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### THE CACHE COUNTY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

January 24, 1995

The Cache County Council met in regular session on the 24th day of January, 1995 in the County Council Chambers located at 120 North 100 West, Logan, Utah 84321

### **ATTENDANCE**

Council members present: Chairman Sarah Ann Skanchy, Vice Chairman C. Larry Anhder, Council members Guy Ray Pulsipher, Layne M. Beck, H. Craig Petersen, Jerry L. Allen Darrel L. Gibbons.

Others present: Cache County Executive M. Lynn Lemon; Cache County Clerk Stephen M. Erickson; Cache County Attorney Scott Wyatt. Cache County Auditor Tamra Stones; County Road Superintendent Joe Kirby; Director of BRAG Roger Jones; Cache Chamber of Commerce President Doug Thompson; Senator Hatch's representative Norma Holmgren; Bear River Mental Health Representative Trent Wentz; Representatives from the local news media and other interested citizens.

### CALL TO ORDER

Council Chairman Sarah Ann Skanchy called the meeting to order at 5:00 p.m. and welcomed all who were in attendance. Members of the audience were asked to stand and introduce themselves.

### INVOCATION

The invocation was given by Councilman Darrel L. Gibbons.

### AGENDA & MINUTES

The agenda for the meeting was adjusted and approved.

The minutes of the Council meeting held on January 10, 1995 and sent to all members of the Council were discussed, corrected and approved.

### REPORT OF THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE

The County Executive M. Lynn Lemon reported on the following items:

1. Assistant to the County Executive: Mr. Lemon introduced Mike Nilson who has been hired as his assistant. Mr. Nilson told the Council that he very happy to be back in the Valley after

working in the Eastern U.S... Nilson said that he has a master degree in Public Administration and he is looking forward to working for the County in that area.

2. Appointments: The following were presented as appointments for Council approval.

Appointment: Stones, Tamra County Grievance Committee
Appointment: Wyatt, Scott County Grievance Committee

A motion to approve the appointments was made by Councilman Petersen. It was properly seconded and carried unanimously.

Appointment: Howell, Kathleen Boundary Commission
Appointment: Gleed, Michael Boundary Commission

A motion to approve the appointments to the County Boundary Commission was made by Councilman Allen. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

Appointment: Ward, Preston Chief Deputy Co. Surveyor
Appointment: Bishop, James Deputy County Surveyor

A motion to approve this appointments was made by Councilman Pulsipher. It was properly seconded and carried unanimously.

Appointment: Nelson, Lee County Planning Commission

A motion to approve this appointment was made by Councilman Pulsipher. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

- 3. Land Fill Reserve Account: The Land Fill Reserve Account now totals \$184,473.00. Logan City who administers the account has the account as a separate item in their budget. The intent is to increase the account by \$40,000.00 per year.
- 4. CDBG: Community Development Block Grants have been awarded to the SunShine Terrace Foundation and the Senior Citizen Center. The Terrace will receive \$40,000.00 and the Senior Citizen Center has a multi-year allocation of \$214,000.00. This year they will receive \$107,000.00.
- 5. UDOT Meeting: The UDOT annual meeting will be held on January 26, 1995 in the Council Chambers beginning at 9:00 a.m..
- 6. State Wilderness Meeting: The Governor and his staff members are in the process of receiving input on the proposal to designate land as wilderness in the state. A meeting is

scheduled on February 3rd at 10:00 a.m. in SLC at the Natural Resource Building.

7. Legislature Briefings: The Council was reminded that legislative briefings are being held at the State Capital on January 26, February, 9 & 23.

### HATCH'S OFFICE UPDATE: NORMA HOLMGREN

Norma Holmgren, representing Senator Orrin Hatch's Northern Utah Office appeared before the Council to update them on Senator Hatch's activities in Washington D. C.. Holmgren reported that Hatch has been appointed as chairman of the powerful Judiciary Committee. Holmgren also reviewed some of the Senate Bills that are presently being pushed by Senator Hatch such as the Balanced Budget Amendment and Health Care.

### BEAR RIVER ASSOCIATION OF GOVERNMENTS REPORT: ROGER JONES

The Director of BRAG Roger Jones announced that BRAG has been awarded another two million dollars to help former Thiokol employees relocate after being dislocated by layoffs at Thiokol. Bringing the two year total to five million dollars. Jones explained how the money is used. He said that out of those who have applied for help 169 have found different employment. Jones further explained how the money is used to help the displaced works. It provides training and finances to live on during the training period.

