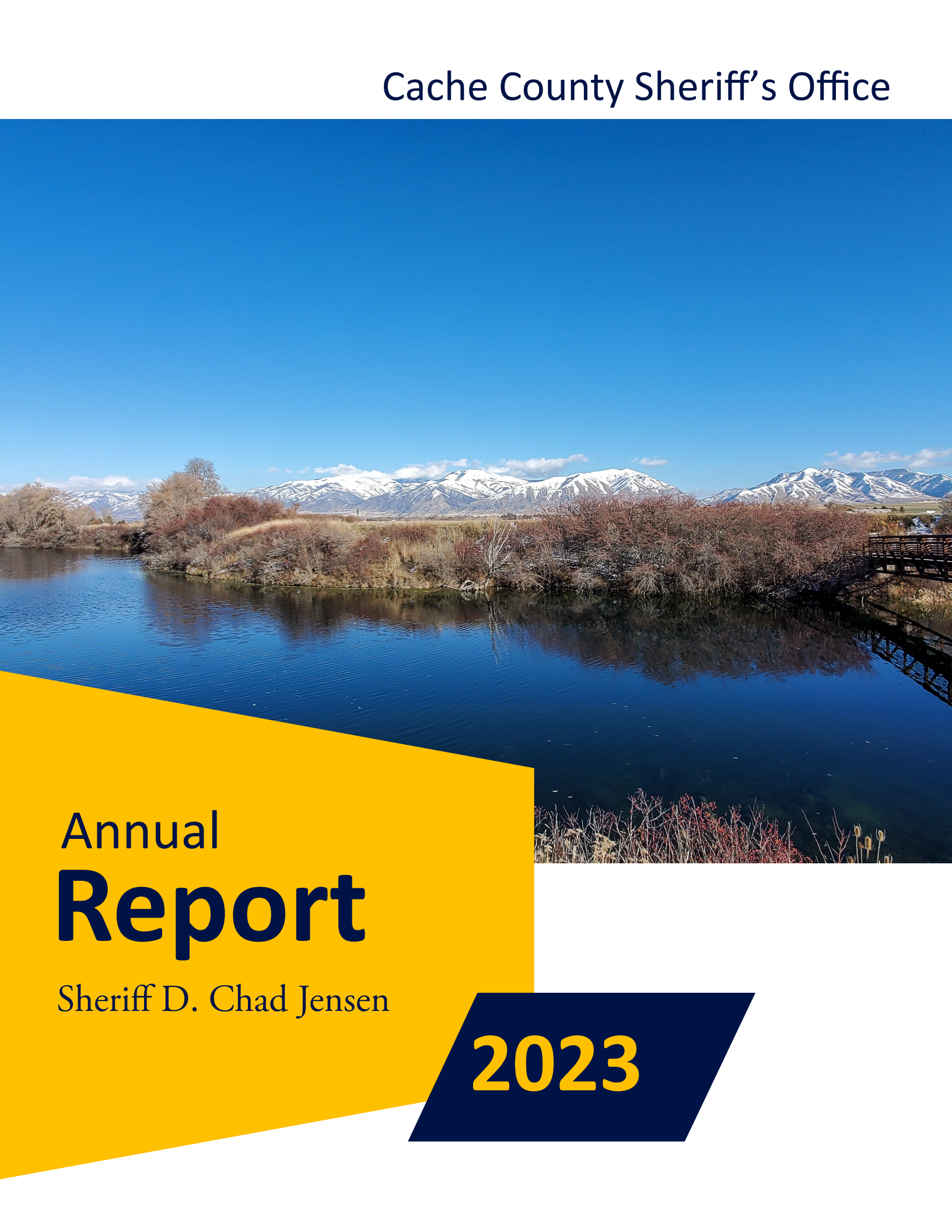

We have closely partnered with the school district and have increased our contract to provide additional School Resource Officers (SROs). We now have deputies assigned to cover all schools in the Cache District, as well as charter schools.

As your Sheriff's Office, our priority is to continuously improve, stay ahead of new legislation, listen to public concerns, and educate our staff to provide the high level of public safety that our community expects and deserves.

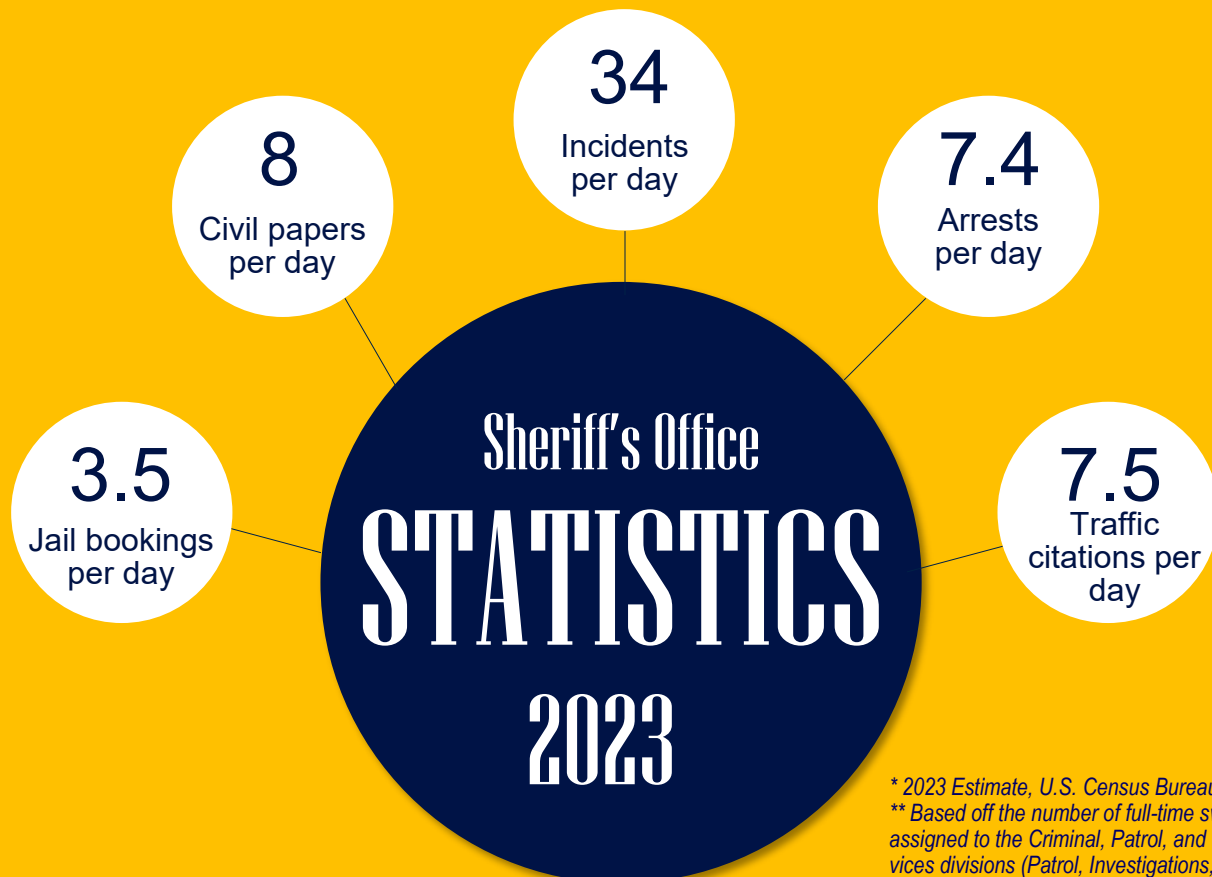
Cache County is located in the Wasatch Front region of Utah.

Command Staff

The Sheriff's Office consists of six executive administrators, including the Sheriff and five Lieutenants. The Sheriff is the only law enforcement leader who is an elected official rather than an appointed one. This position is subject to re-election every four years.

Sheriff D. Chad Jensen

Sheriff Jensen has been with the Cache County Sheriff's Office since 1992. Before becoming Sheriff, he served as a sergeant in both patrol and investigations for over five years. In 2004, he was promoted to Lieutenant, where he supervised and commanded every division of the Sheriff's Office. Sheriff Jensen was sworn in as the twentieth Sheriff of Cache County on January 5, 2015.



Lieutenant Doyle Peck

Lieutenant Doyle Peck began his career at the Cache County Sheriff's Office in 1997. In 2003, he was promoted to Sergeant, where he worked in corrections and served as the Training Sergeant for six years. Appointed as Lieutenant in December 2009, he spent seven years as the Jail Commander and was the Support Services Lieutenant from 2013 to 2015. In 2018, he returned to the Support Services Division, where he currently serves as its Commander.



Lieutenant Mikelshan Bartschi

Lieutenant Mikelshan Bartschi has been a member of the Sheriff's Office since 2000. He spent ten years in Patrol and Investigations before being promoted to Sergeant in 2010. As a Sergeant, he worked in the Jail Division for four years and then returned to patrol for another four years. In 2018, he was promoted to Lieutenant, where he served as Patrol Lieutenant until this year. Recently, he was assigned as the Commander of the newly established Criminal Division.

Lieutenant Roy Hall

Lieutenant Roy Hall started his career with the Sheriff's Office in 2003. He initially served as a deputy and then became a sergeant at the jail for the following 12 years. After that, he was transferred to the Civil Division, where he spent over three years as the Civil Sergeant. In 2018, he was promoted to lieutenant in charge of the jail division, a role he held until this year. He has now been assigned to a new position as Administrative Division Lieutenant.



Lieutenant Candice Hatch

Lieutenant Candice Hatch began her career with the Sheriff's Office in 2005. She initially served as a deputy in various roles, including corrections, court duties, patrol, and investigations. In 2018, she was promoted to sergeant, where she spent two and a half years as a patrol sergeant and nearly three years as the Investigations Sergeant. In 2023, she made history by becoming the first female lieutenant at the Cache County Sheriff's Office when she was promoted to Lieutenant and Commander of the Jail Division.



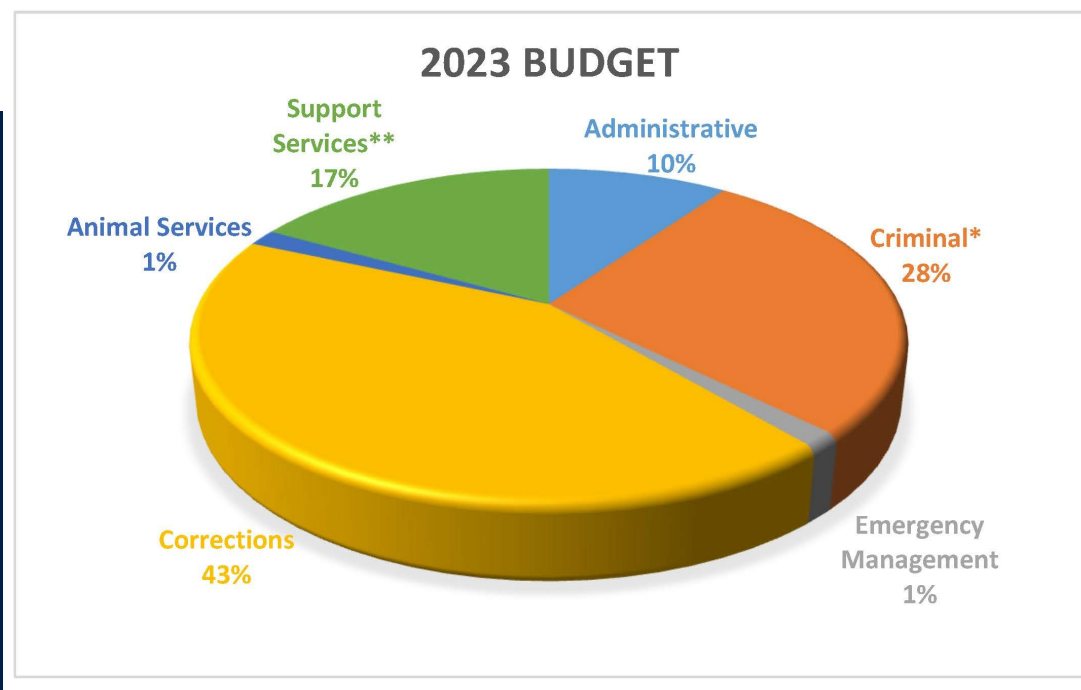
Lieutenant Timothy Ramirez

Lieutenant Timothy Ramirez has been serving with the Sheriff's Office since 2004. He has a diverse background that includes roles in criminal investigations, patrol, SWAT, and corrections. Lt. Ramirez was promoted to sergeant in 2016, where he spent nearly four years as a patrol sergeant and over three years as the Investigations Sergeant. In 2023, he was promoted to lieutenant, and he currently oversees the Patrol Division.

Lifesaving Awards

The Lifesaving Ribbon is presented to an employee who was directly involved in saving the life of another; for actions, if not taken, would most likely result in the death of a person, whether on or off duty.

JAIL DIVISION

Sergeant Matthew Butler, Deputies McQuade Allen, Brock Byington and Christian Bos

On January 24, 2023, an employee of the Cache County Sheriff's Office experienced a personal crisis while off duty and alone at home. Throughout the day, this individual had been in contact with friends, family, and off-duty co-workers via text messages. However, they sent one very concerning message and then stopped responding to all texts and calls.

Recognizing the situation, Sergeant Butler and Deputies Allen, Byington, and Bos took it upon themselves to check on their co-worker. They responded to the individual's home and discovered that they were facing a serious medical emergency.

The deputies did everything they could to assist their co-worker and friend. Their commitment to recognizing and responding to someone in distress ensured that this individual received the medical care they needed, likely saving their life.

**Deputies Brandon Lucas and Randi Jo Edvalson
Nurses Kenlee Jenkins and Jessica Oliva**

On March 1, 2023, Deputy Lucas and Nurse Jenkins noticed an inmate behaving strangely. Before they could transport him to the hospital, he began to have a seizure. Deputies and medical personnel responded immediately, providing oxygen and protecting the inmate's head to prevent injury from hitting the walls or floor during the seizure.

During this incident, the inmate lost consciousness and stopped breathing. Deputies Edvalson and Lucas, along with nurses Jenkins and Oliva, administered CPR until the inmate began to breathe on his own. They recognized that the inmate was exhibiting symptoms consistent with an opiate overdose and administered Naloxone. Shortly after this intervention, the inmate regained consciousness and stabilized.

