## Cache County Council Meeting Minutes 7 December 1999

The Cache County Council met in a regular session on 7 December 1999 in the Cache County Council Chamber, 120 North 100 West, Logan, Utah 84321

### Attendance

### Call to Order

Chairman Gibbons called the meeting to order at 5:02 p.m.

### Invocation

The invocation was offered by Councilman Guy Ray Pulsipher.

### Agenda and Minutes

Mr. Lemon asked Chairman Gibbons to move the scheduled Executive Session to the 14 December 1999 agenda, and he recommended that the business concerning the Board of Equalization be dealt with after the other business.

Chairman Gibbons noted that the tape did not work at the last Council Meeting. Ms. Christensen from KVNU loaned her partial copy to Mr. Downs. The clerk has asked that the minutes be approved at the next Council meeting so that the Council members may adequately review them.

## Report of the Executive

### Recommended Appointment to Airport Authority Board

1. Sarah Ann Skanchy recommended for re-appointment. Term expires 12/31/2001.

**Mr. Anhder moved that Ms. Skanchy be re-appointed to the board. Mr. Petersen seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.**

### Other Business

#### Forest Revision Plan

Mr. Lemon mentioned that he had attended a meeting about the Forest Revision Plan on December 2. Mr. Lemon attended the session on the roadless areas because of the issues concerning RS2447 rights-of way. Mr. Lemon mentioned the letter sent from the Council on 29 October 1999, which was signed by Chairman Gibbons and Mr. Lemon. That letter stated that road rights-of-way that existed under RS2447 are valid, that they be maintained, and that the traditional doctrine of multiple use should remain the policy of the Forest Plan Revision. Mr. Lemon wanted it to be clear that the Council view was not in support of creating new roads, but rather, that those historical roads that are already in place should be maintained.

It is currently a challenge to maintain the Class D roads because there is no funding. Chairman Gibbons noted that many of those roads are impassible and this results in people bypassing the old road and creating new roads.

#### Ambulance Committee

The ambulance committee has now met five times. Initially the committee wanted to look at all of the options. Mr. Lemon sees three current options as available. First, the County can stay with the current system. Second, the County could hire a private provider, although Logan City has said it would not participate in such an option. Third, the County could let Logan City provide service, and the County or cities in the north and the south could provide additional service. Mr. Beck felt that the issue needed additional study. He feels that some of the ideas he has suggested have not been considered. For instance, he noted that Bountiful City, a city much larger than Logan City, employs only six full-time firemen. Mr. Beck thinks that it makes no sense to break up the ambulance

system. It should be one system. Mr. Lemon said that the EMS council and First Responders have said that the County could provide better service if it had ambulances outside of Logan City. Mr. Beck agreed with Dr. Jolley's suggestion that a private provider such as Gold Cross analyze the situation to determine the costs of running such a system. Mr. Petersen said that if Logan City is unwilling to participate in a private system, Logan City has already answered that question. Mr. Yeates said the County is subsidizing the Logan City Fire System with ambulance dollars.

Ms. Skanchy asked about the initial plan to hire someone to do a feasibility study. Mr. Petersen said the committee has moved somewhat away from having someone do a cost of service study. At least the committee would like to identify the viable options before expending money for a study.

Chairman Gibbons feels that the Council has a responsibility to consider all alternatives and to select the option that provides the best service for the best cost. He also noted that the Council is not in a position to dictate what Logan City's fire service will be. Mr. Beck disagreed. He noted that the issues are linked together. At the least, the County should negotiate the terms for the ambulance agreement, and it should be fair to the County. He thinks the County should be in the business county-wide if at all.

## Bear River Mental Health Audit Review

Dr. Mick Pattinson and Mr. Rob Johnson attended the review. Dr. Pattinson asked Mr. Johnson to explain the contents of the audit report to the Council. Peterson, Allred, Nelson audited the financial statements for the year ended 30 June 1999. The report consisted of three sections: Introductory, Financial, and Supplemental. Mr. Johnson proceeded page by page through the entire report, answering the Council members' questions as needed. The audit is an unqualified report (this is preferred to a qualified report) of the financial position of Bear River Mental Health Services, Inc.