An overview of BRAG was presented by Mr. Jones. that included a Digest of Economic Development and Missions and Purposes of BRAG.

Jones was asked by Vice Chairman Anhder if there were any concerns about proper representation on the Board. Jones said he didn't think there were any concerns and it seems like everyone is being treated fairly. Councilman Gibbons, the BRAG Board Chairman, said that he didn't see any problem with the way it presently is organized.

### BUDGETARY MATTERS

### PUBLIC HEARING SET: 1995 CERTIFIED TAX RATE

Chairman Skanchy explained the need to set a Public Hearing on the 1995 Certified Tax Rate and asked for a motion to do so.

A motion to set a Public Hearing on August 8, 1995 at 6:00 p.m. to receive public input on the proposed 1995 Certified Tax Rate was made by Councilman Petersen. It was properly seconded and carried unanimously.

### PUBLIC HEARING SET: 1996 BUDGET

Chairman Skanchy asked for a motion to set a Public Hearing to receive public input on the proposed 1996 Budget.

It was moved by Councilman Gibbons to set the Public Hearing on November 28, 1995 at 6:00 p.m.. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

### BOARD OF EQUALIZATION

The Chairman of the Board of Equalization, Sarah Ann Skanchy reviewed the duties and procedures of the Board. The Board discussed the property tax exemption requested by IHC concerning personal property.

The Cache Community Food Pantry has applied for property tax exemption for charitable reasons.

The County Auditor Tamra Stones said that the application meets all requirements and she recommends granting the exemption.

A motion to approve the application was made by Vice Chairman Anhder. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

### MENTAL HEALTH OFFICER CERTIFICATION PROCEDURE: TRENT WENTZ

Doctor Trent Wentz from Bear River Mental Health reviewed the process to become a Certified Health Officer. Dr. Wentz discussed the application and the requirements to become a Certified Health Office.

Wentz told the Council that they are the Mental Health Authority and have the final approval of any applicant.

An application will be drafted to certify those who are already on the staff.

### LOGAN-NORTHERN CANAL BIKE AND PEDESTRIAN TRAIL: DISCUSSION RESOLUTION NO. 95-02

Executive Lemon presented to the Council a proposed Resolution that if adopted would fund out of Restaurant Tax funding \$4,560 toward an ISTEA application that would study a proposed bike\pedestrian trail. The proposed trail would be located on canal right-of-way of the Logan/Northern canal from Smithfield to USU campus. The county has been asked to sponsor 0.4 of a mile of the total proposed project. Executive Lemon recommends that funding should come from the Restaurant Tax. After discussing the proposal it was the consensus of the Council that Restaurant Tax funding shouldn't be committed at the present time. Chairman Skanchy said that we are not talking about funding the project but merely a study of a proposed project. Councilman Gibbons recommended that because the project affects agriculture the County Farm Bureau should be involved.

Mike Noonchester, representing those who are interested in the proposed project, said that there are a number of issues that haven't been solved yet and they are presently asking for support for funding now, because of a deadline in the ISTEA application process.

A motion to adopt Resolution No. 95-02 and the deletion of that portion of the Resolution that deals with Restaurant Tax was made by Councilman Allen. It was properly seconded and passed on a 6 "Yes" to a 1 "No" vote.

### PUBLIC HEARING SET: BIKE\PEDESTRIAN TRAIL

Councilman Gibbons moved that a Public Hearing be set on February 14, 1995, at 7:00 p.m. to receive public input on the proposed bike\pedestrian trail. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

### JUVENILE PROCEDURE RULES AMENDMENT: IMPACT ON COUNTY ATTORNEY'S OFFICE

The Council discussed sending a letter of abjection to the State Juvenile Court System. Objecting to a change in the way cases are handled. Chairman Skanchy is to write the letter.

A motion to send the letter of objection was made by Councilman Gibbons. It was properly seconded and carried unanimously.

### ELECTED OFFICIALS BONDS: APPROVED

Chairman Skanchy explained the need to bond the County's Elected Officials and the necessity to get Council approval on them. Skanchy read the bonds aloud and had those present sign their individual bonds.

A motion to approve the Elected Officials bonds was made by Councilman Pulsipher. It was properly seconded and carried unanimously.