JAIL DIVISION

Deputy Brock Byington

On November 11, 2022, an inmate was arrested in connection with a serious criminal case. Unbeknownst to the jail staff, this individual was deeply depressed and had thoughts of self-harm. The new criminal charges significantly impacted his mental state, leaving him feeling embarrassed, mentally unwell, and ashamed. When jail and medical staff screened him for suicidal ideations, he insisted that he was fine and had no thoughts of suicide.

Shortly after being booked into the jail, the inmate was permitted to use the booking restroom. After a brief period, Deputy Byington noticed that the inmate was unresponsive and found him kneeling in front of the toilet. The individual's face had turned blue, and he had a long-sleeve shirt tied tightly around his neck.

Deputy Byington acted quickly to remove the shirt from the inmate's neck. Once freed, the inmate's color began to return, and he received the urgent medical and mental health care he needed. Had it not been for Deputy Byington's swift actions, this individual could have successfully taken his own life. There is no doubt that he is alive today because of Deputy Byington's intervention.



PATROL DIVISION

Deputies Jake Leonard, Austin Clark, Robert Price, Kevin Schaaf and Dallas Neibert

On March 3, 2023, deputies received a report about a male individual attempting to break into a home. The suspect had shattered a basement window and entered the house. Deputy Clark observed a male through the window who was covered in blood. Since the homeowner and their family were still inside, deputies decided to kick in the front door and enter the home.

As deputies were entering, the suspect fled through the broken window. They apprehended the suspect and began administering medical treatment for his deep lacerations. The deputies applied a tourniquet to his severely bleeding arm and provided other lifesaving first aid. The suspect, who was only wearing sweatpants, was also given a hypothermia blanket to keep him warm until paramedics arrived.

Later, the emergency room doctors stated that the suspect might have survived only a few more minutes if the bleeding had not been controlled. The deputies did an excellent job responding to a dangerous and volatile situation, potentially saving the suspect's life as well as the lives of the family involved.

Outstanding Achievement

The Outstanding Achievement Award is presented to a deputy or staff member that excel in the performance of their duty above and beyond that which is required during their daily course of work. They have exercised competence and have been able to inspire others to improve the quality of their work.

JAIL DIVISION

Deputy Randi Jo Edvalson

Deputy Edvalson serves as the classification deputy at the jail, a crucial role in maintaining the safety and security of both staff and inmates. Any errors in the classification process can impact physical safety and expose the County to liability.

With a keen attention to detail, Deputy Edvalson collaborates closely with on-duty security staff, medical personnel, and other correctional facilities to ensure that inmates are classified accurately. Her work quality has been exceptional, which led to her being assigned a significant task in August 2022.

This task involved a Level 1 search of the Cache County Jail, the most intrusive search the staff can conduct. It required extensive staff involvement and typically includes several specialized teams, such as the SERT Team, the Gang Team, K-9 deputies, partnering agencies, and additional line-level staff. The search lasted nearly 24 hours and uncovered numerous items of contraband, including some deadly weapons, ultimately making the jail a much safer environment. Deputy Edvalson led this operation with near-flawless execution, earning her great respect from both supervisors and colleagues.

Additionally, Deputy Edvalson frequently collaborates with the drug task force to address issues related to dangerous drugs brought into the jail by female arrestees. She regularly volunteers to assist all shifts in searching female arrestees entering the facility. Moreover, she works with the Sheriff's Office Gang Task Force to gather intelligence on gang activity, contributing to the safety of both the jail and the community.

JAIL DIVISION

Deputy Mark Fishburn

Deputy Mark Fishburn is the kind of employee everyone knows; if you want something done right, you ask him to do it. For over three years, he has managed the inmate and jail supplies, ensuring that our facility is equipped with all the necessities for more than 300 residents every day. This role is not only time-consuming but also physically demanding. However, Deputy Fishburn embraces this challenge, continuously seeking ways to improve the program and enhance efficiency and organization.

His proactive planning and attention to emergency preparedness proved invaluable during the supply chain issues that arose during the 2020 pandemic. Without his dedication, the jail could have faced significant difficulties. Deputy Fishburn is committed to ensuring that our tax dollars are spent wisely, carefully verifying that each purchased item is of high quality and reasonably priced.

In addition to managing supplies—a task that could easily take up all of his time—Deputy Fishburn also fulfills line-level duties and volunteers for new assignments and projects. This past year, he took the initiative to clean, paint, and label the jail's walls, floors, and doors. He also revamped what the jail refers to as a "crash cart," which holds the supplies needed for deputies to respond quickly to emergencies.

JAIL DIVISION

Deputy Duncan Wright

Over the past year, Deputy Wright has served as the Inmate Programs Deputy. In this role, he has achieved significant success in building strong relationships with the citizens of Cache County and the volunteers who provide essential programming for inmates.

This position involves developing and maintaining solid partnerships with local volunteers, religious organizations, educational institutions, and various non-profit organizations that offer services to inmates. Deputy Wright tailors the inmate programming schedule to meet each inmate's unique needs and requirements. Creating this schedule requires intense focus and diligent work for its development, maintenance, and management. Co-workers, supervisors, and inmates frequently commend Deputy Wright for his empathy, helpfulness, kindness, and expertise.

He has been actively involved with the Cache County School District, facilitating numerous opportunities for high school students to participate in the jail's Project Reality program. Project Reality is an educational initiative that has received high praise from both participating students and educators, who recognize its inherent value. Inmates also gain a sense of worth and validation by sharing their stories with the younger generation, encouraging them to choose a different path in life.

In 2022, Deputy Wright was honored with the Adult Education Association of Utah's Community Partner of the Year Award and received several letters of thanks and appreciation from students and schools throughout Cache Valley.

PATROL DIVISION

Deputy Senicca Holt

Deputy Senicca Holt has consistently demonstrated strong leadership abilities. In early 2022, she was part of the team that apprehended a suspect in an armed robbery and provided lifesaving care to the individual.

As a member of the Peer Support team, Deputy Holt regularly reaches out to colleagues in need. She has recently completed her training to become certified in Negotiations for SWAT, a skill that proved invaluable when she responded to a peer in crisis. This individual was intoxicated, armed with a handgun, and expressed intentions to end their life. Deputy Holt showed the compassion and empathy needed to help this person see beyond their immediate circumstances.

This year has brought significant changes to Deputy Holt's career, including her new role as a NOVA instructor for fifth-grade elementary classes and her position as the primary School Resource Officer (SRO) for the alternative school within the Cache County School District.

Deputy Holt has shown leadership from the front lines and has actively engaged in several sensitive areas of our department. She continuously strives to acquire new skills, takes on new challenges, and excels in her endeavors.

SUPPORT SERVICES DIVISION

Detective Doug Thorson

Deputy Doug Thorson joined the Investigations Unit in 2019 and has since embraced various roles, significantly contributing to the Investigations Division with his knowledge and experience. Doug is skilled in investigating a wide range of crimes, from financial offenses to homicide cases. Additionally, when our office became more involved with the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) initiative, he volunteered to take on those cases.

Few employees at the Cache County Sheriff's Office possess the same level of experience as Doug. However, he remains humble and is always willing to share his expertise to help others improve. He is an active instructor for the Sheriff's Office, a Peer Support team member, and a fantastic team player.

Mark Esper once said, "Stay focused on your mission, remain steadfast in your pursuit of excellence, and always do the right thing." Detective Thorson truly embodies this statement, and the Investigations Unit is better off because of his service.

SUPPORT SERVICES DIVISION

KellyAnne Leavitt

KellyAnne Leavitt has been a vital member of the Cache County Sheriff's Office Investigations Unit since early 2019. Throughout her time in this role, she has taken on various responsibilities and has become an integral part of the division.

From the outset, KellyAnne fully embraced her position, providing invaluable support to the detectives. She has assisted with warrant services and the related documentation, as well as with evidence documentation and submission. KellyAnne has ensured that interview recordings are completed and accessible for submission, aided in the transcription of reports, managed duties related to the Sex Offender Registry, and most recently, has become the BCI TAC for the Sheriff's Office.

In addition to her operational duties, KellyAnne actively seeks ways to maintain high morale among the detectives. She organizes activities for the team and looks out for their well-being on a daily basis. She offers emotional support during challenging times and takes many self-initiated actions that significantly enhance the environment within the Investigations Unit. Her enthusiasm for her responsibilities has earned her the respect of her colleagues and solidified her role as a valued team member.

Deputy of the Year

Detective Tyson Nielsen

The Deputy of the Year Award is presented to a deputy or other staff member for exceptional or distinguished service during the year.

Detective Tyson Nielsen has been a part of the Cache/Rich Drug Task Force for the past two years, representing the Sheriff's Office with excellence. He embraced his role with enthusiasm, improving relationships with fellow task force members and establishing long-lasting connections with various agencies. His hard work and dedication to the job have earned him numerous accolades from the LCPD administration.

Thanks to his efforts, several significant drug seizures have taken place. One notable operation involved a raid on a large group of homes and outbuildings in Logan. During this raid, not only were drugs seized, but a child was also discovered living in horrific conditions. Thanks to Detective Nielsen's involvement, the child was removed from those conditions and placed in a safer environment.

Unit Citation

PATROL DIVISION

Deputies Cody Atwood, Robert Price, and Enrique Meza

On January 3, 2023, at approximately 1:00 AM, Deputy Price was assigned to a call concerning a suicidal juvenile who was planning to drive off a cliff in Logan Canyon. While searching for the vehicle in Logan Canyon, Deputy Meza observed a car speeding east toward Garden City and attempted to initiate a traffic stop; however, the vehicle continued to flee.

As the acting Officer in Charge (OIC), Deputy Atwood recognized the potential danger of pursuing a suicidal driver through the dark, snowy canyon and decided to call off the pursuit. Deputy Meza terminated the chase, hoping this would encourage the driver to slow down and prevent a crash.

Concerned that the subject might have entered Rich County, Deputy Atwood requested assistance from Rich County; however, they were unable to respond. He then instructed Deputy Meza to continue searching for the vehicle in Rich County. Shortly thereafter, Deputy Meza located the subject's vehicle, which was stuck in a snow embankment. The driver was non-compliant, refusing to exit the vehicle and locking themselves inside.

After Deputy Price arrived to assist, the deputies breached the window of the vehicle, allowing them to safely extract the subject.

These deputies deserve commendation for their courageous actions. Deputy Atwood demonstrated strong leadership and extraordinary decision-making. Deputy Meza exhibited quick thinking in a high-speed, high-stress situation and showed determination in locating the juvenile. Deputy Price recognized the urgency of the situation and made the critical decision to break the window to ensure the driver received the medical attention they needed.

PATROL DIVISION

Deputies Todd Higbee, Skyler Jensen, and Senicca Holt

On April 19, 2022, Deputies Todd Higbee, Skyler Jensen, and Senicca Holt played a crucial role in apprehending an armed robbery suspect. This incident involved a police pursuit, an officer-involved shooting, and the provision of lifesaving care to the suspect.

While on patrol, the deputies received a call regarding an armed home invasion robbery. The suspect had entered a residence armed with a rifle and stolen the homeowner's minivan. The stolen vehicle was later spotted by deputies, who initiated a pursuit.

The chase ended at a dead-end road, where the suspect exited the vehicle while still armed with the rifle. To neutralize the threat to the community, officers fired at the suspect. After the suspect was down but still in possession of the rifle, Deputies Higbee, Jensen, and Holt formed a team, moved in to secure the individual, and provided emergency medical treatment until medical personnel arrived.

Medal of Valor

The Medal of Valor is presented to a deputy for outstanding bravery in the line of duty, where the employee risks loss of life with knowledge of the danger involved or where a reasonable person would assume life and personal safety was in great danger.

PATROL DIVISION

Sgt. Timothy Ramirez

On April 19, 2022, Sergeant Tim Ramirez led his team in the apprehension of an armed robbery suspect. This incident involved a pursuit, an officer-involved shooting, and the provision of lifesaving care to the suspect.

The situation began with a call about an armed home invasion robbery. The suspect had entered a house armed with a rifle and stolen the homeowner's minivan. Deputies later spotted the stolen vehicle and initiated a pursuit. Sergeant Ramirez provided clear guidelines for the other responding deputies to ensure a successful interdiction.

When the pursuit ended on a dead-end road, the suspect lunged from the vehicle, still armed with the rifle. Recognizing the immediate danger to the citizens of the county, Sergeant Ramirez responded with gunfire.

Afterward, Sergeant Ramirez and the other deputies approached the suspect and administered emergency medical treatment until medical units arrived.

PATROL DIVISION

Deputy Mike Richardson

Deputy Mike Richardson played a crucial role in apprehending an armed robbery suspect. This incident included a pursuit, an officer-involved shooting, and the provision of lifesaving care to the offender.

While on patrol, Deputy Richardson received radio reports about an armed home invasion robbery that had just occurred. The suspect, armed with a rifle, had entered a house and stolen the homeowner's minivan. Shortly thereafter, deputies located the stolen vehicle and initiated a pursuit.

The chase ended on a dirt road near a residence. Understanding the potential danger to the homeowners, Deputy Richardson deliberately positioned his vehicle between the suspect and the house. This courageous act placed him in a perilous situation, especially since the suspect had already fired at others.

Afterward, Deputy Richardson assisted fellow deputies in providing lifesaving medical care to the offender until paramedics arrived. As outlined in the mission statement of the Cache County Sheriff's Office, one of the primary responsibilities is to protect the community. Deputy Richardson's actions exemplified his commitment to fulfilling this mission and demonstrated the highest standards of law enforcement in safeguarding lives.

The Sheriff Administrative Division operates under the Sheriff and oversees the overall functioning of the Sheriff's Office by providing essential administrative and logistical support to all divisions within the organization.

EXECUTIVE ASSISTANT/OFFICE MANAGER

The Executive Assistant supports the executive team by handling administrative tasks, which include organizing meetings and compiling agendas. This role also involves maintaining contracts, managing expense reports, and ensuring the seamless operation of the office by overseeing office equipment and ordering supplies.

EVIDENCE ROOM TECHNICIAN

The Evidence Room Technician is responsible for maintaining the legal chain of custody for evidence. This includes preparing and keeping accurate records of evidence receipt, storage, release, and destruction.