Page 12 contained the Statements of Financial Position, or the Balance Sheet. Page 13 contained the Statement of Activities, or the Income Statement. Cache County gave \$242,811.00 during the year ending 30 June 1999. Mr. Johnson said that Bear River Mental Health uses the money provided by the County to get additional grant money from the State and from Medicaid. Page 14 and 15 provided the Functional Expenses for the year.

Mr. Johnson noted that 79% of the budget is expended for personnel cost because the organization is a service based agency.

Page 16 contained the Statement of Cash Flows. Pages 17-24 are the notes to the financial section. These notes may be used to clarify the numbers in the financial section.

Mr. Lemon asked if Bear River Mental Health uses the Utah Public Treasurer's Investment. Mr. Johnson replied that they have tried to keep much of their money in local banks in FDIC insured accounts. Money which exceeds the FDIC amounts is invested in the Utah Public Treasurer's Investment pool. In the case of payroll expenses, however, the Cache Valley Bank holds a balance that allows the Health Services to meet payroll on a monthly basis. Cache Valley Bank has pledged a bond that is kept with Zion's Bank against the overage. The FDIC insures the first \$100,000.00 and the bond protects additional funds up to \$500,000.00.

Note 7, page 22, explains the appropriation \$1,365,451.00, which is set aside as 120 days operating expenses. This fund assures the continued operation of the center during a short-term financial crises.

Note 15 assesses Y2K readiness.

The supplemental section begins on page 25 and continues through 29. This section provides a more detailed statement of activities by category.

Mr. Petersen asked Mr. Johnson how much net income is acceptable as a non-profit. Mr. Johnson said that Medicare had set guidelines that fall between 7-10% of Medicare funds. He isn't sure in the other areas. Dr. Pattinson said that Medicare requires the Mental Health Services to be financially solvent and to be able to provide services to all eligible parties during good years and bad years. The requirement is for 60 days, but the Health Services Board has used a more conservative amount and has set aside 120 days worth of operating reserve.

The Independent Auditor's Report on Compliance and on Internal Control are found on pages 30-31 for Federal dollars and on pages 32-33 for State dollars.

Page 34-35 is the Management Letter, which contains suggestions and recommendations for improving non-material items. These recommendations are for the use of the Board of Directors.

Dr. Pattinson has also asked the auditors to do a 100% review of the executive committees travel. The exit conference with the auditors and the funding sources will be held 9 December 1999.

Mr. Anhder asked if the County should have more of a voice regarding the expenditure of the County funds. Mr. Pattinson said that the Attorney General's opinion suggested that the oversight committee would be functioning in a dual role, which would create a conflict of interest. Mr. Lemon was confident that the Board would be willing to listen to any concerns, because they recognize the need for the funding the County provides. Ms. Skanchy suggested that Mr. Lemon represents the concerns of the Council from his position on the board.

Mr. Johnson emphasized that the County dollars are the building blocks that help Bear River Mental Health Services get the State and Federal money.

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Mr. Beck asked Dr. Pattinson about the liability issues for those who are required to sign the Certification of Audit Review. Dr. Pattinson said that signers would have to be aware of misuse of funds and then knowingly refuse to do anything to correct it for them to have any liability.

**Mr. Peterson moved that the Council accept the Certification of Audit Review. Mr. Yeates seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.**

### Intra-departmental Transfers

#### Clerk

The clerk asked for a transfer to purchase a new computer and printer at the front desk, to be used for issuing marriage licenses, and a laptop computer for use during council meetings and for additional tasks.

