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CACHE COUNTY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

February 27, 1996

The Cache County Council met in regular session on the 27th day of February, 1996 in the County Council Chambers at 120 North 100 West, Logan, Utah 84321.

ATTENDANCE

Council Chairman Sarah Ann Skanchy and Vice Chairman C. Larry Anhder were present. Other Council members present were: Guy Ray Pulsipher, Layne M. Beck, H. Craig Petersen, Jerry L. Allen and Darrel L. Gibbons.

Other present were: Cache County Executive M. Lynn Lemon, Cache County Clerk Stephen M. Erickson, Cache County Auditor Tamra Stones, Cache County Attorney Scott Wyatt, Administrative Executive Assistant Michael Nilson, State Fair Representative Russ Fjelsted, Logan Job Service Office Manager Ted M. Nyman. A new Political Reporter from the Herald Journal Charles Featherstone, Bridgerland Tourist Council Director Maridene Alexander, Representative from the local news media and other interested citizens.

CALL TO ORDER

Council Chairman Sarah Ann Skanchy called the meeting to order at 5:00 p.m. and welcomed all who were in attendance.

INVOCATION

The invocation was given by Councilman H. Craig Petersen.

AGENDA & MINUTES

The meeting agenda was discussed and approved.

The minutes from the regular Council meeting held on February 13, 1996 and sent to all members of the Council were discussed, corrected and approved.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE REPORT

The County Executive M. Lynn Lemon reported on the following items:

1. Appointments:

Appointment: Falslev, Michael to Benson Planning District

Appointment: Griffin, Kelly to Co. Board of Adjustments

A motion to approve the two appointments was made by Councilman Gibbons. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

- 2. Cloud Seeding: North America Weather Consultants have been able to cloud seed more this winter because of the number of storms going through the area. Lemon reported that the money budgeted for the program has been spent. NAW Consultants want to continue the program and have said that the State may have some additional funding for the program. Lemon said that we are at 129% of normal for water in our area and he has sent a letter to NAW Consultants asking them to terminate the program for the rest of the year. The Council agreed that the program should be terminated.
- 3. County Jail Security: The County Jail security has been a concern for some time due to the recent prison escapings in Salt Lake and Weber Counties. Lemon said that the Sheriffs Department has informed him that our Jail security is good and the escaps in SLC and Weber Counties were due to over crowding in unsecured areas in their jails.
- 4. PCIB Applications: The State PCIB Committee has asked the County to prioritize the two PCIB Applications that we have sent to them to fund. The two applications are both from USU one from the Agriculture Department for a agricultural waste disposal demo facility and the other from the Human Environments Department for a program to assist in family counseling and finance planning. The State has asked each applicant to furnish a 20% match for their projects. The Council discussed the merits of the two projects and it was determined that both were good projects and they would give the County citizens help in their respective areas.

Councilman Gibbons moved that the County Executive ask the State to fund the projects without prioritizing them. If they won't then place the Family Assistance and Counseling project first. The Agriculture waste project would remain first on future funding allocations. It was properly seconded and carried unanimously.

Warrants: The warrants were presented to the County Clerk for filing.

UTAH STATE FAIR: RUSS FJELSTED

Russ Fjelsted, from Logan City and a member of the State Fair Board of Directors appeared before the Council to update them on the State Fair. Fjelsted said that he represents the Northern part of the State on the Board covering Cache, Box Elder and Rich Counties. He thanked the Council for supporting the State Fair and

mentioned that our county had the number one County Booth and the number one quilt came from Cache County. Many other exhibits also came from Cache County. Fjelsted asked Council members to become involved at the State Fair on the scheduled Counties day.