TRANSCRIPTION

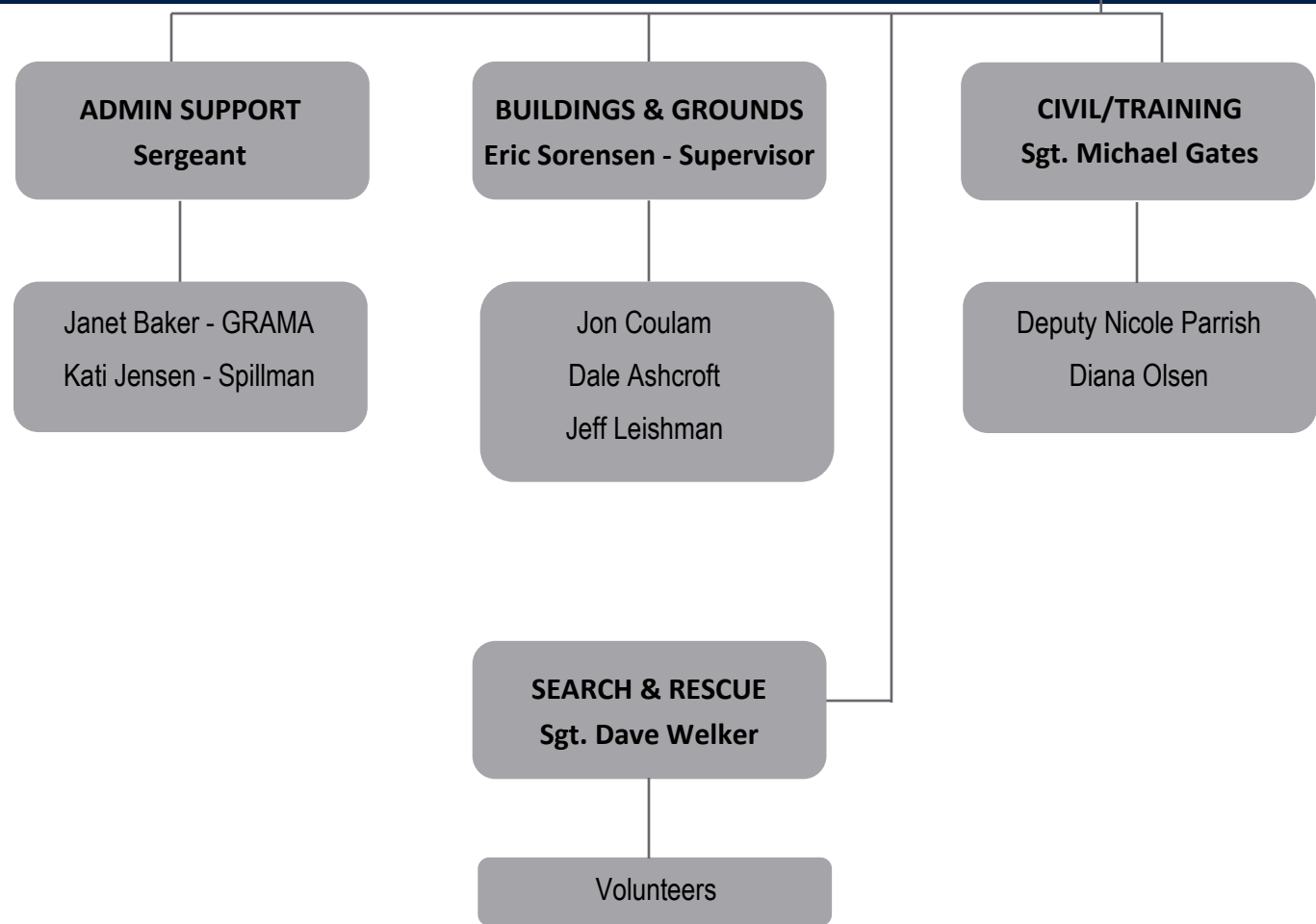
Transcriptionists listen to audio recordings and convert them into written texts. They also compile and report all data for NIBRS (The National Incident-Based Reporting System), the national standard for crime data reporting in the United States.

SOCIAL MEDIA SPECIALIST

The Social Media Specialist creates, manages, and analyzes content for the Sheriff's Office's Facebook and Instagram pages to engage with the citizens of Cache County.

Administrative Division

The Administrative Division of the Cache County Sheriff's Office is committed to ensuring the efficient and effective operation of public safety services. Its responsibilities encompass a wide range of essential services that support the overall mission of the Sheriff's Office.

TRAINING

We provide comprehensive training programs for new recruits and personnel, ensuring that everyone is equipped with the latest knowledge and skills to effectively serve our community.

CIVIL

Our team is responsible for serving subpoenas, protective orders, summons, and other civil and criminal process documents, ensuring that all legal processes are carried out smoothly and accurately.

SEARCH AND RESCUE

The Search and Rescue volunteer team, supervised by a sergeant, is prepared to respond to emergencies and assist in locating and helping individuals in need of rescue.

CONTRACTS, FLEET AND UNIFORM MANAGEMENT

This division handles contracts related to the Sheriff's Office operations and services, manages the vehicle fleet, and oversees the firearms and weapons arsenal. We ensure that all vehicles, firearms, and equipment are properly maintained and ready for use. Additionally, we are responsible for procuring, distributing, and tracking the uniforms and equipment necessary for deputy sheriffs to perform their duties safely and efficiently.

INTERNAL AFFAIRS

We conduct thorough investigations into internal matters to maintain high standards of accountability and integrity within the Sheriff's Office.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS

We oversee the maintenance of all Sheriff's Office buildings and grounds. Our operations include three campuses: the Sheriff's Office Complex and Jail Facility (including a greenhouse and several outbuildings), a fully equipped animal shelter (featuring an impound facility and adoption center), and an Emergency Services Building Complex.

SPILLMAN

The Spillman Applications Administrator coordinates the implementation, maintenance, troubleshooting, and training related to Spillman software used by the Sheriff's Office.

GRAMA

The GRAMA clerk processes requests for government records under the Government Records Access and Management Act (GRAMA). They determine the classification of records (public, private, or protected) and approve or deny requests accordingly.

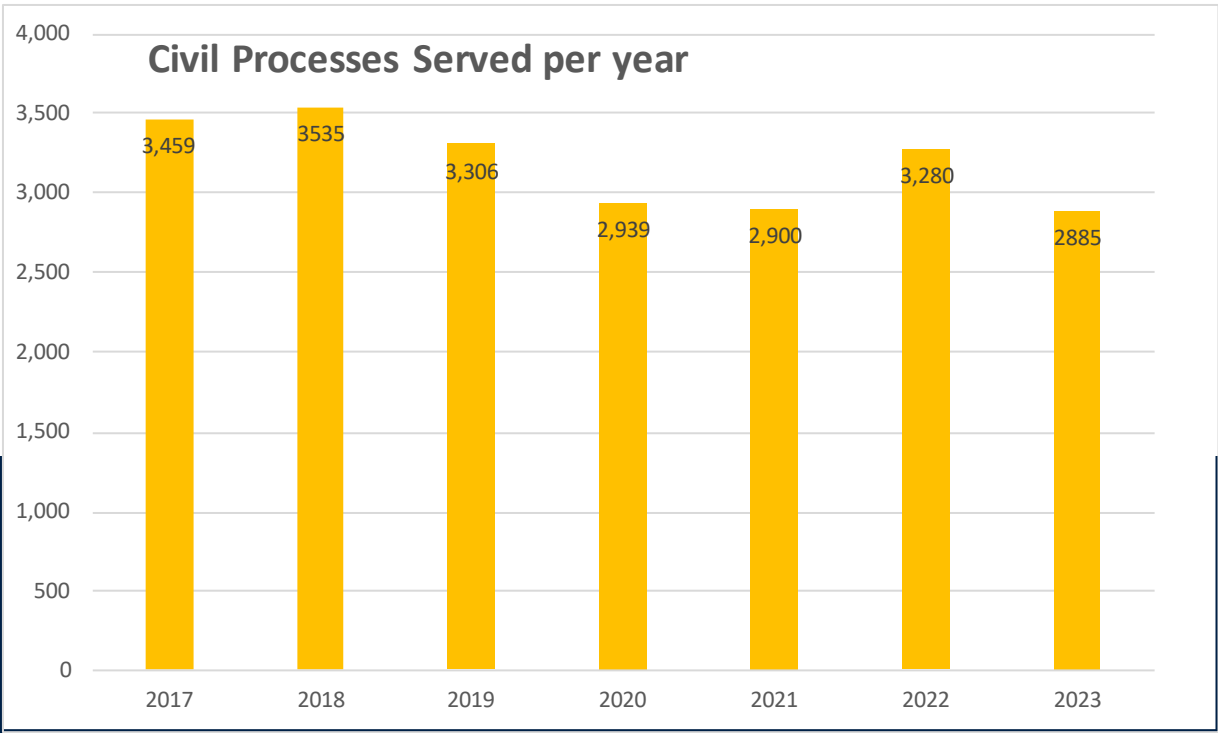
The Administrative Division is committed to excellence in all its endeavors, continuously striving to support deputy sheriffs and enhance the safety and well-being of Cache County.

Civil Division

Sgt. Michael Gates

The Civil Unit of the Cache County Sheriff's Office is committed to serving civil and criminal process papers. Managing and enforcing civil law cases is a unique responsibility of the Sheriff's Office, representing both a significant duty and a considerable liability for the Sheriff.

This unit ensures the timely service of all documents brought to the Sheriff's Office and executes court orders related to civil litigation. It also handles criminal processes, including bench warrants, summons, and orders. Furthermore, the Civil Unit takes possession of property in accordance with court orders, conducts Sheriff Sales, and serves as the enforcement arm for the civil courts. Notably, the average civil paper submitted to this office is processed and returned, on average, within two days of arrival, achieving a level of efficiency unmatched by any other agency of our size in the state.



ARES Radio Group

In 2023, the Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) had 39 active members. These volunteers are licensed amateurs who have registered their qualifications and equipment with local ARES leadership for communications duty in public service during disasters. They have contributed a total of 1,215 hours to serve the citizens of Cache County.

Search & Rescue

Sgt. Dave Welker

In 2023, the Cache County Sheriff's Office Search and Rescue Unit responded to a total of 24 incidents. These incidents included off-road medical emergencies, cases of missing or overdue individuals, and support missions for search and rescue operations outside of the county.

The dedicated Search and Rescue volunteers contributed an impressive 5,496 hours to various search efforts. While some searches lasted just a few hours, others stretched over several days. Additionally, volunteers participated in 83 training sessions and community events throughout the year, accumulating 2,520 documented training hours.

The team includes five volunteer members who serve as search and rescue canine handlers. The dogs are certified in NASAR Avalanche Rescue, and one canine holds certification as a FEMA Disaster Responder. The handlers invest hundreds of hours each year in training their dogs for search and rescue operations.

The Cache County Sheriff's Office Search and Rescue team consists of 39 volunteers. These individuals not only give their time but also use their personal vehicles, trailers, ATVs, UTVs, snowmobiles, watercraft, and other equipment to assist in operations.

The Cache County Sheriff's Office continues to rank among the top eight most active Search and Rescue teams in Utah. According to Utah state law, the sheriff of each county is responsible for managing all search and rescue operations within their jurisdiction. Conducting these operations with paid staff would represent a significant cost to taxpayers.

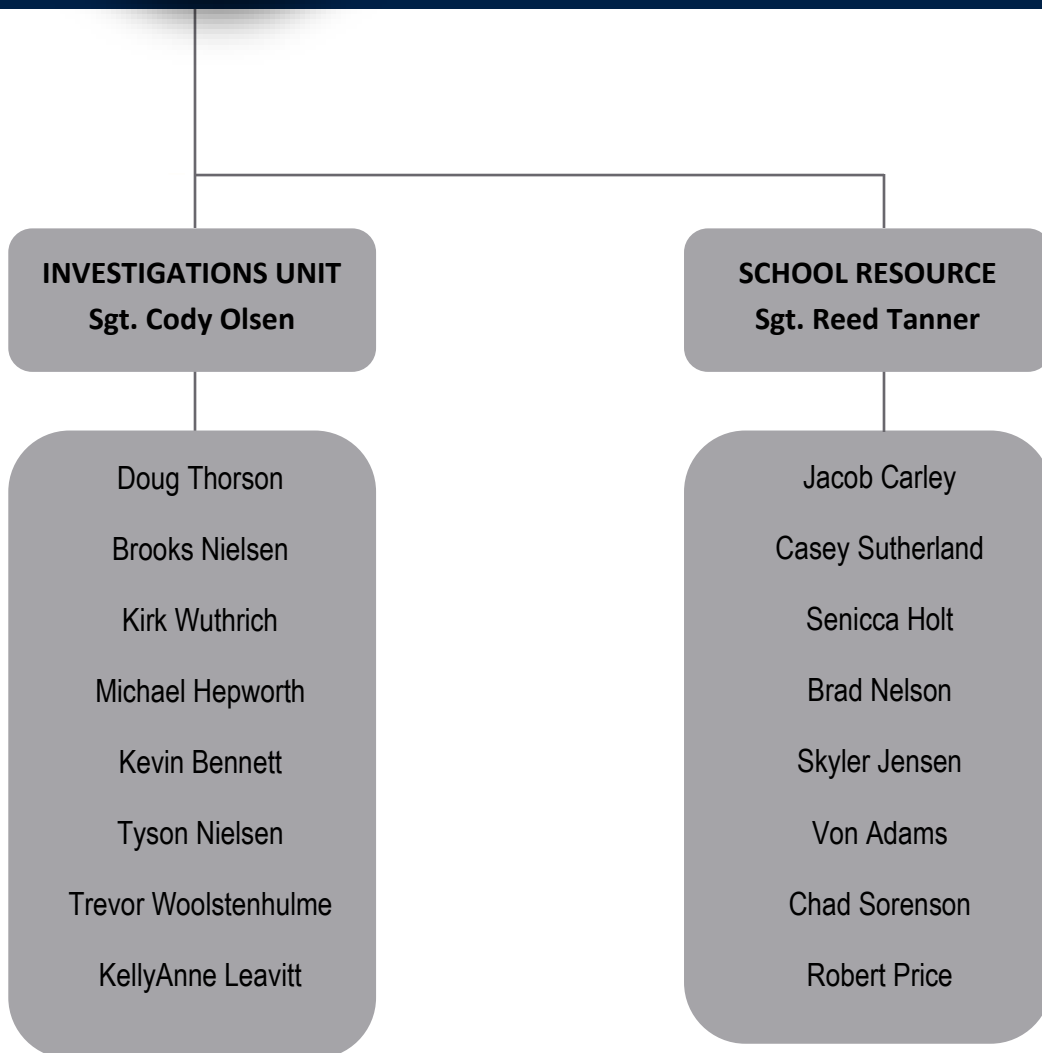

Criminal Division

Investigations Unit

Sgt. Cody Olsen

The detectives assigned to the Investigations Unit are responsible for investigating major crimes in the county. This unit consists of one sergeant, seven detectives, and an administrative assistant. When a crime occurs, a patrol deputy responds, takes the initial report, and concludes the investigation if possible. If further follow-up is needed, the case can be referred to a detective.