### BONDING ALL OTHER COUNTY WORKERS: BY MOTION

The County Attorney ScottWyatt suggested that to stay within code that all other county workers should be bonded under a blanket bond.

It was moved by councilman Allen to blanket bond all other county workers. It was properly seconded and carried unanimously.

### COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AND HOUSING PLAN: 1995 UPDATE

Executive Lemon presented an updated proposed 1995 Community Development and Housing Plan to the Council. Lemon said that the plan still needs to be further updated. The plan will be on the next Council meeting agenda.

### COUNTYWIDE LIBRARY AD HOC COMMITTEE REPORT: DOUG THOMPSON

Doug Thompson, the President of the Cache Chamber of Commerce, before reporting on the Library, told the Council that \$436,000 has been awarded by ISTEA for the Logan Canyon Scenic Byway project. Thompson thanked the Council for financially supporting a portion of the project. Thompson also said that Chip Sibbernsen from the Forest Service has been the one to push the project and he should be thanked for his work.

Thompson reported to the Council that the Chamber Board of Directors and Chamber members are very supportive of a CountyWide Library System. They are proposing a non-profit foundation be organized to finance the system and are asking for the County Councils support.

It was moved by Councilman Allen to support the proposed private organization and report back to the Council in two weeks concerning areas of private funding and committee organization. The motion was seconded and carried unanimously.

### COUNCILMAN PULSIPHER LEAVES

Councilman Guy Ray Pulsipher left the meeting at 7:00 p.m..

### RESTAURANT TAX PROCEDURE: DISCUSSION

Chairman Skanchy reviewed the Restaurant Tax process including the amount of taxes collected (\$386,000 Oct. 93 to Sept. 94) and how the money is allocated. Some of the past projects were discussed such as the Lewiston Library remodeling, Cache arena at the County Fairgrounds and other smaller projects. It was reiterated that the money is to be used for publicly owned projects.

### LOGAN CITY ANNEXATION: DISCUSSION

The Council discussed the proposed annexation of 14 acres of unincorporated property South West of Logan City. Land developers have requested annexation into Logan City. Executive Lemon told the Council that there is a lot of opposition to the proposal. Home and land owners near the property are very opposed. Lemon said that Logan City is now meeting with those individuals to see if problems can be worked out. The Countywide Planner is also involved in the issue.

Vice Chairman Anhder suggested that the CMPO become involved because of the effect it could have on transportation and roads in the area. It was also stated that the Countywide Planner should prepare a proposed plan for vehicle movement and development along highway 89-91 to Wellsville. It was the consensus of the Council that the Countywide Planner is not to decide for the County but make recommendations to the Council for approval.

Chairman Skanchy said that water drainage in the area is also a problem and that the problem is going to have to be looked at and solved.

### EXECUTIVE SESSION

The Council adjourned from the regular Council meeting into an Executive session.


Mike Wieble from the Herold Journal objected to the closed meeting.



According to "An Etiquette for the 1990s Regional Council" by Patricia S. Atkins and Laura Wilson-Gentry, substate regional organizations look and act differently than they did in past decades. Known by a variety of names (see above examples), regional councils are substate, multicounty planning and development organizations that provide an array of services. The authors identify over 500 of these regional organizations in the US.

Most regional councils were created between 1965 and 1975. At that time, regional councils served primarily as comprehensive planning agencies. These multicounty agencies worked closely with the federal government, which emphasized regional approaches and provided funding through a large number

of federal programs. As the federal government reduced the number of comprehensive federal planning programs directly supportive of substate regionalism, regional council activities shifted from federally man-

dated planning to membership assistance and services delivery. The new regional council became market sensitive by staying attuned to customer preferences and became consumer driven rather than provider driven.

In addition to comprehensive planning, regions now sponsor many programs, including services for the poor and elderly, job training, small business finance, and minority enterprise programs. Regional councils have also developed closer relationships with the states during the 80s.

### The 60s & 70s

In the formative decades for regional councils, prudence dictated a low profile for the

### What is the Best Way to Evaluate a Program?

Government programs have historically been measured by how program mangers conform to specific standards or whether or not they have followed the correct procedures. Many public administrators feel that this system of "compliance accountability" pays little attention to whether the actual goals of the program are being met.

In academic circles the debate is referred to as "compliance accountability versus performance accountability." Some public managers believe the government should not ask 'did you follow the procedure' but rather 'did you accomplish the program's goals.'