JOB SERVICE REPORT: TED M. NYMAN

The manager of the Logan Job Service Office Ted M. Nyman appeared before the Council to report on activities at the Job Nyman presented resource and reference materials to assist the Council in recognizing what Job Service is doing in the State and the County. Nyman said that they expect the Unemployment rate to remain low, as it has in the past. In 1994, Cache County's average unemployment rate was 2.8% and in 1995, it was 3.1%. compares to the State's 3.4% in 1995 and the Nation's 5.6%. In the year 1994 Job Service had a job placement of 5,189 and 6742 new or renewed applications totaling 15,869. Nyman said that these figures are remarkable when you consider the county's labor force Job Service works well with other private employment at 41,154. agencies in the County and they continue to work with the Bear River Association of Governments. They now have a satellite office located at the Bridgerland Applied Technology Center and have cooperative linkages with USU and local High Schools. members were invited to visit the Job Service office anytime.

PUBLIC HEARING: SURPLUS REAL PROPERTY-TRENTON-CORNISH GRAVEL PITS

Chairman Skanchy convened at 5:50 p.m. a scheduled Public Hearing to receive input on a proposal to declare the Trenton and Cornish gravel pits as surplus. Executive Lemon reported that the two pits have served there usefulness to the County. The gravel in the Trenton pit is of poor quality and can only be used as fill. The Cornish pit is the same and most of the gravel has been extracted. Lemon said that Newton, Trenton and Clarkston have been leasing the Trenton pit for a \$1.00 a year in the past and are now willing to buy the pit for \$25.00. An offer on the Cornish pit has not been made yet.

Chairman Skanchy asked for audience comment.

Andrew, Paul S., the Mayor of Trenton told the Council that he agrees that the Trenton pit has poor quality of gravel and can only be used as fill and small graveling projects.

Allred, Grace, a former resident of Newton told the Council that the gravel pit being discussed is part of Little Mountain between Newton, Clarkston and Trenton.

Additional comments from the audience were asked for. No additional comments were given.

A motion to close the Public Hearing was made by Councilman Petersen. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

Councilman Gibbons moved to declare the two gravel pits as surplus and authorize the administration to negotiate the sale thereof and present the action in Resolution form at the next Council meeting. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

PUBLIC HEARING: BUDGET 1996 OPENING

Chairman Skanchy convened a Public Hearing on the opening of the 1996 budget at 6:00. p.m.

County Auditor Tamra Stones reviewed the proposed changes in the 1996 Budget associated revenue and expenditures changes. Stones said that a new line item has been created to handle funding for State prisoners medical and dental needs being housed in the County jail. The grants used to finance the County Bookmobile was also discussed. It was reported that funding from the State for Bookmobile services will be decreasing a little each year due to funding cuts.

The County Attorney Scott Wyatt reported to the Council that he had found, from his own budget, the matching funds necessary to receive the State grant money. The grant will be used to assist in the legal needs for victims of crime in the county.

Chairman Skanchy asked for any public comment from the audience. No public comments were made.

A motion to close the Public Hearing was made by councilman Beck. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

RESOLUTION NO. 96-07: BUDGET-1996-AMENDMENTS

The adoption of Resolution No. 96-07 will amend the 1996 budget as discussed by the County Auditor Tamra Stones.

It was moved by Councilman Gibbons to adopt Resolution No. 96-07. It was properly seconded and carried unanimously.

TOURIST COUNCIL QUARTERLY REPORT: ALEXANDER, MARIDENE

The Director of the Bridgerland Tourist Council Maridene Alexander met with the Council to discuss that organizations quarterly report and activities.

Alexander reported that the Transient Room Tax increased 27% in Cache County and 40% in Rich Counties. The Tourist Councils budget was discussed and will be presented during the next quarterly report.

The Governor's Conference on Tourism will be in Cache Valley in May this year and the Bridgerland Tourist Council will be hosting the event.

PUBLIC HEARING SET: CERTIFIED TAX RATE

It was moved by Vice Chairman Anhder to set a Public Hearing on the 1996 Certified Tax Rate for August 13, 1996 at 6:00 p.m.. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

PUBLIC HEARING SET: BUDGET-1997-ADOPTION

Councilman Pulsipher moved to set a Public Hearing to adopt the 1997 budget on November 26, 1996 at 6:00 p.m.. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

The Council adjourned from the regular Council meeting into a Board of Equalization.

PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION REQUESTS

The following applications for property tax exemption were presented to the Board of Equalization for action:

- 1. Bear River Mental Health
- 2. New Discoveries Inc.

