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CACHE COUNTY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

April 28, 1998

The Cache County Council met in regular session on the 28th day of April 1998 in the County Council Chambers located at 120 North 100 West Logan, Utah 84321.

ATTENDANCE

Council Chairman Darrel L. Gibbons and Vice Chairman Cory Yeates was both present. Council members present were: Layne M. Beck, Guy Ray Pulsipher, Sarah Ann Skanchy and C. Larry Anhder. Council member H. Craig Petersen was absent and excused.

Others present were: County Executive, M. Lynn Lemon, County Clerk, Stephen M. Erickson, County Auditor, Tamra Stones, County Attorney, Scott Wyatt, County Zoning Administrator, Lorene Greenhalgh, Logan City Mayor, Doug Thompson, Logan City Solid Waste Director, Roger Sunada, AARP Representatives, John Butcher & Favel Plant, Logan City Fire Chief, Paul Dextras, North Logan City Mayor, Jack Draxler, members of the local news media and other interested citizens.

CALL TO ORDER

Chairman Darrel L. Gibbons, called the meeting to order at 5:00 p.m. and welcomed all who were in attendance.

INVOCATION

The invocation was given by Executive M. Lynn Lemon.

AGENDA & MINUTES

The agenda for the meeting was reviewed, adjusted and approved.

The minutes of the regular Council meeting held on April 14, 1998 were discussed, corrected and approved.

REPORT OF THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE

The County Executive, M. Lynn Lemon, reported on the following items:

1. UDOT Meeting: Lemon attended a meeting with UDOT in Salt Lake City with an interim committee regarding turning State roads over to Counties and Cities. The current proposal is that the State will continue to have highway 89-91 except from 3200 South to East of

Logan and North of Smithfield. All other roads will be given to the Cities and County for jurisdiction. UAC is holding a meeting in conjunction with a road school about the proposed road transfer from the State. Lemon will be attending the school.

- 2. Jensen Historical Farm Road: Two meetings have been held with the Jensen Historical Farm people regarding a proposed road to the Center. The meetings were with concerned neighbors and UDOT representatives. Alternatives were discussed and it was decided to use alternative C. The road will be improved as they originally intended. Money has been given to UDOT through the State Legislature to improve the intersection. The County will work with Wellsville City if they (Wellsville City) will contribute the materials the County will furnish the labor and UDOT will pave the whole road and not just the intersection. During peak visiting times, another exit other than 3200 South will be used.
- 3. Building Needs Preliminary Study: A preliminary study of the present courts building has been completed. The study states that the Courts shouldn't purchase the present building from the County but should look for a building cite on Main Street in Logan to build a new building. Should this happen the report suggests that the County Executive's Office look for temporary office space while the Courts building is demolished and a new County Complex is constructed on that cite. The building need's preliminary study will be in the office of the County Executive for review.
- 4. Health Insurance: Educators' health insurance has increased their premium by 15% while PEHP has only increased by 2%. The increase will begin in July. The health insurance issue will be on a future agenda for discussion and decision.
- 5. Warrants: The warrants for the periods of April 2, 7, 14 & 20, 1998 were presented to the County Clerk for filing.

AARP HOUSE NUMBERING PROJECT: BUTCHER, DR. JOHN

Dr. John Butcher, a representative from the local chapter of the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP), appeared before the Council to ask for their support in a house numbering project for senior citizens in the County. The AARP Chapter is working with local government agencies such as USU Extension and Senior Citizen Center to place house numbers on homes that don't have them. Butcher said that it will help in time of emergency for ambulance drivers and policemen as well as the senior centers meals on wheels program. Some problems with the city and county numbering system was discussed. The Council thanked the AARP and gave them authorization for their project.

AMBULANCE BUDGET: DEXTRAS, FIRE CHIEF PAUL

Logan City Fire Chief, Paul Dextras, reviewed ambulance services in the county and the proposed budget for the coming year. Chief Dextras, who is the new fire Chief, replacing the retired Danny Deaver, told the Council that there has been a reorganization of the staff in his department without hiring additional personnel. Medical alarms continue to increase every year. Last year they had 2300 and they are projecting 2600 this year. Transfers to other Hospitals also continue to increase at a rapid pace. EMT's are well trained. Para-Medics, when they go on calls it is like taking the emergency room out to the field. However due to the number of calls there is a shortage of Para-Medics and he will be asking for 12 new additional positions to provide better emergency service in the County. Dextras stated that there are a number of calls that take all Para-Medics and ambulances and in other situations, 57% of the time they are called to an emergency asking for ambulance and EMT help. The 12 new positions will be funded from increased fees and collections and will not increase the budget. The County has previously agreed to cover any deficit in collection fees. Dextras replied that there hasn't been a deficit for a few years. Dextras is also asking that more of the EMT's receive six months of paramedic training at Weber State to better serve emergency victims. Dextras is also recommending that two emergency substations be constructed. One in the North East area of Logan and one in the South West area of Logan. They could then provide better service to the North Logan and Hyrum, Wellsville areas. Chief Dextras was asked to involve the EMS Council and the Mayors Association about his recommendations. A budget reflecting any contribution from the County was not submitted.

