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#### CACHE COUNTY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

March 10, 1998

The Cache County Council met in a regular session on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of March 1998 in the County Council Chambers located at 120 North 100 West, Logan, Utah 84321.

#### **ATTENDANCE**

Council Chairman Darrel L. Gibbons and Vice Chairman Cory Yeates were present. Council members present: Layne M. Beck, Guy Ray Pulsipher, H. Craig Petersen, Sarah Ann Skanchy and C. Larry Anhder.

Others present: County Executive, M. Lynn Lemon, County Clerk, Stephen M. Erickson, County Auditor, Tamra Stones, County Sheriff, Lynn Nelson, County Zoning Administrator, Lorene Greenhalgh, County Attorney, Scott Wyatt, County Executive Administrative Assistant, Mike Nilson, Utah Department of Natural Resources, Regional Director, Robert Hasenyager, American Heritage Center, Representatives, James Bailey & Rhonda Thompson, County Fire Chief, Kelly Pitcher, Benson Culinary Improvement District, Representative, Nick Galloway, County Wide Planner, Mark Teuscher, Members of the local news media and other interested citizens.

#### CALL TO ORDER

Chairman Darrel L. Gibbons called the meeting to order at 5:00 p.m..

#### **INVOCATION**

The invocation was given by Councilman Guy Ray Pulsipher.

#### AGENDA & MINUTES

The agenda for the meeting was discussed, adjusted and approved.

The minutes of the regular meeting held on February 24, 1998 were discussed, corrected and approved.

#### REPORT OF THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE

The County Executive, M. Lynn Lemon, reported on the following items:

- 1. Restaurant Tax: Lemon reported that the 1998 restaurant tax applications have been sent out to all Cities and entities who have requested them. Some revisions in the application were made. A list of funded projects not yet completed was also presented to the Council.
- 2. CDBG Project Funds Allocation: A meeting to discuss choosing projects for CDBG funding will be held after the regular BRAG meeting in Brigham City. Council members were asked to and attend to express their concerns.
- 3. Bear River Commission: A public hearing to receive citizen input on water issues in the Bear River region will be held on March 26<sup>th</sup> in the Council Chambers. Council members were invited to attend.
- 4. State Road Legislation: A bill to turn some State Highways over to the county and municipalities has passed and will take effect July 1999. It will add an additional 114 miles of highway maintenance to the County. Lemon told the Council that he had voiced his and the Councils objection to the legislation during a recent visit to the legislature.
- 5. Surplus Property Nibley Business Park. The original property owners of a lot in the Nibley Business Park that was sold during a May Tax Sale and recently declared surplus have bid on the parcel and are willing to pay the high bid. Paper work for the sale will be presented for Council approval at the next Council meeting.
- 6. Mayor's Association Meeting: The Council and their companions have been invited to attend the Mayor's Association meeting on June 13<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 p.m.. The Governor and his wife will be attending. Council members will pay for their own meals.
- 7. Jailhouse Issues: Executive Lemon, Chairman Gibbons, Sheriff Nelson and Court Judges have met to discuss jailhouse issues. They are proposing contracting with Box Elder County to solve some over crowding problems at the jail. The issue, because of funding needs, will be further discussed during this evenings Public Hearing to adjust the 1998 County budget.
- 8. Utah Affordable Housing Plan: Lemon has received a manual from the State regarding affordable housing. The manual was drafted as a plan to develop an affordable housing plan and will be in his office for review.
- 9. Cloud Seeding: Cloud seeding was terminated on February 28. Lemon reported that the snow on the Bear River range in the South end of the County is now above normal.
- 10. Warrants: The county warrants for the periods of February 21 to February 26 and February 27 to March 3, 1998 were presented to the County Clerk for filing.