The above two requests were for charitable purposes.

A motion to approve the two requests was made by Board member Darrel L. Gibbons. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

3. Whittier Community Center for charitable purposes.

The Whittier Community Center was denied tax exemption last year. However, the Center appealed the Boards decision to the State Tax Commission and exemption was granted.

Board member Guy Ray Pulsipher moved to approve the request. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

4. The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints for religious purposes. Six new parcels were presented as well as those that have been approved in the past.

It was moved by Board Member Darrel L. Gibbons to approve the requests. It was properly seconded and carried unanimously.

The Board discussed an application from IHC, but took no action. It will be on a future agenda for discussion and decision making. Their request is the same this year as it was last year.

The Board of Equalization adjourned from its meeting back into the regular Council meeting.

RESOLUTION NO. 96-08: NIBLEY CITY WELL AGREEMENT

The adoption of Resolution No. 96-08 creates an agreement between the City of Nibley and Cache County concerning a well permit and gravel extraction.

Vice Chairman Anhder moved for the adoption of Resolution No. 96-08. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS: UPDATE

Executive Lemon presented to the Council an updated (1996) copy of the County Capital Improvement Plan. The Plan has proposed projects through the year 2000. The Council discussed the Plan and made reference to certain projects such as road chipping etc.

Executive Lemon will continue to monitor the projects listed on the updated plan.

A motion to approve the Capital Improvement Plan was made by Councilman Allen. It was seconded and passed unanimously.

The Council adjourned from the regular Council meeting into a Board of Trustees Service District No. 1.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES SERVICE DISTRICT NO. 1: MEETING

The Board listened to Executive Lemons report on a meeting that the Solid Waste Advisory Board had held and the recommendations they will present to the Board of Trustees. The recommendations are to adopt a proposed option on fee increases and the handling of recyclable materials. The issue will be on the next meetings agenda on March 12, 1996.

The Board of Trustees Service District No. 1 adjourned from their meeting back into the regular Council meeting.

COUNTY FAIR (1996) DATES: DISCUSSED

The County Clerk Steve Erickson reported that the dates for the 1996 County Fair are August 8th, 9th and 10th 1996.

LEGISLATIVE (1996): UPDATE

The Council discussed some of the bills currently before the State Legislature such as the Work Force Bill and Certain Sales tax bills.

COUNCIL MEMBER REPORTS

Chairman Skanchy reported that Don Gale from KSL Radio and Television will be presenting a Centennial broadcast on all counties in the State this year. He has asked the County to provide information on certain items of interest in Cache County such as the top tourist attraction, the top historical event and the top economic producer in the County. Chairman Skanchy will reply to Gales request.

ADJOURNMENT

No further business was presented for action or discussion and

the meeting adjourned at 7:15 p.m.

This resolution shall take effect immediately upon adoption and the County Auditor and other county officials are authorized and directed to act accordingly.



SECTION 1: RELEASE AGREEMENT

The attached Release Agreement between Cache County and Nibley City is hereby approved and the County Council of Cache County authorizes the County Executive to execute the same.

SECTION 2: PRIOR RESOLUTIONS, POLICIES OR ACTIONS

This resolution supersedes all prior resolutions, actions and policies of Cache County to the extent they are in conflict with the specific provisions hereof.

SECTION 3: EFFECTIVE DATE

This resolution shall become effective immediately upon adoption.

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RELEASE AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made entered into as of the 1st day of January, 1996, by and between NIBLEY CITY, a Utah municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as "Nibley", and CACHE COUNTY, a Utah County body politic, hereinafter referred to as "County".