WILLOW PARK BUDGET: AKINA, RUSS

The Willow Park budget will be on the next agenda.

BUDGETARY MATTERS

The following Intra-Departmental budget transfers were considered by the council:

1. Extension: \$4,000.00

Councilman Anhder moved to approve the Extension transfer. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

2. Weed Department: \$4,000.00

It was moved by Councilman Anhder to approve the Weed Departments request. It was seconded and carried unanimously.

ROAD POLICY CHANGES: DISCUSSION

The County Planning Commission reported that they have concerns about the recently adopted road policy. Lorene Greenhalgh, the County Zoning Administrator, explained that there are different road policies in the unincorporated and incorporated areas when it comes to minor subdivisions of three to five lots. In municipalities they require the developer of minor subdivisions to hard surface the roads. Greenhalgh said that the Planning Commission believes that the unincorporated areas of the County should not be required to asphalt the roads. LaMar Clement, a member of the Planning Commission, expressed concern that the requirements for the County are too restrictive and would result in urbanizing the unincorporated areas of the county because property owners have to sell their property for additional single family dwellings to pay for paving the roads. Councilman Anhder said that the County always ends up paving for hard surfacing the roads later on. Clement argued that the County could use the gasoline road taxes they get, to up grade the roads. Executive Lemon said we don't want to limit development in the County but encourage citizens to build their homes in municipalities where services are available as much as possible. Members of the Planning Commission are suggesting that the County Executive or Council make the final decision to grant a permit to construct subdivisions. Chairman Gibbons said that the final plats are already approved by the Council. The Zoning Administrator, Lorene Greenhalgh, will rewrite another draft to change some wording in the Ordinance to reflect the Commissions request before the next Council meeting. The issue will be on the next Council meeting agenda.

RESOLUTION NO. 98-13: LOGAN CITY FIRE PROTECTION CONTRACT

The adoption of Resolution No. 98-13 will authorize the County Executive to enter into an Interlocal Agreement with Logan City for fire protection.

Council member Skanchy moved to adopt Resolution No. 98-13. It was properly seconded and carried unanimously.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES'S SOLID WASTE SERVICE AREA NO. 1: MEETING

The Council adjourned from the regular council meeting into a Board of Trustee's for Solid Waste.

Roger Sunada, the Director of the Logan City Solid Waste Department, appeared before

the Council to review proposed Resolutions, that if adopted would address changes in handling waste and set a new fee schedule.

Sunada reviewed some changes in the Resolutions that were made by the Logan City Council. The Resolutions will be presented to the Logan City Council for their approval. Gibbons who sits on the Solid Waste Advisory Board stated that the Board was unanimous in approving the changes. Sunada told the Trustee's that the proposed fee structure is to encourage customers to recycle and by so doing will extend the life of the land fill. Trustee Beck questioned the number of customers who may switch to the 60 gal. waste containers. Sunada said that they anticipate at least 25% will change to the 60 gal. containers. Trustee Anhder mentioned that the Council has received a letter from Providence City Mayor Leonhardt, the President of the County Mayor's Association, stating that the Mayor's are not in favor of the fee increase and that the Mayor's haven't really had a chance to address the issue. Trustee Beck reviewed some assumed projections that would come from the increase in fees. Beck figured that there would be a 1.3 million-dollar increase in revenue to the solid waste department. Beck is concerned that it will be too much of a burden on home owners to increase the fees 30% just to pay for additional land around the landfill, an educational program and to construct a demolition debris station. Logan City Mayor, Doug Thompson recommended that a special meeting of the Mayor's Association be held to discuss the proposed changes in the solid waste program.

The Board of Trustee's will hold another meeting to further address sold waste issues on May 12, 1998.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEE'S MEETING WAS ADJOURNED BACK INTO THE REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING

ORDINANCE NO. 98-03: VACATING 6TH EAST SOUTH OF 3800 SOUTH ROAD

The Council reviewed the location of the road and placement of the proposed gate on the road on 6th East South of 3800 South. There is little opposition to closing the road and it will benefit the USU Research Center and there are other roads that can be used to access land near the Research Center.

