challenge them to become responsible citizens of their communities and nation. The Cache County Sheriff's Explorer Program embraces a community service attitude, professionalism, and ethical behavior in all of its members. Through regular meeting attendance, service, training, and practical experiences, Explorers develop character, citizenship, patriotism, physical fitness, and confidence.

In 2022, the Cache County Sheriff's Office Explorer Program consisted of 14 volunteers. They donated over 600 hours to the community, participating in activities such as, The Cache County Fair and Rodeo (burger stand), parades, city celebrations, and National Night Out. They also help out as role-players for CCSO In-Service and police academy training scenarios.

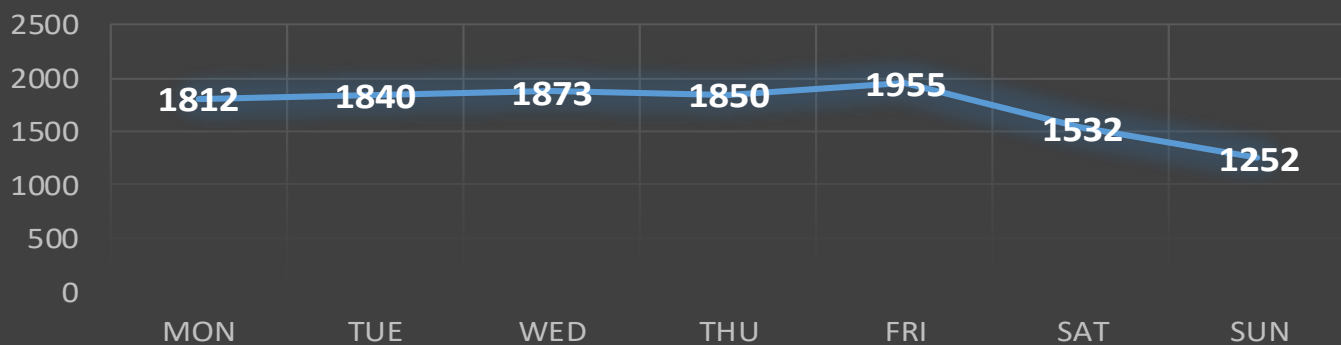

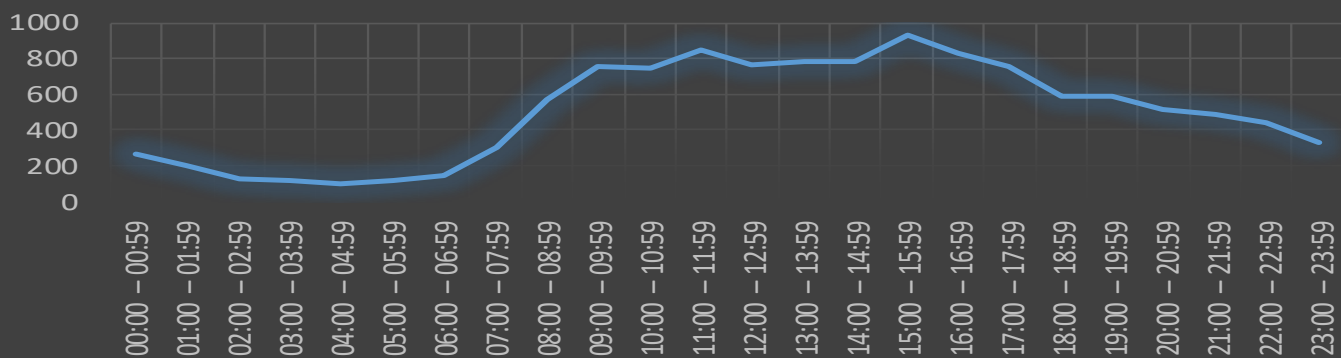