RECITALS:

- A. Cache County owns a gravel pit near Nibley City and the County is actively extracting gravel from it.
- B. The gravel pit is located over or near the recharge area for a spring water source utilized by Nibley for culinary water purposes.
- C. Over fourteen years ago, concerns regarding the potential damage that could be caused to Nibley's referenced culinary water source resulting in a filing by the County of an application to drill a well near the gravel pit. The well is to be drilled in the event that the County's gravel extracting operation prevents Nibley from using the referenced spring water for culinary purposes.
- D. To date, the County's extracting operation has not caused problems sufficient to require the drilling of the well.
- E. The County's application with the State Engineer's Office bears No. 25-8200 (A55372) and an extension of time within which to submit proof of beneficial use contemplated by the referenced water right was granted through July 31, 2002, by the State Engineer.
- F. The County does not have or operate a municipal culinary water system, nor does it have any plans to do so any time in the future. Nibley presently owns and operates a culinary water distribution system. State law specifically provides that in considering whether or not an applicant has diligently pursued the construction of works by which to place water to a beneficial use, the State Engineer shall consider the holding of an approved application by any municipality, to meet the reasonable future requirements of the public to be reasonable and due diligence within the meaning of the law.
- G. Nibley is in a better position to hold the referenced application and to submit requests for additional time in which to submit proof of beneficial use by reason of its ownership of its culinary water system.
- H. Nibley desires to have the referenced application and the water rights represented by it, transferred by the County to Nibley; and the County is willing to make such a transfer provided a partial release from liability is extended from Nibley to the County. The agreement between the parties shall be represented by

this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms and covenants contained in this Agreement, the parties hereby agrees as follows:

- 1. The County agrees to transfer all of its right, title and interest in Water Right Application No. 25-8200 (A55372), which is presently pending with the Utah State Engineer's Office. The County agrees to make the transfer by a properly executed water deed, or other appropriate instrument sufficient for the State Engineer's Office to complete the transfer contemplated by this Agreement.
- 2. Nibley agrees that in consideration of the transfer stated in paragraph 1, above, that Nibley hereby releases and forever discharges Cache County and any of its officers, employees and agents, from any and all potential liability now known or unknown, foreseeable or unforeseeable, from Cache County's use of its portion of the gravel pit located in the vicinity of Nibley's culinary water springs, except for liability for increased pumping costs if the City is required to drill a well by reason of the County's extraction activities near Nibley springs and except for any liability caused by any intentional or unlawful acts of Cache County and any of its officers, employees and agents. regard, Nibley specifically agrees to assume all obligations for expenses related to the drilling of such a well and for purchasing and placing all required items to make the well functional, including a pump, pipes, pump house and all other related appurtenances so as to introduce the water from the well into Nibley's culinary water system. It is understood by both parties that Nibley currently pumps water from its springs into its reservoir. The liability retained by the County is for the difference in the cost for pumping the water from any new well that is required by reason of the County's extraction activities, over the cost for pumping the water from the City's springs.
- 3. It is further understood and agreed that if Nibley is required to remove the springs from its culinary water system because of contamination or problems not related to the County's gravel extractions, then no further liability shall be assessed against the County. In such event, however, Nibley shall be able to proceed and drill the well contemplated by said application and utilize the water from the well, without further obligation to the County. Nibley shall also be able to take all necessary steps to preserve said application and in this regard within Nibley's discretion, Nibley may file the necessary application with the State Engineer to add its current well as an additional point of diversion for the application referred to above and utilize the water through its current well.
- 4. The release and all other terms contained in this Agreement are conditioned upon the City being able to successfully drill a new well, and/or add an additional point of diversion to the existing well, based upon said application, or a suitable,

substitute application, and be able to access sufficient replacement water for that lost from its springs by reason of the County's gravel extraction operation. In the event the County's extraction operation results in the loss of the spring water as a culinary water source for Nibley, and further, in the event no water is available by reason of said application to replace the water lost from the springs, then this Agreement shall be null and void.

- 5. This Agreement shall be deemed effective upon the date that the Chief Administrative Officer of each party has executed this Agreement and the Agreement has been approved by the legislative body of each party.
- 6. This Agreement shall be conditioned upon the legislative body of each party adopting a resolution approving and authorizing this Agreement.
- 7. This Agreement supersedes and revokes any and all prior agreements regarding the subject matter contained herein.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the parties have caused this Agreement to be executed in duplicate, each of which shall deemed an original.