A motion to adopt ordinance No. 98-03 was made by Councilman Anhder. It was seconded by Vice Chairman Yeates. The motion passed unanimously.

MAY TAX SALE: STONES, TAMRA

The County Auditor, Tamra Stones reported to the Council, that there are only three parcels (at the present time) that are going to be sold at the May tax sale on May 28, 1998. Stones said that every effort has been made to properly notify the three owners. The owners of a parcel of land located in Trenton, have determined that it is of no value to them.

RESTAURANT TAX-1998 ALLOCATION: LEMON, M. LYNN

Executive Lemon, presented his list of recommended Restaurant Tax allocations and the criteria that he used to determine his proposed allocations.

The list of allocations was reviewed by the Executive and Council. A Council workshop to further discuss the recommended allocations was suggested by Council member Skanchy.

A Restaurant Tax workshop was scheduled before the regular Council meeting on May 26 at 4:00 p.m..

ICE ARENA OWNERSHIP: DISCUSSION

Councilman Beck read aloud a proposed resolution and reviewed an entity flow chart concerning ownership of a proposed Bridgerland Ice Arena and new recreation site on county owned property between North Logan & Hyde Park. The proposal is to have the County own 1/3 of the ice arena with the Cities of North Logan & Hyde Park. Beck said that a survey of the students at the North Cache Freshman Center in Richmond showed that 65% of the youth and parents support the proposed ice arena and recreation area. Beck said that the equestrian site already at the location could be relocated with funds from lands sold for other development. Council member Skanchy asked how the county could benefit from one third ownership. Beck said that the whole county would be allowed to use the facility and we need a second recreation site in the county. Councilman Anhder said that we participate with Logan City and the Festival Opera. We also work together with them on the fairgrounds and have done so on a long term basis. This could be a similar program with North Logan & Hyde Park. Skanchy said that she still is troubled with ownership. We once had ownership in a park in Wellsville and at Newton Dam and we couldn't make them work. Our present debt is also a concern that the cities don't The assistant Cache County Schools Superintendent, John Hansen, said they want to participate in the proposed recreation area not as an owner, but to see how the schools could use the facilities for student activities. Councilman Beck was given permission to ask the North

Logan Mayor, Jack Draxler to comment. Mayor Draxler said that they would like the County's support because it would give their citizens more confidence knowing that the county is willing to help share in the facility. Revenue bonding through a building authority would be easier. Liability shouldn't be a problem because the revenue bonding company will assume the asset if we are unable to pay back the bond. Councilman Yeates said that the facility would benefit the whole county. Chairman Gibbons said that he struggles with the proposed ownership but favors using the county ground and helping with restaurant tax. Mayor Draxler stated that grant money is available and the applications for that money would be more favorable with County support.

The County Attorney and Executive were asked to draft a resolution concerning the issue for council review at the next council meeting.

PARADE: RICHMOND BLACK & WHITE DAYS

The Council has been invited to ride in the Richmond Black & White Days parade on May 16, 1998.

PARADE: SMITHFIELD HEALTH DAYS

The Council has been invited to ride in the Smithfield Health Days parade on May 9, 1998.

Councilman Beck will head a committee to get new signs for the parades.

COUNCIL MEMBER REPORTS

Councilman Beck: Beck reported that he has received a number of phone calls concerning the proposed road closure on 3700 North. Some have complained that they think the proposal has already been completed and what they say makes no difference. Chairman Gibbons said that he has told the city of Hyde Park if they want further comment to hold their own Public Hearing.

ADJOURNMENT:

Chairman Gibbons adjourned the meeting at 8:10 p.m..

CACHE COUNTY ORDINANCE NO. 98- 03

AN ORDINANCE VACATING A PORTION OF A COUNTY ROAD (600 EAST, SOUTH OF 3800 SOUTH, LYING SOUTH OF THE USU GATE).

The County Council of Cache County, Utah, in a regular meeting, lawful notice of which has been given, finds that there is good cause for vacating that portion of 600 East Street, South of 3800 South Street, which lies South of the gate at the USU APHIS predator research complex, which is a County road, and which is described on the attached diagram, Schedule "A"; and that the vacating of that portion of the County road will not be detrimental to the public interest.

Now, therefore, the Cache County Council ordains as follows:

1. Vacating County Road

That portion of 600 East Street, South of 3800 South Street, which lies South of the gate at the USU APHIS predator research complex, a County road, is hereby vacated, as shown on the attached diagram, Schedule "A".

2. Effective Date

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon adoption and publication, in the manner provided by law.