#### **PUBLIC HEARING: CDBG SECOND**

Executive Lemon convened a second CDBG public hearing to receive input on county-sponsored CDBG-FUNDED projects for 1998 & 1999 at 5:15 p.m.. The following projects are part of the Small City program, sponsored by Cache County. 1. Neighborhood Nonprofit Housing Corporation, \$139,000.00 for housing mortgage buy down for single family housing. 2. Cache Employment & Training Center \$90,200.00 for facility expansion. 3. Hispanic Center \$35,000.00 for new program administration. 4. Citizens Against Physical & Sexual Abuse \$89,500.00 for facility expansion. 5. USU Family Life Center \$25,000.00 for housing and financial counseling workshops. There were representatives from each of the above-mentioned organizations present at the public hearing.

Lemon asked for public input? There was no response from the public.

A motion to close the public hearing was made by Councilman Anhder. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

Executive Lemon told the project representatives that they will have to complete their applications and have them turned into the State by May 1, 1998.

#### **BOARD OF EQUALIZATION**

A motion to adjourn from the regular Council meeting and convene a Board of Equalization meeting was made by Vice Chairman Yeates. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

The Board of Equalization considered the following tax exemption applications:

The following are for religious purposes:

- 1. Grace Baptist church
- 2. Maranatha Baptist Church
- 3. Full Gospel Fellowship
- 4. Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints
- 5. Cache Valley Christian Center
- 6. The North American Islamic Trust Inc.

Board member Yeates moved to approve the six religious requests. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

7. USU Research Foundation, for educational purposes.

8. Spendlove Research, for educational purposes.

It was moved by Board member Petersen to approve these two applications for educational purposes. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

9. Bridgerland Audubon Society, for Charitable and Educational purposes.

A motion to approve the Audubon Society request was made by Board member Anhder. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

10. Options for Independence, for educational purposes.

Board member Yeates moved to approve this request. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

11. Child and Family Support Center for charitable purposes.

A motion to approve this request was made by Board member Yeates. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

12. American Red Cross for charitable purposes.

Board member Beck moved to approve this request. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

13. New Discoveries Inc. for charitable purposes.

It was moved by Board member Yeates to approve the request. It was properly seconded and carried unanimously.

14. Community Nursing Service for charitable purposes.

The Board discussed this application and determined that the request was lacking necessary information to qualify for exemption.

It was moved by Board member Anhder to deny this application. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

The Community Nursing Service may appear before Board to appeal the Boards decision.

#### DELINQUENT PROPERTY TAX RECOMMENDATION: MOBILE HOME

The County Assessor is recommending that the delinquent taxes on a mobile home or 5<sup>th</sup> wheel trailer be canceled.

Board member Skanchy moved to accept the recommendation by the County Assessor and cancel the property taxes on the unavailable mobile home. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

The Clerk of the Board, Tamra Stones, told the Board that she has received some appeals for property taxes on mobile homes. A hearing to hear the appeals will be scheduled through her office.

THE BOARD OF EQUALIZATION ADJOURNED BACK INTO THE REGULAR-COUNCIL MEETING.

#### <u>DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES PAYMENT IN LIEU OF TAXES:</u> HASENYAGER, ROBERT

The Director of the Northern Region of the State Department of Natural Resources, Robert Hasenyager presented to the Council a check for \$9,000.00 for payment in lieu of taxes. Hasenyager was asked how the elk herd above Richmond was doing? He reported that they have had very few complaints from property owners this year because they are feeding the elk on land close to their own habitat. Hasenyager presented a draft of a Wildlife Strategic Plan from the division and asked Council members to give input if they would like.

#### AMERICAN HERITAGE CENTER: THOMPSON, RHONDA

Rhonda Thompson, Associate Director, of the American Heritage Center, introduced to the Council, Mr. James Bailey, who is the Chairman of the American Heritage Foundation Board. Bailey reviewed the plans for expanding the Jensen Historical Farm near Wellsville into a Center of programs and attractions that will be designed to keep the heritage of the West in tact. The Center will be developed into a local tourist attraction and tourist destination location. Funding for the project is coming from the State Legislature and private contributions.

The President and CEO of the American Heritage Foundation, Dr. John Maestas, told the Council that there are more than 4000 buses of people going through Cache County every year without stopping. The foundation's desire is to build a destination point giving tourist some place to stop and spend the day or longer in Cache County. The American Heritage Foundation is asking the Council to consider giving \$90,000.00 a year for the next ten years. They intend to bond for \$500,000.00 to complete the Welcome Center at the facility. They will need \$50,000.00 a year to pay off the bond from the County Restaurant Tax. The total cost of the facility when completed will be near 42 million dollars.