Performance accountability is capturing the imagination of many in government as the best way to measure if a program is

### OF THE

### BEAR RIVER ASSOCIATION OF GOVERNMENTS

### ADOPTED FEBRUARY 15, 1978

- I. Definition: The Bear River Association of Governments is a voluntary organization of governments to facilitate intergovernmental cooperation and to insure the orderly and harmonious coordination of federal, state and local programs for the solution of mutual problems of the region.
- II. Goal: To serve as a multi-purpose organization, utilizing our combined total resources, to provide a more effective means for planning and development of the physical, economic, and human resources of the region.

### III. Purposes:

### A. Intergovernmental Collaboration

- 1. Be a device for preserving and strengthening the integrity and capability of local governments in the three counties.
- 2. Be an active forum for regular and continuing consideration of inter and intra county concerns.
- 3. Achieve more accurate understanding of pertinent issues through sharing of ideas and information.
- 4. Identify and exploit opportunities for mutual betterment through collaboration.
- 5. Crease awareness of the impacts of local actions upon neighboring jurisdictions.
- 6. Be the unified voice of local governments in the three counties, developing common positions and applying collective clout on controversial issues.

### B. Planning

- 1. Set forth overall growth and development policies and priorities for the District and correlate efforts of local and state promotional organizations—i.e., RC&D, Chambers of Commerce, Economic Development District, Water Conservancy Districts, etc.—to assure consistency with those policies and priorities.
- 2. Be the recognized district planning agency for those programs and projects requiring same, which are identified by the Association as appropriate for BRAG involvement.
- 3. Provide to local government those planning related central support services.

data, and information which can be provided most efficiently on a districtwide basis to avoid duplicate efforts.

- 4. Exert appropriate influence upon federal and state land and resource management agencies to assure optimum responsiveness to local policies, priorities and citizen needs.
- 5. Promote optimum correlation in planning and service delivery among all public agencies serving the Bear River District.
- 6. Serve as area-wide clearinghouse under OMB Circular A-95.

### C. Program Operations

- 1. Decide what planning and service delivery programs are to be operated in the District, and prescribe the organizational structure and placement for each which will assure maximum effectiveness and efficiency.
- 2. Assure public accountability of selected programs serving the District by performing the planning, policy setting, needs assessment, program content determination, evaluation and fiscal control functions.
- Maintain the organizational capability to employ personnel, providing accounting and payroll services, administer budgets, receive grants and enter into contracts in order to capitalize on financial and organizational opportunities which develop from time to time. and to provide economy of scale benefits in program operations.

### D. Administrative Services to Local Government.

- 1. Provide local jurisdictions with a pool of qualified staff expertise which they cannot afford individually.
- 2. Serve as a communications link to convey state and federal program opportunity information to local government.
- 3. Provide staff services to establish eligibility for and enable local governments to take maximum advantage of federal and state assistance opportunities.
- 4. Seek out, secure and, where appropriate, pass through to local governments assistance funds for various efforts.
- 5. Supplement the efforts of other organizations such as RC&D in developing programs and projects of benefit to local citizens.
- 6. Serve as an arm of local government extended into the Governor's Office and various state agencies assuring responsiveness to local needs and positions.

The foregoing constitutes an official statement of overall mission and purposes of the Bear River Association of Governments at the time of adoption. It may be amended from time to time as deemed appropriate by the association's governing body.

Dear Sir:

Your letter of December 2, 1994 to Gary O. McKean was referred to the Cache County Executive and Council for our review. Changes to administrative rules are always troublesome to us because frequently there is little or no input from those being impacted by the changes. We appreciate this knowledge in advance.

At our County Council meeting held January 24, 1995 we addressed this issue as a concern with the fiscal impact upon our county. Unfunded mandates from the State are continually being addressed with our legislators and the Governor as they in turn concern themselves with Federal Mandates. Our county is caught between the four larger counties and the smaller rural counties. We are a poor county with few sources of revenue beyond property taxes.

As our population continues to grow and crime rates increase, we are in constant funding dilemmas concerning our Jail, the Sheriffs office, the demands on the County Attorney's office and payment of public defenders. We are not in a position to fund increased costs in the justice system that the State wishes to not be responsible for.

We would urge careful scrutiny of the fiscal impacts of these proposed changes. When the State has surplus revenues to the extent publicized and the Courts are an arm of the State Government, we believe the State should continue to have the responsibility for funding the screening of juvenile cases.