**Ms. Skanchy moved that the intra-departmental transfer be approved. Mr. Anhder seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.**

### Public Hearing Set

#### Open 1999 Budget

**Mr. Yeates moved that a public hearing be set for 14 December 1999 at 6:00 p.m. to open the 1999 Budget. Mr. Petersen seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.**

### Pending Action

#### Resolution 99-26

#### Century 21<sup>st</sup> Communities Program

After reviewing the document, Ms. Skanchy wanted to know what the County is committing to by becoming a part of this program. Mr. Teuscher said that the County has already done the majority of the work. He did say that BRAG requires CDBG applicants who are being sponsored to belong to the program. Mr. Teuscher spoke with Mr. Wes Curtis from the State, who said that there is a problem with the program as it relates to Counties. Apparently, the program was designed for municipalities. Mr. Teuscher in

association with BRAG plans to suggest that the state create a county option that mirrors the County's planning structure and work. Ms. Skanchy suggested that the counties that have applied are all rural counties. According to Mr. Teuscher, Mr. Curtis is very amenable to his suggestions for working with the County on the things that have already been done. Mr. Lemon said that the CDBG applicants would be penalized by BRAG if they did not participate in the program. Mr. Lemon said he thought that it was unfair for city and county applicants to be penalized for not belonging, while BRAG applicants would not be penalized. Mr. Teuscher said that the program is really designed to help entities become more progressive and to do more planning. Ms. Skanchy thinks that the county is more urban than rural, that this does program not reflect our County, and she doesn't think that we should need to report some rural partnership board.

**Mr. Yeates moved that the Council adopt the resolution. Mr. Petersen seconded the motion, and it passed 6-1. Ms. Skanchy voted against.**

### College-Young Incorporation Petition Update

Chairman Gibbons asked Mr. Lemon to update the Council on the current status of discussions held among the different entities interested in the College-Young Incorporation Petition. Mr. Lemon met with representatives from Logan City, Nibley, and College Young on December 2<sup>nd</sup>. A second meeting has been set for December 9<sup>th</sup>. During this meeting, the different entities could bring their proposed maps and overlay them over the College-Young Petition Map. Then, Mr. Lemon suggested, the groups might be able to come to some agreement that could be given to the attorneys. Some property owners have approached Mr. Lemon about doing the same. At this point, he has not met with any individual property owners.

The State has selected Jack DeMann as its committee representative. Craig Petersen will represent the Council, and George Whitney will represent the College-Young Petitioners. These three will select a suitable feasibility consultant.

### Initial Proposal for Consideration of Action

#### Resolution 99-27

#### Adoption of the 2000 Budget

Ms. Stones reported that approximate \$210,000.00 difference is reflected in the budget after making all of the adjustments. \$155,000.00 came from the budget opening that was completed for 1999. There is approximately \$55,000.00 in this proposal that will cover



the proposed 1% increase in salaries. The Senior Citizen budget was balanced within its own fund, the library was not affected. The only real cost occurred in the Cache Planning and Development study. Ms. Stones placed money in the sundry expense category, approximately \$31,000.00, to be used toward the feasibility study. Mr. Lemon had Ms. Stones use the estimate given from UAC for sales tax revenues. She also adjusted sales tax revenues in the municipal services fund to cover increases in salaries.

**Mr. Yeates moved for approval of Resolution 99-27. Mr. Petersen seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.**

Ms. Skanchy asked if money was included in a pool. Mr. Lemon said that they had not included money in a pool. The salary increases will be determined on merit. The Clerk read from the minutes of 23 November 1999 to clarify the discussion on this matter. It was determined that the salary would be based on merit, that the Department Head and the Personnel Manager would determine the increase, and that 5.25% would be the maximum available to an individual based on that employee's performance.

Holiday and Council Meeting Schedule

**Mr. Anhder moved that the Council approve the Holiday and Council Meeting Schedule. Mr. Yeates seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.**

After a brief discussion, the Council decided to move Ordinance 99-4 and Ordinance 99-5 to the next agenda.