#### **PUBLIC HEARING: BUDGET OPENING-1998**

Chairman Gibbons convened a public hearing at 6:00 p.m. to receive comment on proposed adjustments to the 1998 budget. The County Auditor, Tamra Stones, was asked to review the proposed changes in revenue and expenditures. Chairman Gibbons asked for public comment. There was no public response given.

# Councilman Petersen moved to close the public hearing. It was seconded and carried. Unanimously.

Council member Skanchy questioned the changes in the Sheriffs budget to purchase in car video systems on patrol cars and boarding out prisoner expense. Sheriff Nelson was asked to explain the reasons for video systems and boarding prisoners. Nelson said that two of their patrol cars now have the video systems and all the other deputies are in line for such a system. It provides for easier criminal prosecution and the deputies are more professional as they work with the public. Nelson said that the budget has the money and grant money to purchase more video systems. Nelson told the council that there has been an increase of 70% in the number of crimes in the county since 1993. Our Jailhouse is now at total capacity and judges are not happy when certain criminals can't be jailed or others have to be released to jail some others who have been prosecuted. The County Sheriff, County Executive and Council Chairman are recommending that funds be budgeted to house some county prisoners in the new Box Elder jail until a long term solution has been made.

#### **RESOLUTION NO. 98-08: BUDGET ADJUSTMENTS-1998**

The adoption of Resolution No. 98-08 will approve recommended changes in the 1998 general budget.

Councilman Petersen moved to adopt Resolution No. 98-08 with recommended changes. It was properly seconded and carried unanimously.

CHAIRMAN GIBBONS LEAVES THE MEETING AT THIS TIME 6:30 p.m.. Vice Chairman Yeates conducted the rest of the meeting.

#### MOSQUITO ABATEMENT: WHITNEY, GEORGE

The College-Young Mosquito Abatement District Director, George Whitney, appeared before the Council to ask for help to operate the district and review past activity of the District.

Whitney said that some thought has been given to expanding the District to other portions of the county. Amalga Town has been doing some spraying for mosquitos with the help of the cheese factory and other municipalities have expressed interest but nothing has been done. Whitney was asked to work with Executive Lemon concerning his questions.

#### ROAD POLICY AMENDMENTS: LEMON, M. LYNN

County Executive, M. Lynn Lemon, discussed an amended draft on proposed county road policy. He reported that all departments in the County that work with land use items, including the County Planning Commission seem to be in agreement and are willing to use this new draft until ordinances are adopted on land use.

Council member Skanchy made a motion to have the Administration draft an ordinance on road policy for Council review and approval at the next Council meeting. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

# RESOLUTION NO. 98-09: BENSON CULINARY IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT FINDINGS

The adoption of Resolution No. 98-09 will approve the findings that will allow annexation of certain real property in Benson be annexed into the Benson Culinary Improvement District.

Council member Skanchy moved to waive the rules of first and second reading and adopt Resolution No. 98-09. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

# RESOLUTION NO. 98-10: BENSON CULINARY IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT ANNEXATION

The adoption of Resolution No. 98-10 will authorize certain real property in Benson to be annexed into the Benson Culinary improvement District.

Council member Skanchy moved to waive the rules of first and second reading and adopt Resolution No. 98-10. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

#### **BOARD OF TRUSTEES-SERVICE AREA NO. 1: DISCUSSION**

The Council did not officially adjourn into a Board of Trustees-Service Area No. 1 because no official proposal from Logan City concerning an MRF facility had been presented. However the Council did discuss various issues regarding recycling of waste products that may be discussed with Logan City such as curb side recycling and a Materials Recycling Facility. Executive Lemon suggested that the Board make recommendations to Logan City concerning recycling issues. The matter will be on a future agenda.