We have detectives who specialize in "crimes against persons," which include assaults, robbery, child abuse, and sexual abuse. Additionally, there are detectives assigned to handle "property crimes," such as thefts, burglaries, and fraud.

Each detective is highly trained in their respective field and has completed hundreds of hours of training in areas such as child abuse, death scene investigation, and various forensic subjects.

One detective is specifically assigned to the Cache/Rich Drug Task Force. This detective collaborates with other officers to investigate narcotics violations in Cache and Rich counties. The task force addresses a variety of illegal drug offenses including drug possession, distribution, prescription drug offenses, and methamphetamine labs.

NATIONAL INCIDENT BASED REPORTING SYSTEM (NIBRS)

The National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) was developed by the FBI in the 1980s to provide more comprehensive data for managing crime in our society. In a NIBRS system, computerized data systems are used to collect detailed information about the crimes that occur. This detailed information, stored in a law enforcement agency's records management system, allows for a more thorough analysis of criminal activity.

In Utah, the Incident Based Reporting System was implemented in 1991. As of January 2021, all agencies are required to submit data using the NIBRS format. The data collected by the Utah repository is forwarded to the FBI's NIBRS repository, where it helps to illustrate criminal activity nationwide.

It is important to note that NIBRS data is not directly comparable to the data from the summary reports, which were retired at the end of 2020. NIBRS reports all offenses that occur in a criminal episode, not just the most serious offense. NIBRS data includes three main categories:

1. Crimes against persons

These are offenses in which the victims are always individuals. In this category, one offense is counted per victim.

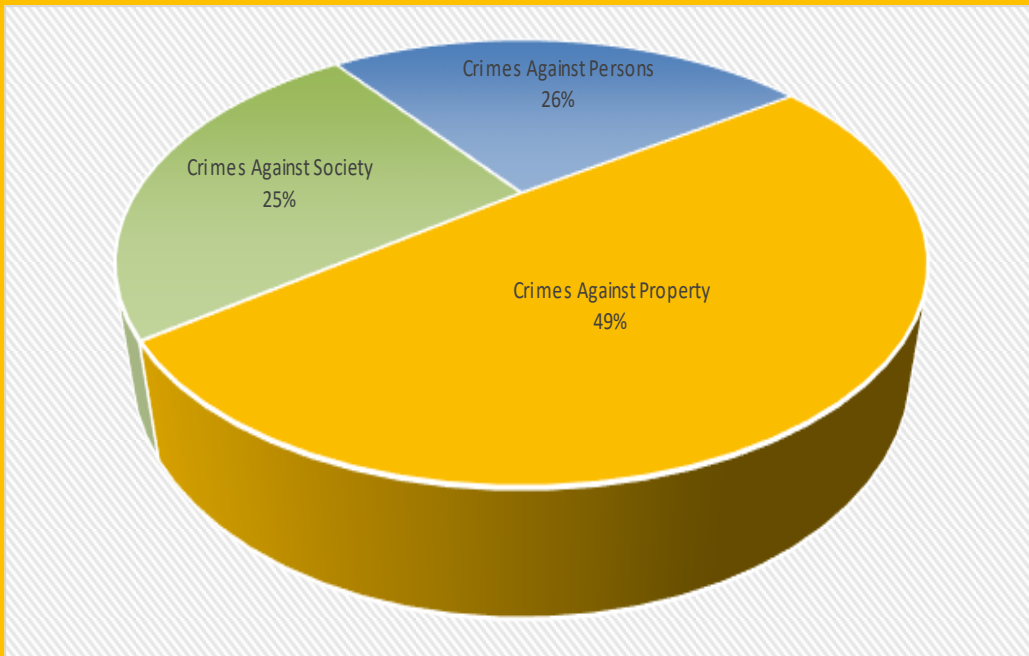
2. Crimes against property

These offenses involve obtaining something of value, such as money or property. Examples include robbery, bribery, and burglary. In this category, one offense is counted for each distinct act, except for motor vehicle theft, where one offense is counted for each stolen vehicle.

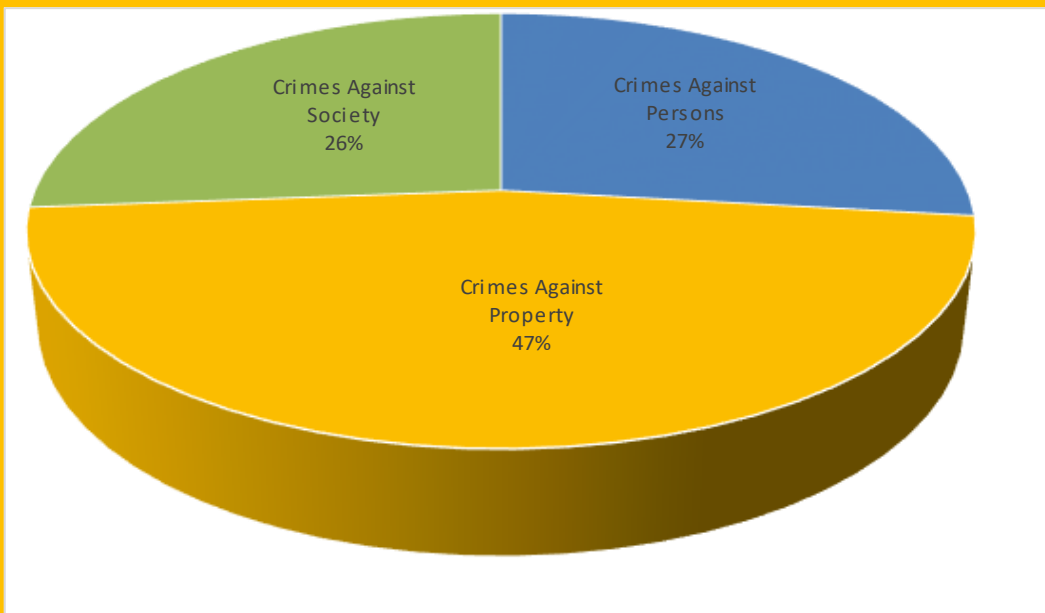
3. Crimes against society

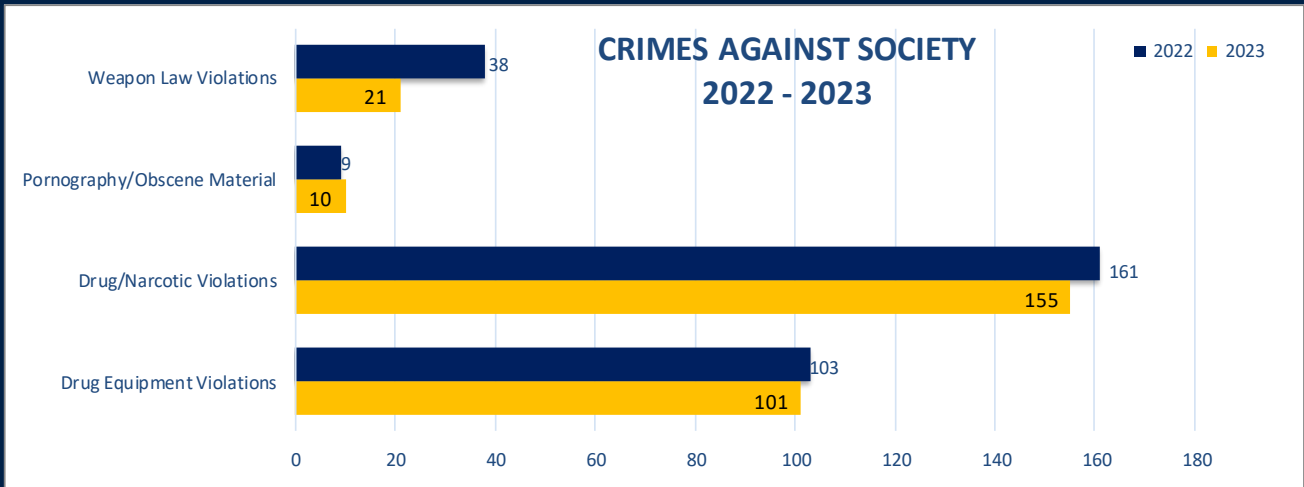
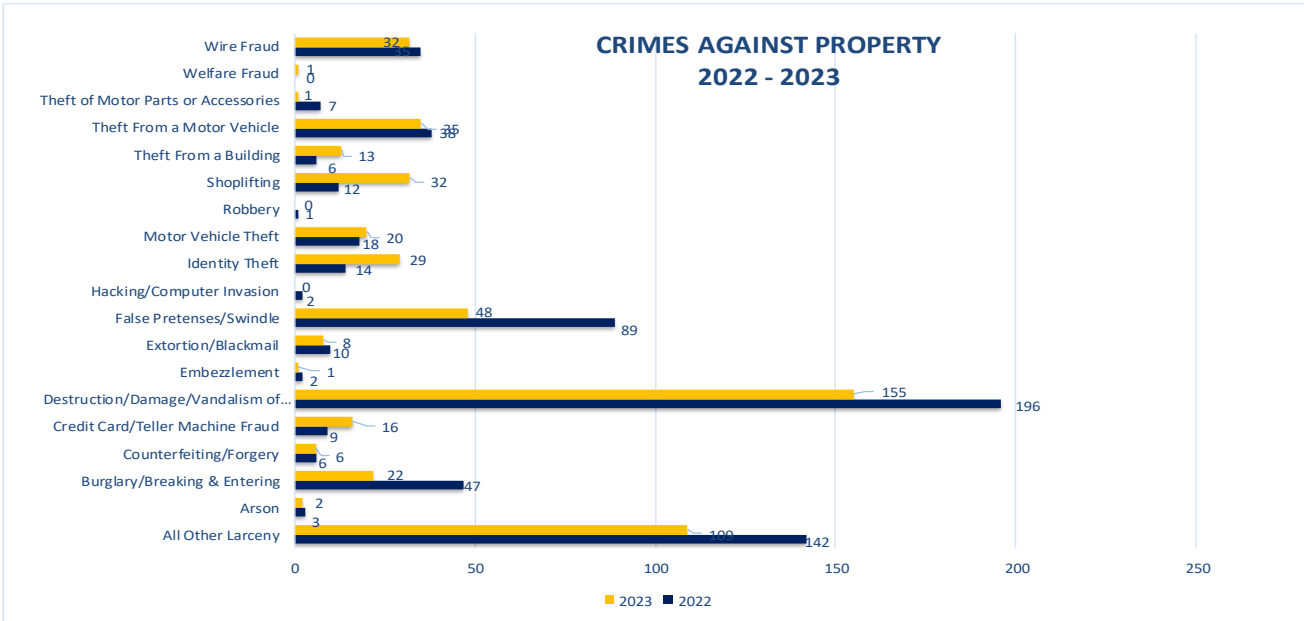
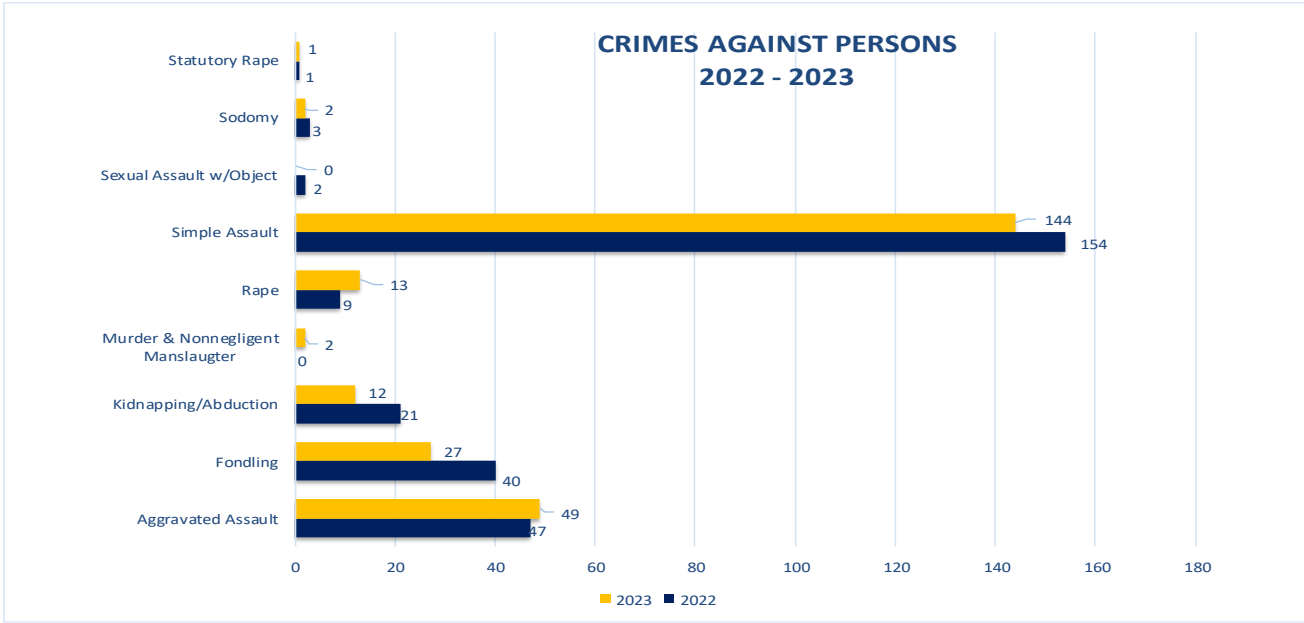
These offenses represent society's prohibition against engaging in certain activities. They do not involve an injured party and are not committed against property. This category includes drug/narcotic offenses, gambling offenses, pornography/obscene material offenses, and prostitution offenses.

Cache Rich Drug Task Force

The Cache/Rich Drug Task Force is dedicated to investigating drug-related crimes in Cache and Rich Counties. This Task Force comprises five full-time law enforcement officers: three detectives from the Logan City Police Department, one detective from the Cache County Sheriff's Office, and a sergeant from the Logan City Police Department who supervises the team. Additionally, the task force collaborates closely with a special agent from Homeland Security Investigations (HSI), who has been assigned to the Cache County area.

The Cache/Rich Drug Task Force also works in partnership with various local agencies, including the Rich County Sheriff's Office, Smithfield Police Department, North Park Police Department, Utah State University Police Department, Cache County Attorney's Office, and Adult Probation and Parole. They coordinate with the Division of Child and Family Services and other local, state, and federal agencies.