Ms. Skanchy asked why the 1999 Budget needs to be opened again. Mr. Lemon said that some additional things have come to light that need to be dealt with, and Ms. Stones said that there are some small items that need to be dealt with, but nothing of major import.

## Board of Equalization

The council discussed whether they should reopen Board of Equalization hearings. The couple in question purchase property in 1998. The 1998 tax notice went out with the incorrect address on the real estate, and the taxes were paid in 1998. The 1999 truth in taxation notice went out and was not returned. In 1999 the home in question was valued at 80% of completion. The couple claims that the home was only 50-60% complete. The couple claims that they did receive the truth in taxation notice.

The second complaint is from the owners of the Travelodge Motel on 10<sup>th</sup> West. They claim that the city would not rezone two acres of their property as commercial, but the county reappraised the land as commercial and not agricultural. In this case the individual did receive the truth in taxation notice. The land should have been reappraised as agricultural.

**Ms. Skanchy moved that the Council not re-open the Board of Equalization. Mr. Pulsipher seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.**

## Council Member Reports

Mr. Anhder said that the Annual Council Party could not be arranged for the intended date. He did offer to schedule a date in January. The Council agreed and set a date for a party on 11 January 2000, following the first Council Meeting.

Ms. Skanchy asked if the Water Board had prioritized their projects yet. Mr. Anhder said the board had not wanted to meet until the Council indicated what they wanted the Water Board to do.

Marcie Cazier asked Mr. Pulsipher to sit in on a nominating committee to recognize volunteers for the aged. They picked a man and a lady to be recognized. Mr. Pulsipher noted that in a planning and zoning meeting, a bridge had been identified that may need to be replaced. The address is 6600 South over the Obay Canal.


Ms. Skanchy mentioned that a woman had called her about Cobblestone Road in Mendon and a narrow bridge in that area. Mr. Lemon and Joe Kirby met with the contractor to discuss how the development should be handled.

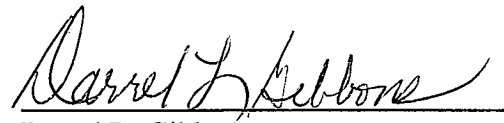

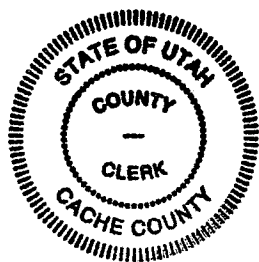

Whereas, the Cache County Council and Cache County Executive feels that having a community vision statement as a guide for progress in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century; and

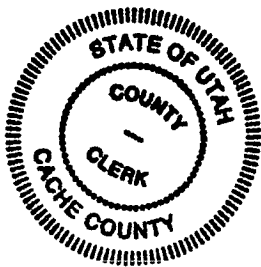
Whereas, the Cache County Council and Cache County Executive feels a need to protect its quality of life, diversify its economy, create new jobs; and

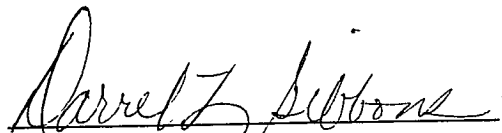
THEREFORE, the Cache County Council hereby adopts the following resolution:

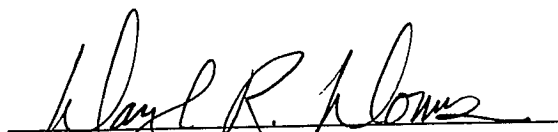

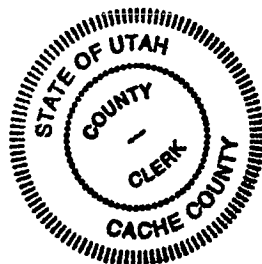

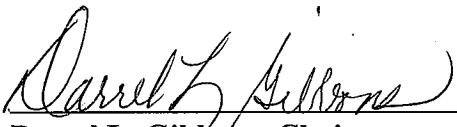