#### **COUNCIL MEMBER REPORTS**

Councilman Petersen: Petersen asked Executive Lemon if he had received any proposal about library service from Logan City. Lemon said that he hadn't as yet but, he has talked to Mayor Doug Thompson who will forward some information later. Peterson asked Lemon that when he receives it he would like to have a copy sent to him.

#### **ADJOURNMENT**

No further business was presented and Vice Chairman Yeates adjourned the meeting at 7:00 p.m..

Dear Wildlife Enthusiast:

The Division of Wildlife Resources is preparing a statewide strategic plan for wildlife management and needs your input. We want to hear your concerns and ideas on the major issues facing wildlife and wildlife management in Utah.

In November, 1997, we prepared a draft assessment of factors, both internal to the Division and operating apart from us, which we believe are important to wildlife management in Utah. We received initial feedback on the assessment at informal meetings with Division staff and others in December. Based on that initial feedback, we have prepared a summary which we would now like to share with a broader constituency.

The Division has invited representatives of about 30 groups with strong interests in wildlife to attend meetings in Salt Lake City during February to participate in setting the direction of wildlife management in Utah for the next decade. During this same period, regional and Salt Lake staff will be visiting other groups of local government and wildlife enthusiasts around the state to present the assessment information and obtain input on the direction of the strategic plan. If you would like to have a Division representative attend a meeting with your group, please contact us as described at the end of the letter.

We also encourage you to comment in writing, as well. As listed on the attached comment sheet, we ask you for three types of information: first, please review the assessment summary and point out any information which from your perspective appears to be wrong; second, identify any areas that you feel are important for wildlife management in Utah, but which we have missed; and finally, please tell us what specific issues and concerns you have with wildlife and wildlife management in Utah. At this stage we are still gathering information and your ideas are as important as everyone else's.

Once these meetings are concluded, and we have obtained the results of a Utah State University public opinion survey which is being conducted this winter, issues and concerns will be summarized and used to help us draft goals and objectives for the Division. As these take shape, we will again present them to the public for additional input through the Regional Advisory Council process this spring.

Please review the assessment and send your comments directly to the Division by March 13, 1998. The assessment summary has a tear-off comment sheet or you can write to Alan Clark, Wildlife Planning Manager, at the above address. Also, you may respond by e-mail (nrdwr.aclark@state.ut.us).

#### **Historical Overview**

- Creation of community non-profit board In 1995, USU provided the leadership to form the American West Heritage Foundation, a 501(c)(3) community-based organization of individuals committed to the growth and development of both the Festival of the American West and the Jensen Farm as unique western historical resources.
- Fifty-year management and lease agreement with USU The Foundation is operating under a fifty-year lease and management agreement with Utah State University for the Festival and the 127-acre farm property.
- Feasibility study and overall concept of Master Plan In 1996, the Foundation contracted with internationally acclaimed Leisure and Recreation Concepts (LARC) Inc., Dallas, Texas, for a feasibility study to determine the viability of the Festival and Farm as a western heritage tourist attraction. The feasibility study concluded that the nature of the project and its location in Cache Valley was viable. The study recommended that the festival be relocated from the USU campus to a permanent site and expanded from an eight-day event to a summer-long attraction. The feasibility study and master plan were funded in part by the Utah Travel Council, Bridgerland Travel Region, and Cache County Restaurant Tax.
- Legislative seed funding for construction of Welcome Center on site-During the legislative session of 1997, Representative Evan Olsen of College Ward successfully obtained \$300,000 as seed funding. These initial funds are designated for the design, planning and construction of a Welcome/Hospitality Center for northeastern Utah on the American West Heritage Center site. The Welcome facility will be the gateway into heritage activities of the Center. Seventy-five thousand dollars of this amount was appropriated to the Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT) for necessary changes in the local US 89/91 to provide egress and regress to the Welcome Center. Estimated cost of the Welcome facility, to be operated by as part of the site, is \$1.2 million. Funding for the construction will be raised by the Foundation.
- Annexation of site by city of Wellsville After several months of discussions, the city of Wellsville, the first white settlement in Cache Valley, officially annexed all the property on which the Center is located. This positive endorsement of the project by the city means the extension of necessary utility services to the site.