In 2023, the task force investigated 390 incidents, executed 57 search warrants, and conducted 20 drug education and prevention presentations. They made a total of 527 arrests, with primary offenses including methamphetamine, heroin, marijuana, firearms violations, and the illegal use of controlled prescription medications, among other charges.

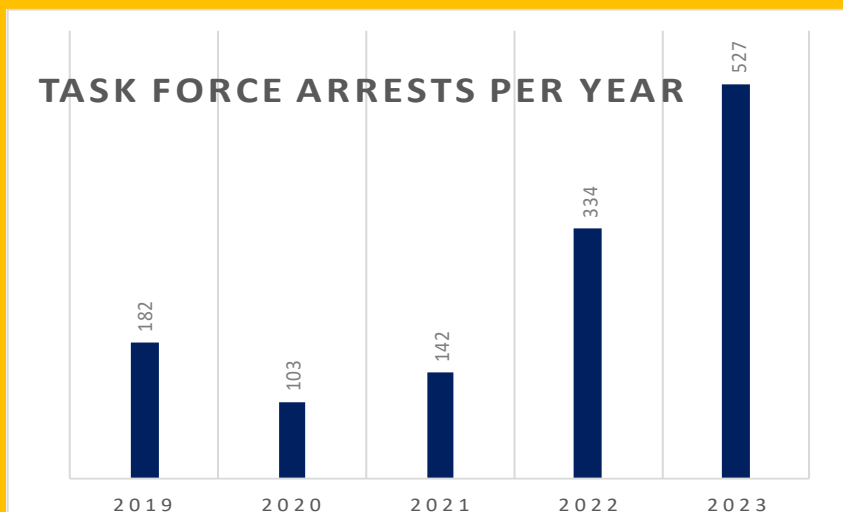
CASE HIGHLIGHTS

C/S Drugs: In late 2022, a Strike Force agent began an investigation into suspected drug distribution at a residence in Logan. After conducting hours of surveillance, the Agent determined that a significant law enforcement presence was needed to execute a search warrant at the property, which spans approximately one acre and includes multiple buildings.

When the warrant was served, officers arrested seven individuals after discovering heroin, methamphetamine, marijuana, and numerous prescription medications. Additionally, a small child was present at the scene and was taken into custody by the Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS).

C/S Sale/Man: A strike force agent had worked a confidential informant for several months, who was able to purchase LSD from an individual in Logan. The agent continued his investigation on the suspect and was able to serve a search warrant at his residence. During the search of the residence, agents discovered LSD, DMT, a large amount of marijuana, THC wax, psilocybin edibles, and a clandestine lab used to process DMT. Nearly three thousand dollars was seized and the suspect was charged with multiple offenses.

Possession of explosives, fentanyl, methamphetamine, cocaine, and marijuana: A strike force agent investigated an individual reported to be selling meth. After obtaining a vehicle tracking warrant, the agent stopped the suspect as he returned to the valley from a suspected drug pick-up. Illicit drugs were found in the vehicle as well as detcord and a homemade explosive device. A search warrant was then obtained for the home where further illegal narcotics were found as well as additional materials for making improvised explosive devices. The suspect was charged with multiple offenses for drugs and explosive materials.



School Resource

The School Resource Unit consists of seven deputies and one sergeant. These deputies are assigned to collaborate with staff and students at the high schools (Sky View, Mountain Crest, Ridgeline, and Green Canyon) and middle schools (South Cache, North Cache, and Spring Creek). Additionally, two deputies teach the N.O.V.A. program at the elementary schools within the Cache County School District. The school resource deputies investigate crimes that occur in the schools and work alongside school administrators on safety issues related to the schools. Their presence also provides a level of security within these educational environments. Furthermore, the School Resource deputies partner with the Bear River Health Department to conduct alcohol compliance checks.

N.O.V.A. PROGRAM

N.O.V.A. stands for Nurturing, Opportunities, Values, and Accountability. The mission of N.O.V.A. is to nurture youth so they seek out positive opportunities, internalize good values, and accept accountability for their life choices. N.O.V.A. aims to assist parents, families, and communities in protecting youth from the potentially devastating effects of illegal drug use, violence, and negative media exposure.

The N.O.V.A. program is taught over a 14-week period, with deputy sheriffs visiting classrooms typically once a week. Topics covered include drugs and alcohol, opportunities and accountability, moral courage, self-esteem, heroes, anger management, teasing, bullying, evaluating media (such as television, movies, video games), internet safety, music, and gangs.

ALCOHOL COMPLIANCE CHECKS

The Cache County Sheriff's Office, in partnership with the Bear River Health Department, conducts alcohol compliance checks as part of the EASY alcohol program, which is funded by the State of Utah. These checks are performed four times a year to prevent the sale of alcohol to underage youth.

How Compliance Checks Work

During these checks, a youth who is at least 18 years old attempts to purchase alcohol from a retail store that sells it. The buyer is instructed to be honest and to follow specific rules set forth by the State of Utah. If the buyer successfully purchases alcohol, the store clerk may be cited or referred to court, and the state may take administrative actions against the store, which can include fines and suspension of licenses.

Compliance Results

In 2023, approximately 20 retail stores were checked four times throughout the year. Out of 79 attempts to purchase alcohol by an underage buyer, only one attempt was successful. This means that retail stores in Cache Valley had a 99% compliance rate in not selling alcohol to underage buyers.

School resource deputies have the following responsibilities:

- Ensure a safe learning environment
- Serve as a resource for the community and schools
- Educate children and adults about alcohol and drugs
- Teach practical decision-making skills
- Help individuals understand the consequences of their decisions

Each school year, over 4,000 students receive educational talks, NOVA presentations, and other programs.

The mission of the Cache County Jail is to provide housing for inmates while adhering to the values and ethics of the Cache County Sheriff's Office. We strive to maintain a constitutionally acceptable environment that ensures the safety and security of the community, staff, and inmates.

To achieve these goals and fulfill mandated court requirements, we focus on cost-effective management. Our qualified staff fosters a positive atmosphere that allows participating inmates to progress to a less restrictive environment. It is the responsibility of the Sheriff and his employees to deliver services that comply with the United States Constitution, Utah state statutes, and the rulings of all courts with jurisdiction.

ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF

The administrative staff is responsible for inmate accounting which includes, processing bail, managing medical billing, and billing other agencies for housing. Additionally, the jail accreditation program is overseen by the administration office.

CORRECTIONS

Corrections deputies are responsible for the safety and security of all inmates and staff within the Cache County Jail. Their duties include booking inmates in and out of the facility and overseeing inmate recreation.

INMATE PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

Inmate Services handles various functions, including inmate commissary, inmate programs, classification, work release, work diversion, greenhouse activities, and county worker programs.

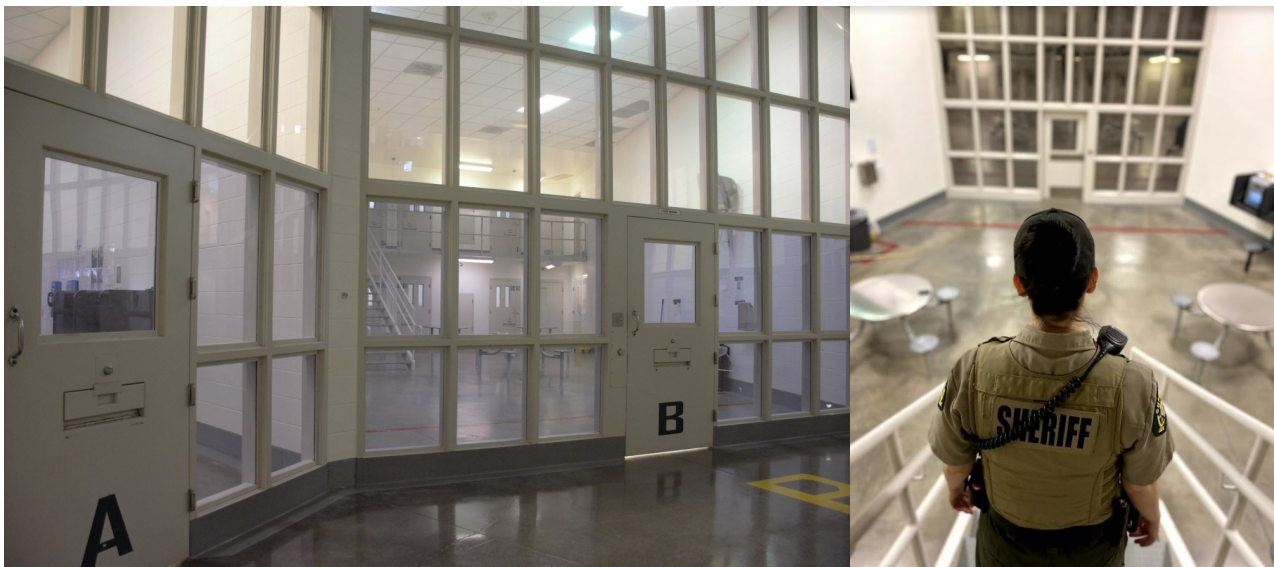
MEDICAL

Transportation deputies are responsible for transporting inmates to court appearances, medical and dental appointments, as well as to the Utah State Prison or the Utah State Hospital.

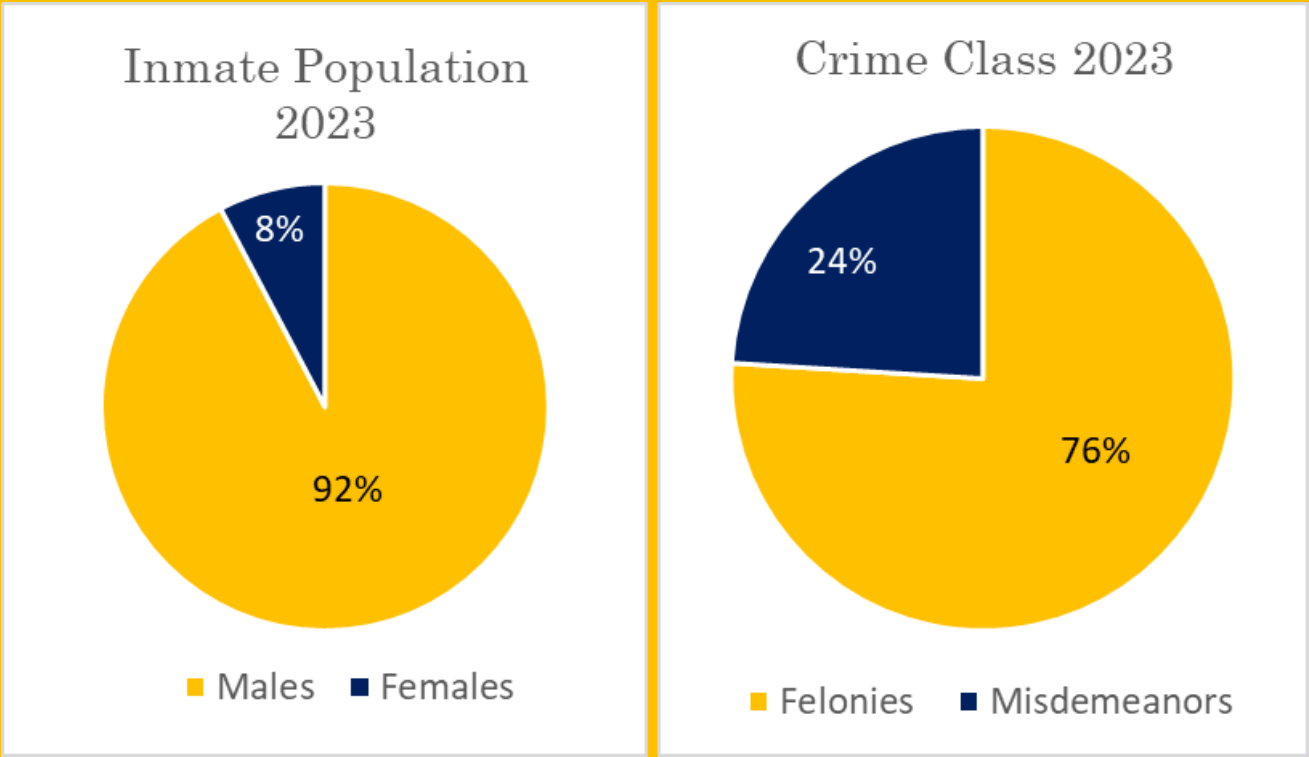

There are 56 positions available for inmates to work within the jail. Inmates who are allowed to work can be assigned to various roles, including those in the kitchen, laundry, library, and janitorial services. Additionally, there are eight positions available outside the facility, which include work at the American West Heritage Center, the Sheriff's Office greenhouse, the County Fairgrounds, Logan Landfill, and Zootah. There are also work crews that operate under supervision on county and Sheriff's Office grounds. This year, inmates working outside the jail provided approximately 10,368 work hours.

We have established partnerships with 14 communities, the U.S. Forest Service, and the Cache Valley Transit District. The Patrol Division serves a large population by responding to emergencies, ensuring highway safety, and engaging in community caretaking efforts. Through strategic partnerships and effective resource management, the Sheriff's Office maintains peace, public safety, and law enforcement in Cache County.

The Patrol Division includes the following units:

STAR DEPUTY:

The STAR (Sheriff's Town and Area Representative) Deputy Program was developed to provide citizens with a direct link to the Sheriff's Office. A STAR Deputy is assigned to each city in the county. The Deputy attends monthly city council meetings and assists with initiatives such as Neighborhood Watch, National Night Out Against Crime, and other city needs. Citizens are encouraged to contact their STAR Deputy with any questions or concerns.

MOTORS:

With their inconspicuous presence and maneuverability, motor units are effective tools for general traffic enforcement. When specific traffic issues are reported by citizens or other deputies, motor deputies initiate concentrated enforcement activities to address these concerns. Motors are also utilized during parades, city celebrations and events, National Nights Out, as well as military and funeral escorts.

K9S:

The Cache County K9 Division consists of two K9s and their handlers. Their responsibilities include tracking criminal suspects, drug detection, and general patrol duties. The K9 unit also participates in community outreach by visiting schools, fairs, and other public events to demonstrate their important work.

