CACHE COUNTY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

September 9, 1997

The Cache County Council met in regular session on the 9th day of September, 1997 in the County Council Chambers located at 120 North 100 West, Logan, Utah 84321.

ATTENDANCE

Council Chairman Darrel L. Gibbons was present. Vice Chairman C. Larry Anhder was absent and excused. Council members present were: Sarah Ann Skanchy, Guy Ray Pulsipher, Cory Yeates. Councilman H. Craig Petersen was absent and excused. Councilman Beck arrived late.

Others present were: County Executive, M. Lynn Lemon, County Clerk, Stephen M. Erickson, County Auditor, Tamra Stones, County Sheriff, Lynn Nelson, County Attorney, Scott Wyatt, County-Wide Planner, Mark Teuscher, County Executive Administrative Assistant, Mike Nilson, Bio West Representative, Tom Tweed, UDOT Representatives Rod Terry & Dyke M. Lafevre, County TV Translator Management Director, Mike Breagger, County Fire Chief, Kelly Pitcher, Council Secretary, Pat Parker, Members of the local news media and other interested citizens.

CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Darrel L. Gibbons at 5:00 p.m.. Chairman Gibbons welcomed all who were in attendance.

INVOCATION

The invocation was given by Councilman Guy Ray Pulsipher.

AGENDA & MINUTES

The agenda was reviewed, adjusted and approved.

The minutes of the regular Council meeting held on August 26, 1997, were discussed, corrected and approved.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE REPORT

The County Executive M. Lynn Lemon reported on the following items:

1. CDBG Project Sponsorship Requests: The Neighborhood Non

Profit Housing Corporation and the Hispanic Center are requesting that the County sponsor their CDBG applications for their projects. There will be a CDBG, How to Apply Workshop held on September 30, 1997, Executive Lemon will attend. The two additional projects will be added to the Countys five year project plan.

2. The County Warrants for the periods of August 23 to August 28 and August 29 to September 4, 1997 were presented to the County Clerk for filing.

TV TRANSLATOR UPDATE: BREAGGER, MIKE

The County TV translator maintenance contractor, Mike Breagger, appeared before the Council to update them on the TV translator on top of Mount Pisgah, in the South end of the County. Breagger reported, that there are six TV translators which bring in six TV channels. The channels are then relayed to the whole county. The translators are 20 years old and are out dated. It impossible to find replacement parts for them. The reception at the translators is marginal and in turn gives the county a marginal signal. Breagger told the Council that to replace the translators it would cost around \$25,000 each and an extra \$10,000 for each of the translators antennas. Breagger suggested that a TV Translator District be organized to finance necessary improvements. Some Council members suggested moving the translator location to the Clarkston area for better reception. However the FCC (Federal Communication Commission) only approves a request once every five Breagger and Executive Lemon were asked to draft a five year TV Translator improvement plan for council review.

FAIR, COUNTY-1997 REPORT: ERICKSON, STEPHEN M.

The County Clerk, Steve Erickson, presented a written report on the 1997 County Fair.

Erickson thanked the Council and Executive Lemon for supporting the County Fair.

COUNCILMAN BECK ARRIVED AT THE MEETING AT THIS TIME.

LOGAN CANYON HIGHWAY UPDATE: TERRY, ROD - UDOT

Bio West is a resource problem solving company in Logan who is working with the Utah Department of Transportation to construct two new bridges on Highway 89 in Logan Canyon. UDOT representative Rod Terry, told the Council that the Burnt bridge has had very little environmental impact in the Canyon and it will be completed

in October. The lower Twin Bridge, however has run into construction problems and will not be completed before winter sets in. Terry reviewed three options that they are considering to best serve the traveling public. They are considering finishing one lane of the new bridge and using the old bridge for another lane making a lane in each direction for the winter.

Terry mentioned that the State has set aside one million dollars to study a proposed Cache Valley Highway. He also reviewed other projects being proposed in the county such as future traffic lights and widening the highway from Smithfield to Richmond possibly in the year 2003. A rest area and over look to Bear Lake has been funded as part of the Logan Canyon Highway project.