• Completion of Master Plan for Fall of 1997 - A team was established to create the master plan spear-headed by Jay Nielsen, assistant director for Utah State University Campus Planning, and various board members, historians, entertainment specialists, and landscape architects working to create this unique Center.

#### Master Plan For American West Heritage Center

- Concept of the Center The American West Heritage Center will be a single location with several components that will give visitors an authentic western experience. The Center will explore the settling of the American West with areas showcasing Cache Valley history.
- Components of the Center The American West Heritage Center's vision statement is "Celebrating a Century of the American West (1820-1920). The Center will include the following areas:

Native American - This area will consist of a Native American Village set in 1820. It will include a tipi village along with willow and brush wigwams. Life skills, customs, and crafts of the Native Americans will be demonstrated in the village. Visitors will be able to watch and participate in demonstrations.

Mountain Men - Cache Valley's rich history of the mountain men, their rendezvous and fur trading will be explored in this area. It will include a fort, a trappers cabin, and a fur cache. The mountain men will be able to demonstrate trapping, spear throwing, and the life activities that took place in the fort.

Early Explores and Military - This area will include the history of the early explorers that headed west in search of new territories. It will also include the military history of the West. There will be artillery, military drills, and medicine demonstrations.

Early Settlements - The pioneer heritage will be strong in this area. Visitors will be able to watch log cabins being built and learn how to hewn logs. Many of the heritage craft demonstrations such as broom making, basket weaving, and rag rug weaving will take place in this area. This area will also contain dugouts that were representative of the first residences of the pioneers in Cache Valley.

Western Community - A life-size, functioning frontier town will be built that will include an Opera House, a bank, a general store, a grist mill, a church and a school. Visitors will be able to experience life in a real western town.

Jensen Historical Farm - The farm, set in 1917, will bring visitors back into the twentieth century. All property along the highway will be farmed with "horse-powered" equipment to maintain the historic character of the farm. Here, they will experience life on the farm which includes plowing, haying, threshing, cooking on a wood burning stove, candle making, rug weaving, and sheep sheering.

Man and His Bread Museum - The master plan also includes a new building that will house the "Man and His Bread" museum and other collections of the old west. This will be a state-of-the-art museum open year-round to the public. It will also provide an interactive history lesson to school children in Northern Utah as they study the American West.

#### **Timeline For Development**

- We are pleased to report that the Master Plan for the American West Heritage Center has been approved by the Board of Trustees and Utah State University Campus Planning. The Master Plan will be presented for approval to the State Legislature in their January session.
- Phase One beginning in 1998 will include the two modular structures (Livery and Opera House) built on permanent foundations, the initial construction of log cabins, dugouts, a wagon train, the amphitheater (location for the pageant production), the Native American Village, mountain man rendezvous, and the military camp.

Master planning, design and architectural drawings for the Welcome/Hospitality Center will be completed. Bids for construction of the facility will be awarded contingent on the completion of funding.

- The Festival will kick off their 8-day season at the Center for 1998 on July 31 and run through August 8 (closed on Sunday). Included with the Festival will be the historical pageant "The West: America's Odyssey.
- The project will be built in phases with the projected completion in 2001.

#### **Marketing Strategy**

- An aggressive marketing campaign, built on the efforts initiated with the National Tour Association and the American Bus Association, will be put into effect. This marketing program has been developed by the Center's marketing consultant working in conjunction with the Center's Assistant Director, Ronda Thompson.
- The Center will be marketed as the "Gateway to the West" offering vacationer's an opportunity to experience a comprehensive, hand-on history of the west.

The vision of the American West Heritage Foundation is to do more than just preserve the heritage of the West in static displays. We believe the Center will give visitors an actual glimpse into the past and allow them to experience first hand life in the old west. It will be a place for people to retreat from their busy automated lives, get back to the basics and find remnants of their grass roots. Our Center is a living history museum like no other found in the country. It will continue to promote the integrity and strength of all those early Native American, explorers, trappers, mountain men, and pioneers who wove the incredible tapestry of rich cultural heritage that we call the American West. 