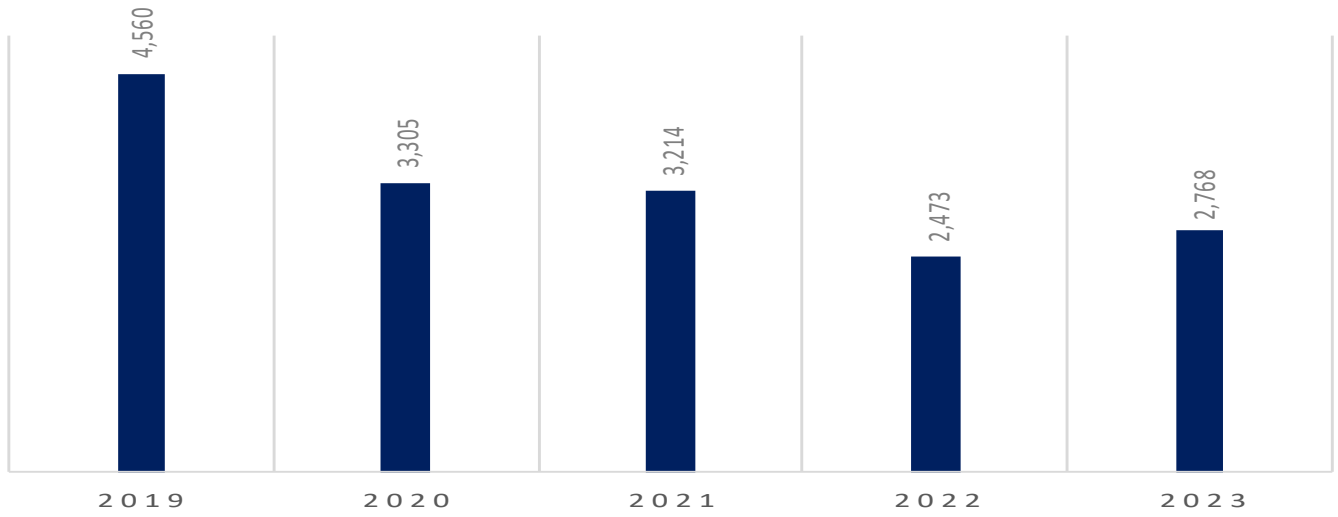
SWAT:

The Cache County Sheriff's Office SWAT (Special Weapons and Tactics) team is a highly trained group of deputies responsible for handling and resolving extremely high-risk situations. Using team tactics, specialized weaponry, equipment, and tactical skills, the SWAT team addresses hostage rescue operations, armed and barricaded suspects, high-risk warrant entries, and other critical incidents.

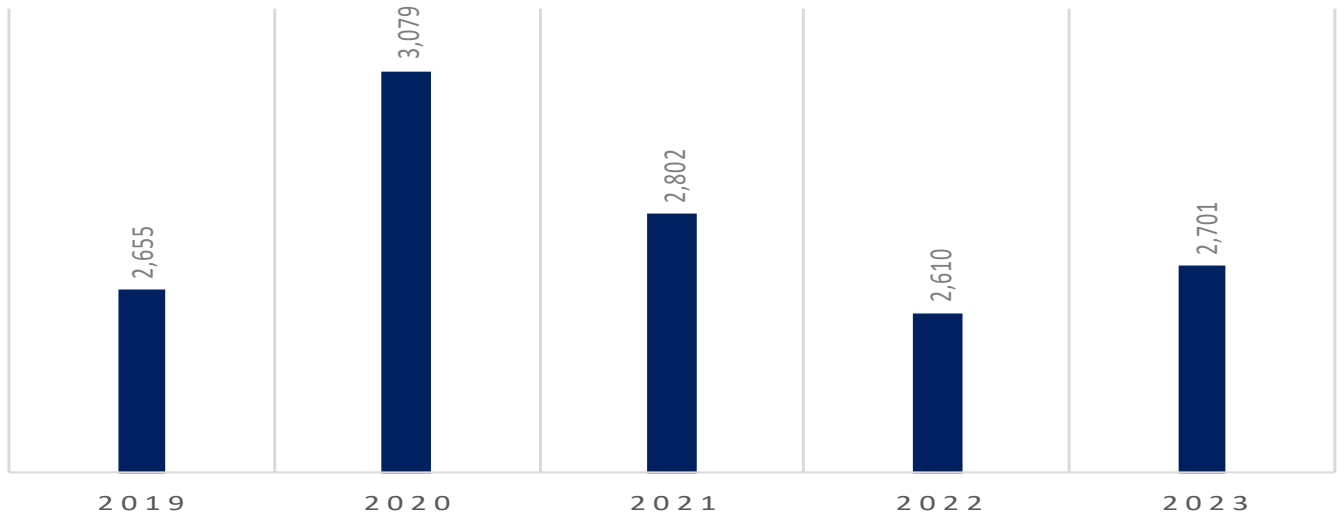
ANIMAL CONTROL:

The Animal Control Unit consists of one sergeant and three full-time civilian animal control officers. These officers respond to service calls related to stray animals and investigate cases of abuse, neglect, or dangerous animals. They work closely with state livestock officers to address complaints regarding livestock at large on public highways and private property, as well as cases of neglect and abuse of livestock.

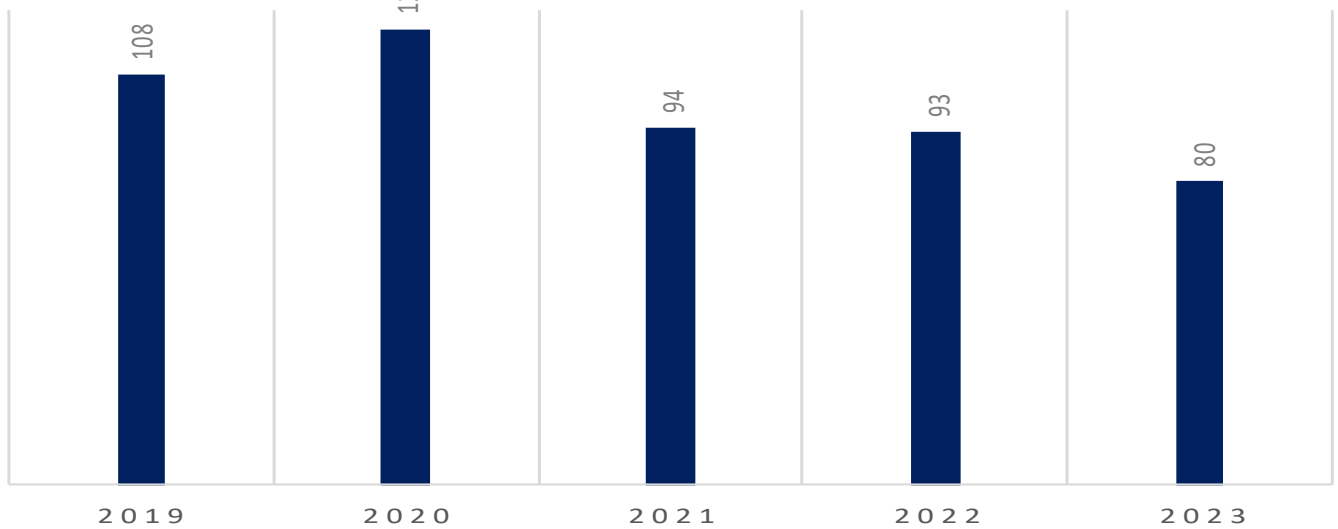
TOTAL CITATIONS PER YEAR

Safety

The Patrol Division plays a vital role in maintaining highway safety in Cache County. Officers perform routine patrols, enforce traffic regulations, manage accidents, and assist distressed motorists. Their active presence on the highways contributes to a reduction in traffic incidents and enhances safety for commuters and travelers in the area.

Community Outreach

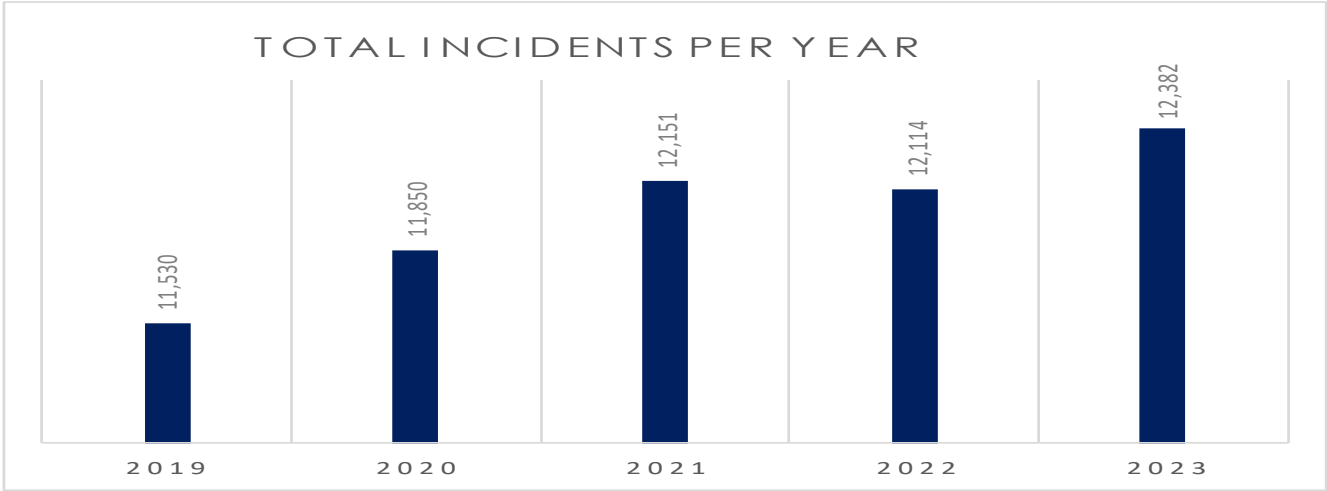
Deputies engage in community outreach programs, patrol neighborhoods, and collaborate with local organizations to address community issues and improve residents' quality of life.

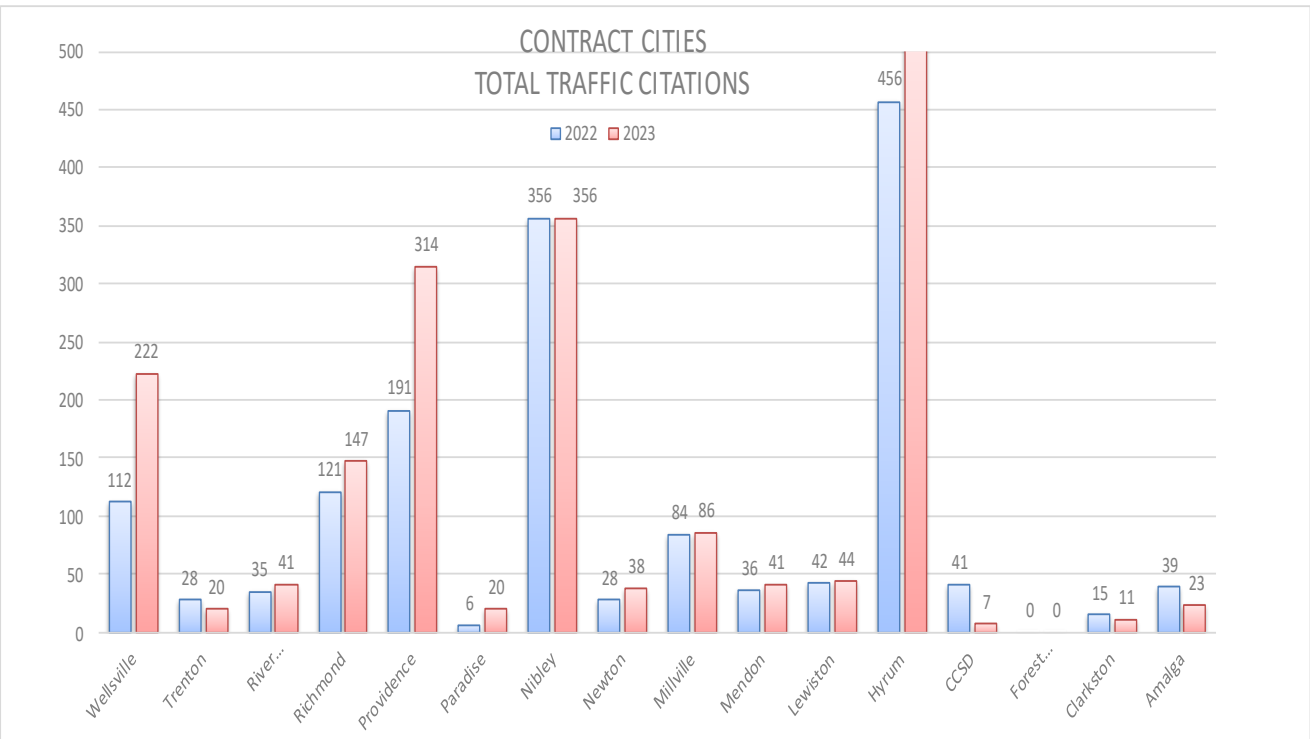
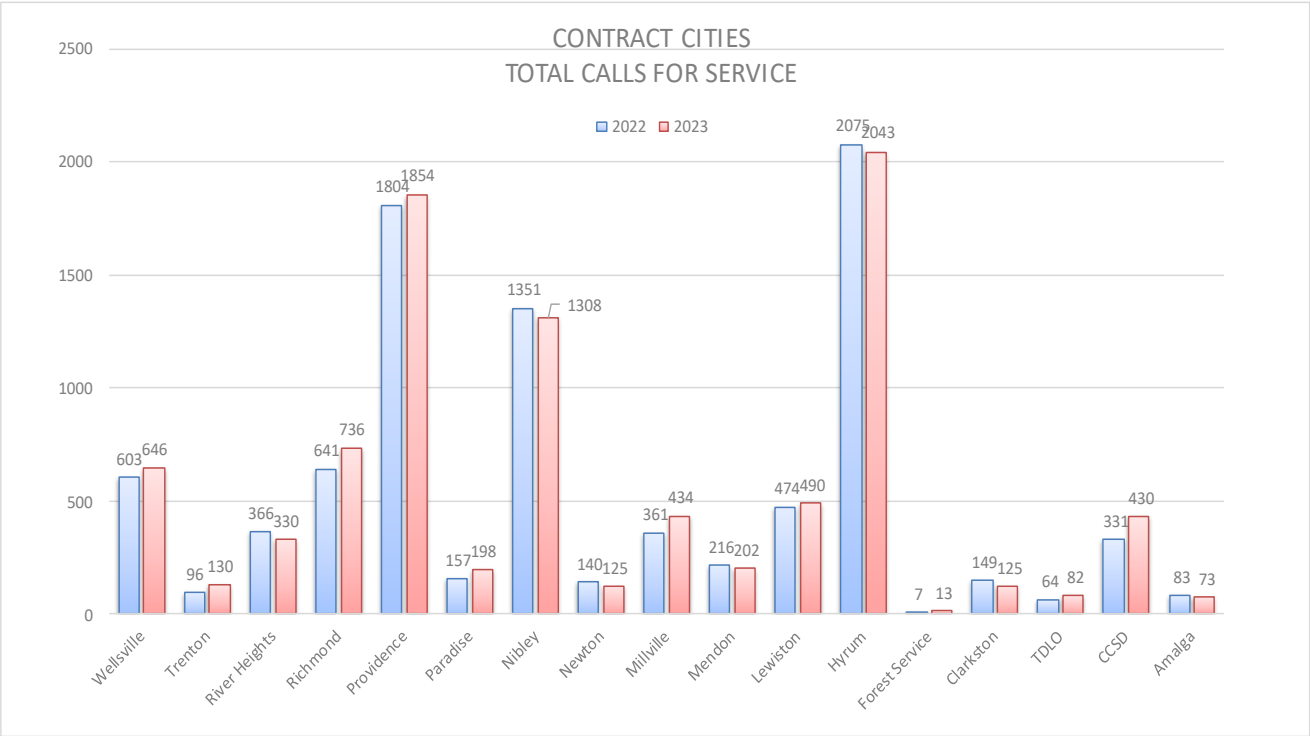