BOARD OF EQUALIZATION OFFICER RECOMMENDATIONS APPROVAL: DISCUSSION

The Council discussed the remaining schedule for the Board of Equalization hearings and reviewed the proposed changes in property valuations that were presented by the B of E Sec., Tamra Stones.

Council member Sarah Ann Skanchy moved to approve the valuation changes. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

Councilman Pulsipher commended the Auditor and Appraisers for the fine work they have done and are doing during the B of E hearings and taxing process.

RESOLUTION NO. 97-21: BUDGET OPENING-1997

The County Auditor, Tamra Stones, presented to the Council Resolution No. 97-21 which if adopted will increase appropriations to some County Departments. The Council discussed the proposed budget adjustments and how it would effect the budget. member Skanchy recommended that certain items in the Resolution be deleted and be addressed during the 1998 budget workshops. Executive Lemon told the Council that the revenue taken in by the County this year has been greater than anticipated. Most of the items that the departments are requesting were deleted from what they had requested in their 1997 budgets. We can now, with the extra revenue, fund some of those items. Lemon is recommending that most of the requests be approved. It was determined by the Council that certain areas be adjusted or deleted. The following items were adjusted or deleted: 1. The Auditors request reduced to \$4,500 for a lap top computer. 2. Jail equipment request reduced to \$52,000 to purchase Video Imaging equipment. 3. Delete the Equipment requests in the Surveyors and Fire Departments. 4. Reduce the Sundry Expense to \$10,000.

Councilman Yeates moved to adopt Resolution NO. 97-21 with the above mentioned amendments. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

LAND USE PLAN-COUNTY-WIDE COMPREHENSIVE: DISCUSSION

Chairman Gibbons told the Council that the Planning Commission are trying to finalize their efforts to draft a Land Use Plan as soon as possible. Councilman Pulsipher, who represents the Council on the Planning Commission, told the Council that he thinks that the Commission is close to making a recommendation to the Pulsipher mentioned that they Council. have concern subdivisions and road development. The County-Wide Planner, Mark Teuscher said that the plan is designed to help prevent conflicts between communities and the County on roads and other issues. Council member Skanchy said that letters have been received from land developers concerning the emphasis put on agriculture. Chairman Gibbons said that the proposed changes in zoning are new and may be hard to implement. Skanchy suggested taking that part of the plan that lists various ideas and items that are proposed for creating a new Land Use Ordinance and study them before making the new Ordinance. The Planning Commission will be asked to have their recommendations finalized for presentation to the Council on October 14, 1997.

SHERIFF'S REQUEST- FULL TIME EMPLOYEE AS COURT BAILIFF: DISCUSSION

The County Sheriff, Lynn Nelson, discussed with the Council the need they have in the Sheriff's Department for a full time merit employee as bailiff in the courts. Nelson said that the position is now being filled by part time employees and it becomes hard to staff and to manage. A full time employee will help solve problems with scheduling and salary. The Courts are now paying part of the salary for that position. The proposed employee was on the agenda for consideration during this meeting. The request will be on the next Council meeting agenda for further discussion.

PARADE: USU HOMECOMING-OCTOBER 18, 1997

The Council has been invited to be part of the 1997 USU Homecoming parade on October 18, 1997. Council members were encouraged to participate.

COUNCIL MEMBER REPORTS

Council member Skanchy: Reported that she had attended the

UDOT meeting in Brigham City with other County Representatives. A list of projects being considered by UDOT was obtained. Some are not funded but are still on a potential list for construction. Skanchy will also attend a Regional Work Force Services meeting on September 10, 1997.

Chairman Gibbons: Reported on a BRAG meeting that he had attended. BRAG has spent \$120,000 to up grade their building at 170 North Main. The new land fill in Box Elder County is large enough to take in waste from Cache County and the idea may be considered in fifteen or twenty years.

The Summer Workshop for County Commissioners and Councilmen will be held at Rubys Inn near Bryce Canyon on September 25. who want to attend are to let Pat know as soon as possible.

1997 COUNTY FAIR REPORT

The following items are listed for Council review and contain some suggestions for certain departments of the fair:

POULTRY, RABBITS & PIGEONS

We had one chicken die which was caused by excessive heat in the building. The Humane Society are asking that something be done to this building to prevent further death. We are suggesting that another cooler be installed, the building insulated, and a concrete floor installed. The number of exhibits increased by 10%. This department can't forget how Logan City Zoo took over their comfortable building with a promise to upgrade the building they now use.