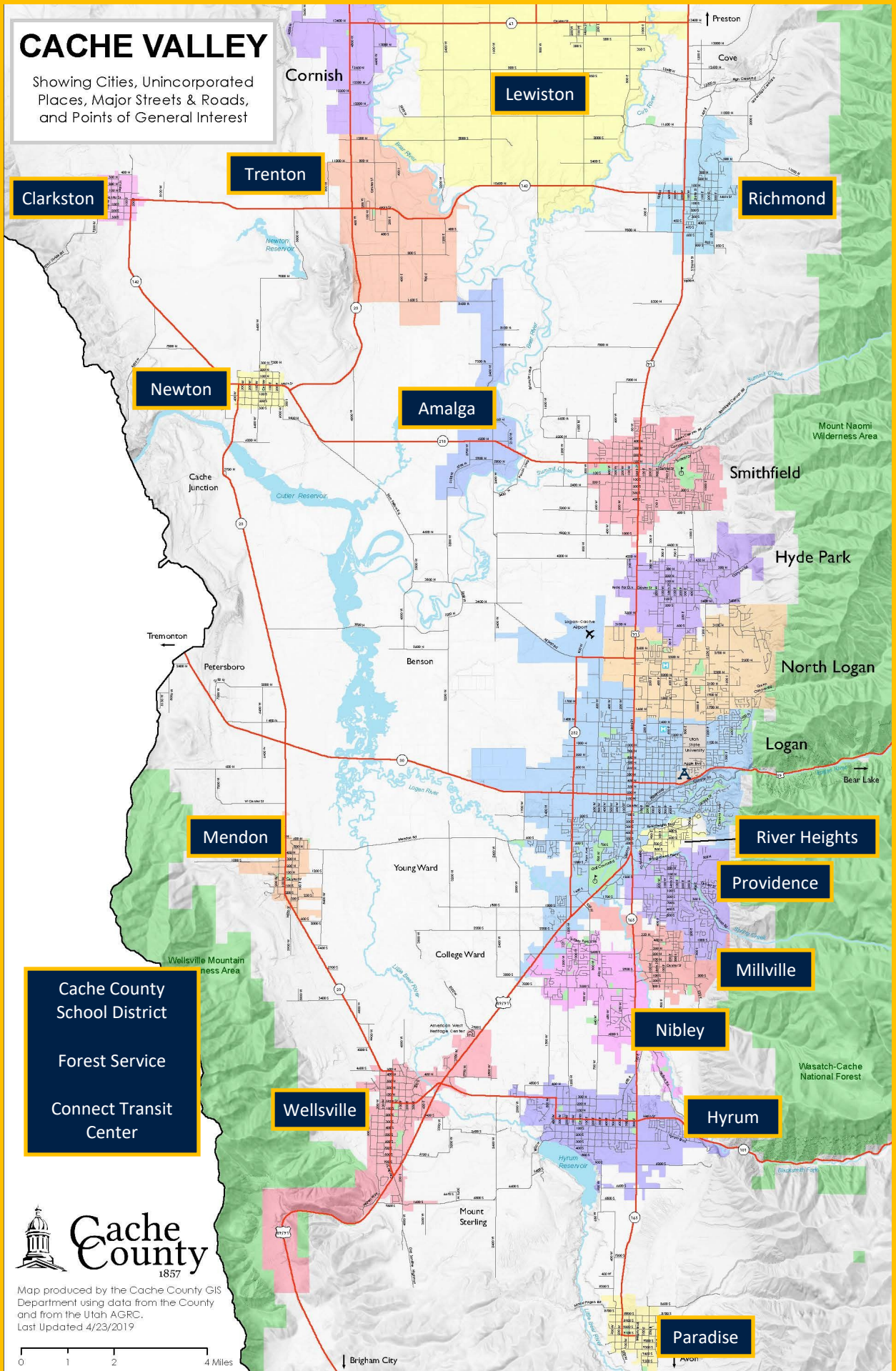
Contract Cities

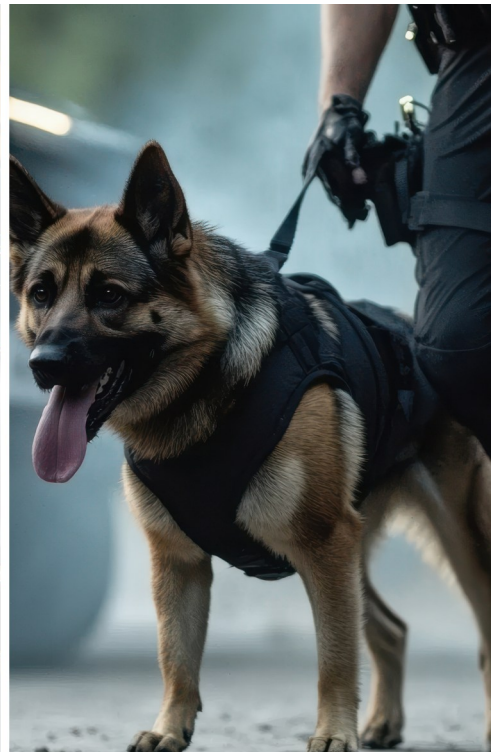
Patrol

The peace officers in the Patrol Division are dedicated to maintaining public safety and making lawful arrests. They fulfill this mission by gathering intelligence on criminal activities, conducting investigations, and ultimately arresting and prosecuting offenders. The Patrol unit also helps protect the lives and freedoms of Cache County residents by responding to various public emergencies, enforcing traffic laws, implementing crime prevention programs, and resolving civil disputes.

In addition to their duties in law enforcement, patrol deputies act as representatives of the Sheriff within the communities they serve. The Sheriff's Town and Area Representative (STAR) Deputy program was established to improve communication and services between the Sheriff's Office and the individual communities. Each deputy is assigned to a specific city or town, where they work to address local issues.

The Patrol Division comprises 29 deputies and four sergeants. This year, the Sheriff's Office received a total of 12,382 calls for service, resulting in an average of 229 incidents per deputy, including those from patrol, investigations, animal control, and school resource divisions, which together total 54 deputies.

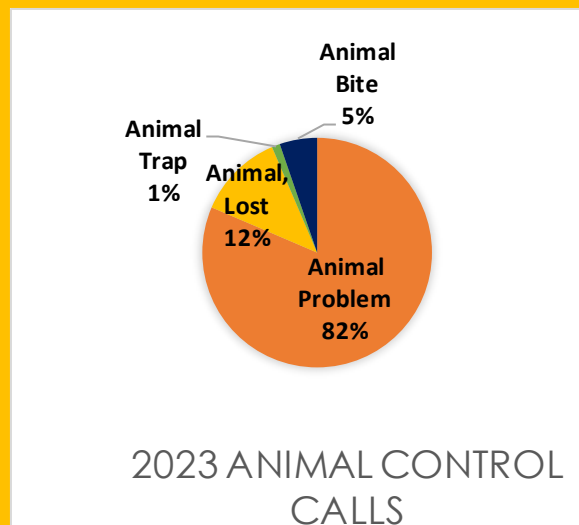


Animal Control

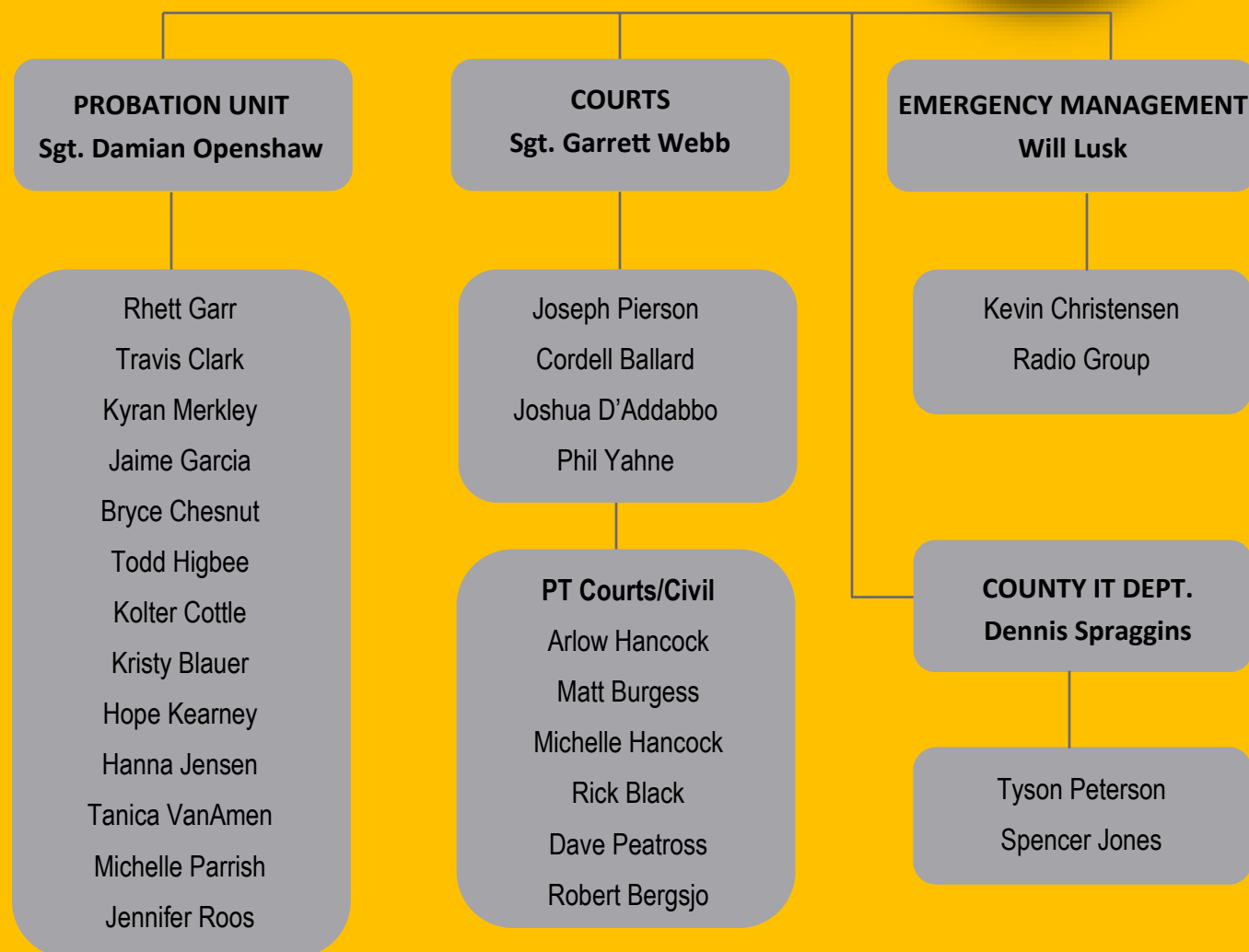
Animal Control is a service offered by the Criminal Division, managed by the administrative sergeant. The Animal Control Unit consists of three full-time civilian employees who respond to animal-related calls and patrol for issues involving animals. In 2023, Animal Control responded to 1,649 incidents in Cache County.

Cities that have contracts for this service benefit from thorough documentation of ongoing problems and nuisances that could otherwise be overlooked with an on-call animal service. Additionally, having a law enforcement employee assigned to this service fosters a strong working relationship with various city prosecutors and provides access to all the resources of the Sheriff's Office, ensuring that animals are handled safely and humanely.

COURT SECURITY

Emergency Management oversees the County Emergency Operations Center (EOC) and coordinates disaster response efforts throughout the county.

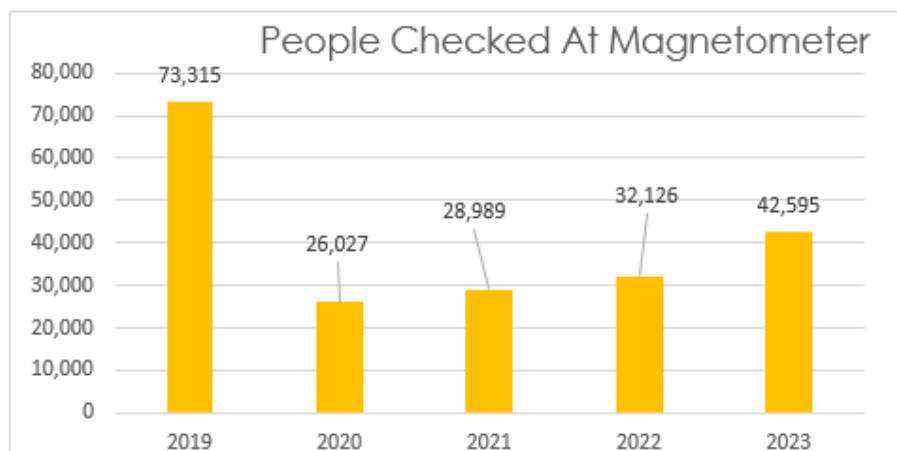
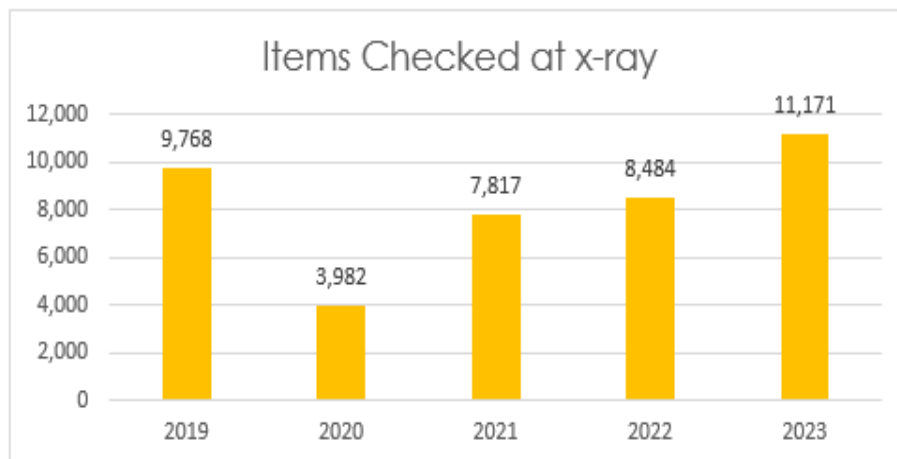

The Sheriff's Office offers two key services to the District Court, Juvenile Court, and certain justice courts within the First Judicial District.