HOME ARTS

We had more entries especially in the quilt division. Some improvements to the building have been made (new roof) and some needs still exist. The display units need to be refinished, painting etc. Plexiglass to replace wire in fruit exhibit area. Floor needs to be painted.

FINE ARTS

A new Chairman of this department lead to some confusion, but things went well. We did have some vandalism of some exhibits.

ENTERTAINMENT

On Thursday night the Farm Bureau Talent Find takes two hours and some have suggested that they have the Talent Find before the fair and have the winners entertain us at the fair.

COMMUNITY BOOTHS

We had seven (7) of the 19 communities represented this year. We suggest that the cities give us a name to contact before June 1 so we can furnish information and hopefully get better participation. We are also asking service groups such as Senior Citizen Center etc. to take left over space for displaying or advertising. This year the City of Providence took first place and will be representing the County at the State Fair.

COMMERCIAL BOOTHS

The commercial booths seem to add variety to the fair and really are a good way to attract people to the fair. We sold 230 booths totaling nearly \$23,000. We could have sold a lot more but we feel that the area becomes to crowded with additional booths. The electricity needs to be upgraded for all commercial booths.

LIVESTOCK OPEN AND JUNIOR SHOWS

The Sheep, Swine and Livestock shows are always a delight to watch and to see how much work the youth and Open Class exhibitors put into the events. We have received complaints of not having enough electricity in the Cache arena for grooming their animals. This year we had an increase in numbers in all shows. We saw nearly as many Jersey dairy cattle as Holstein.

GOATS

The 4-H now has a club organized to help youth who have a desire to work with goats. We have two goat shows with quite a few goats being exhibited. We are in the process of adjusting their premiums to bring them in line with the rest of the fair shows.

HORSE SHOWS

We have a number of 4-H horse activities during the fair as well as three open shows. The shows provide opportunities for every horse lover in the area to participate and win ribbons and prize money. All events are well attended and have large numbers of participants.

RODEO

The rodeo is always the main attraction of the fair, drawing large numbers of rodeo people and cowboys from the inter-mountain area. We had the privilege of having the head Dodge Truck series man from back East visit our rodeo this year. He told the committee that this was the best rodeo he had seen of its size. The ticket sales were around \$35,000. We have suggested that we have a specialty act along with better clown acts. Those who attended the rodeo noticed that we had a large number of top rated cowboys participate this year. The committee says it is because of the additional added prize money we had.

The Rodeo has a sparate budget and now have incorporated with their own by-laws. Their goal is to eventually be on their own and to be able to put the Rodeo on themselves with out county funding.

ADVERTISING

Advertising is always a problem. We have a number of newspapers, TV and radio stations who want us to advertise the fair with them. We try to balance the budget to give as many as we can the opportunity to advertise for us.

CARNIVAL AND AMUSEMENTS (RIDES & GAMES)

This year we had the Big Sky Amusements out of Phoenix, AZ. We had some complaints that the rides were dirty and not safe. They are presently in Chapter 11 bankruptcy and we hope we can get

out of next years contract with them. We have been contacted by two other Amusement Companies, who would like to come to our fair.

We did however, receive as our percentage of the rides, nearly \$11,000.

IN GENERAL

The 1997 fair was well attended and very successful. The weather cooperated with most of the events. The rides had trouble setting up and taking down, both were done in rain storms. We had good help from the Logan City Parks and Recreation Department. However, some how I get the feeling that they believe we don't do any thing for the fairgrounds and all we do is take that week and give nothing in return. I think they should be reminded of the \$180,000 we budget for the Willow Park Complex and the thousands of dollars of Restaurant Tax we have given to them.

My office has now managed the fair for seven years without any compensation. I have a concern that the fair is maybe some what stagant and it could be a nicer event if you had new management and could afford to spend more money. I suggest that more of the Restaurant Tax be used for its operation.

We have so many talented people who are willing to sacrifice their own time to help put the fair together. It is amazing and heart warming.

This report is not final but intended to cover the necessary items and concerns. Our bills are almost all paid and it looks like we will be under budget again this year.