First, deputy sheriffs act as bailiffs in the courtrooms. Their main responsibility is to ensure the safety of the judge and court staff while also maintaining order in the courtroom.

Second, deputy sheriffs provide security for the court complex. This is achieved through their uniformed presence in and around the complex. Additional security measures include the use of handheld and stationary metal detectors, gathering intelligence, managing situations that could pose a threat to court security, and arresting individuals who violate the law in or near the court complex.

Deputy sheriffs assigned to the courts maintain an excellent working relationship with judges, court clerks, attorneys, and the public.

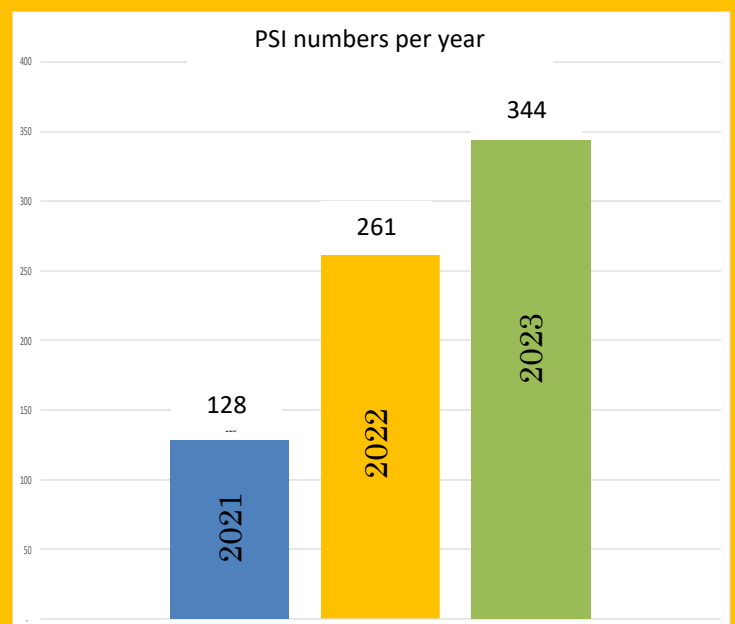
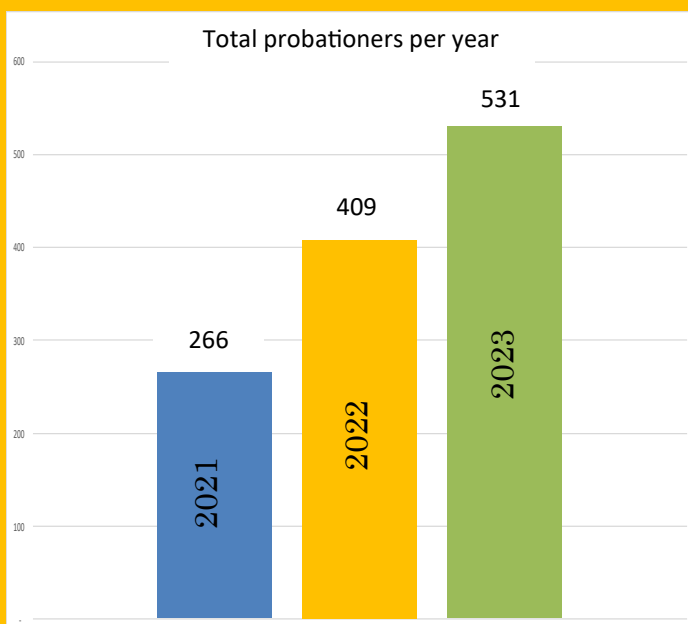
Probation Unit Description:

Established in July 2020, the Cache County Sheriff's Office Probation Unit oversees two distinct programs: pretrial supervision and probation. The county probation system addresses a gap between Adult Probation and Parole and private probation companies, specifically focusing on medium to high-risk misdemeanor adult offenders.

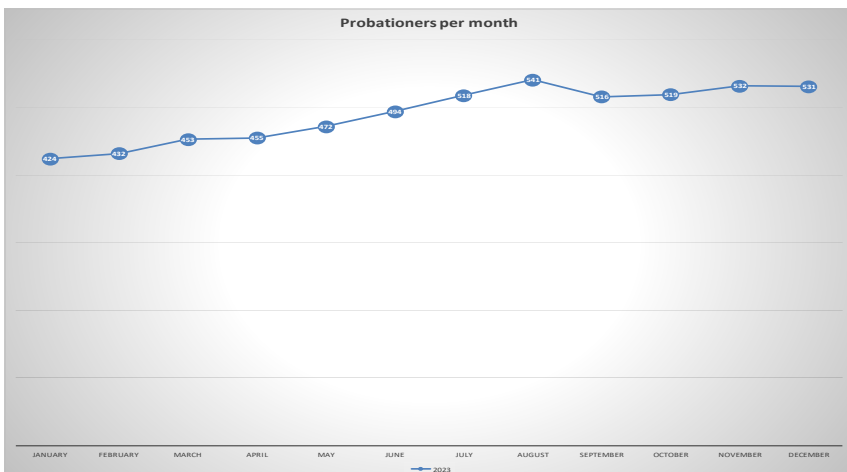
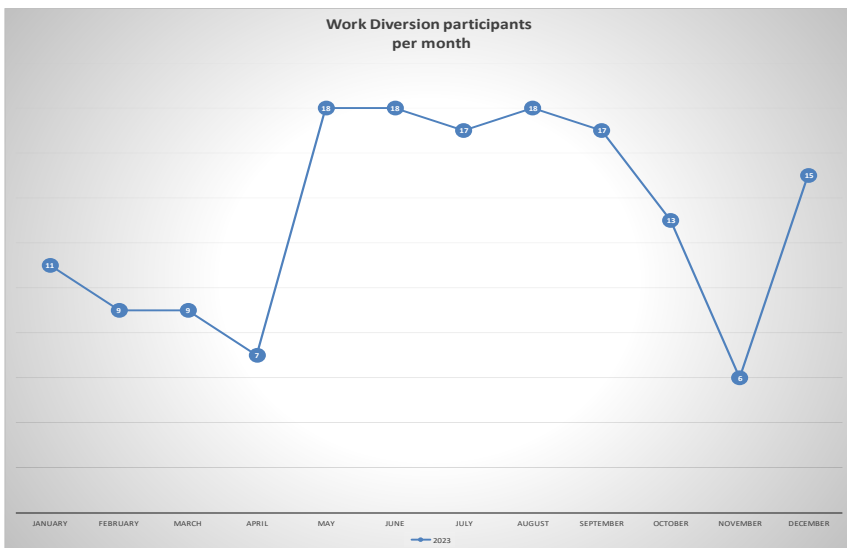
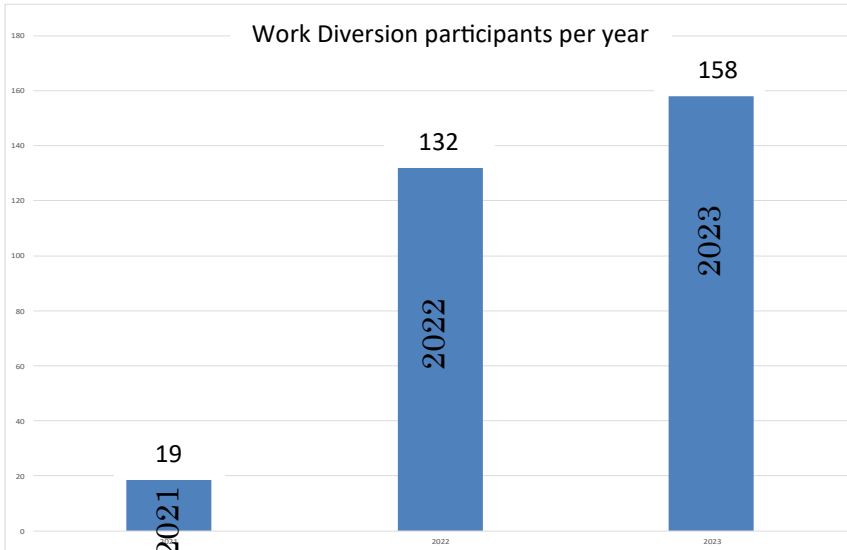
The Pretrial Supervision Program is designed for adults who have been charged with a criminal offense but have not yet undergone the court process to determine their guilt. Instead of remaining in jail during this time, these individuals are released into the community and placed under the supervision of the Probation Unit.

Probation is intended for adult offenders who have been found guilty of a criminal offense. For many, probation is an alternative to serving jail time. While on probation, offenders must comply with a set of conditions that hold them accountable and offer treatment options, aiming to facilitate positive changes in their lives.

Additionally, the Probation Unit is responsible for preparing presentence investigations, which provide the court with information to aid in fair sentencing. These investigations include reviewing criminal histories, conducting validated needs and risk assessments on the offender, interviewing the offenders, gathering victim impact statements, and collecting other relevant information to assist the court in its sentencing decisions.



The Cache County Sheriff's Office Probation Unit is primarily responsible for offering adult offenders the opportunity to remain in the community through a structured supervision program, while also ensuring community protection. This supervision allows offenders to develop the necessary skills to become productive members of society, adhering to the norms and rules expected of all citizens.



Work Diversion Program

The Work Diversion program offers opportunities for individuals sentenced to community service. This program is utilized by several local courts, including the First District Court, Logan Municipal Court, and other justice courts. It provides numerous benefits to the court system, the community, and the individuals involved.

In 2023, a total of 1,264 hours of community service were allocated to 15 different organizations in Cache Valley. These service hours were completed by 158 individuals, who contributed to tasks that would have otherwise required funding from local taxpayers. The Work Diversion program specifically focuses on assisting non-profit and government agencies, maximizing the advantages for local communities.

Additionally, this program serves as an alternative form of punishment, rather than incarceration. Many participants are young adults who have committed minor offenses, ranging from traffic violations to alcohol-related infractions. Completing community service is often more beneficial for these individuals than spending time in jail. By participating in the Work Diversion program, they can contribute positively to the community, address their fines in a manageable way, and avoid the negative influences that often accompany incarceration.

Emergency Operations Center

The Cache County Emergency Operations Center (EOC) is located at the Sheriff's Office Complex and is managed by the Cache County Office of Emergency Management. The EOC serves as the central hub for directing and controlling county government activities and for coordinating emergency response and recovery efforts during emergencies or disasters.

Examples of situations that may require centralized direction and control through the EOC include floods, earthquakes, severe storms, landslides, hazardous material spills, and search and rescue operations. This centralized coordination is made possible through the collaboration of emergency responders, staff, volunteer agencies, non-governmental organizations, and elected and appointed officials assigned to support and coordinate emergency activities within the EOC. This coordination helps to ensure that all tasks are completed efficiently, with minimal duplication, and the highest likelihood of success.

Day-to-day operations at the EOC include maintaining situational awareness and disseminating information. The EOC is well-equipped for this purpose, featuring numerous phone lines and various communication capabilities. These operations may also involve managing Amber Alerts. When an Amber Alert is issued in the County, the EOC acts as the call center for receiving tips and gathering information related to the alert, and it serves as the primary source for disseminating Amber Alert information to the public.

The EOC is equipped with emergency supplies, communication equipment, computer-based reference materials, and activity logs. Additionally, it has backup power and lighting, along with other necessary tools to function effectively during emergency or disaster situations. The EOC is also set up to serve as an alternate Emergency 911 Dispatch Center.

To ensure that all response and recovery tasks are executed with maximum efficiency, the EOC facilitates a county-wide training and exercise program. Over the past year, training has been provided to various emergency responders, staff, volunteers, faith-based groups, and elected and appointed officials.

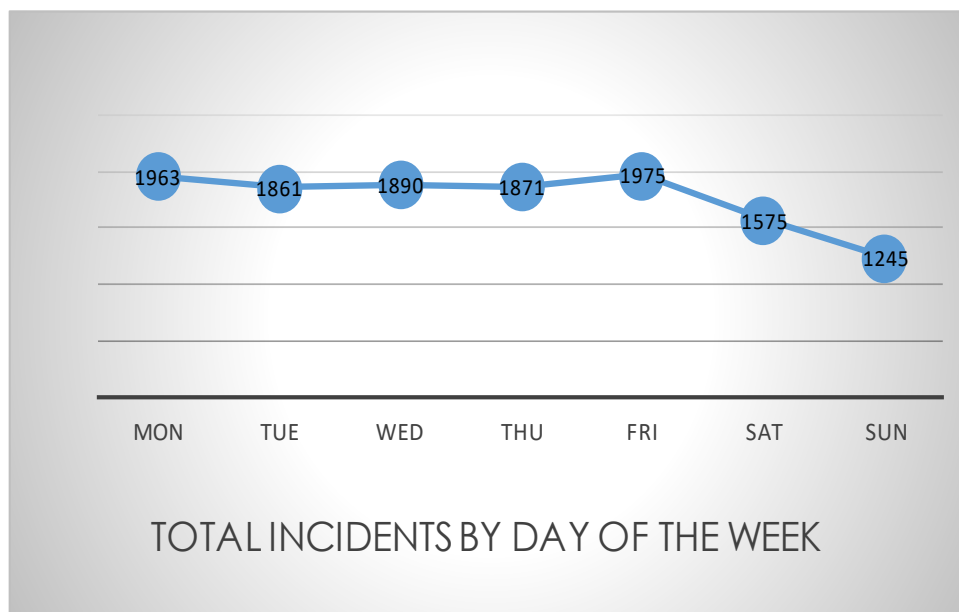
