CALL TO ORDER

Chairman Petersen called the meeting to order at 5:00 p.m.

OPENING REMARKS

The opening remarks were given by Brian Chambers.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Chairman Petersen lead those present in the Pledge of Allegiance.

REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF AGENDA

The agenda was approved with the addition of Item 10d - Set Public Hearings - Road Special District - December 7, 2004 - 8:00 p.m. & Mosquito Abatement District Tax - December 14, 2004 - 8:00 p.m.

REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The minutes of the November 23, 2004, Council meeting were approved as written.

REPORT OF THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE: M. LYNN LEMON

APPOINTMENTS: There were none.

WARRANTS: The warrants for the period 11-17-2004 were given to the Clerk for filing.

OTHER ITEMS

- Mosquito Abatement Lemon explained that the Mosquito Abatement District was approved county-wide as well as in all the municipalities that participated in the county and the vote was certified on November 16, 2004. By law within thirty days of the vote certification both the county and each of the municipalities need to appoint a board member to that district. Lemon said a recommendation for the Cache County appointee will be brought before the Council on December 7, 2004. The Abatement District must be organized by December 14, 2004, and a public hearing must be held by that date in order to have funding for the next year.
- <u>County Block Corner Lots Development</u> The county is advertising for interested parties to submit proposals for potential development on the two corner lots of the county block. Lemon said the county needs to know by mid-December of any proposals for these corner lots.
- National Children's Study Program is a twenty-one year program for which Cache County has been designated as one of ninety-six locations nationwide. There is a teleconference explaining the program on December 15, 2004, at noon.
- <u>Utah County Insurance Pool Annual Meeting</u> is December 2, 2004, at Thanksgiving Point beginning at 2:00 p.m. with a dinner that evening.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

★ Volunteer Center Report/2-1-1 - Andy Crosby explained that 2-1-1 is the national abbreviated dialing code for free access to health and human services information and referral. It is available seven days a week and 24 hours a day. Crosby invited Mike Weibel, Bear River Health Department, to give the Council additional information regarding 2-1-1. Weibel used the example of flu shots as a situation where the 2-1-1 service would be valuable. The information could be given to 2-1-1 and the Health Department would be relieved of responding to all those calls and would only administer the shots. Weibel said 2-1-1 would be wonderful with Emergency Services in the county in the event of a disaster. Weibel said he has received a reimbursement grant of \$5,000 for the 2-1-1 service.

ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

External Audit Report - Curtis Roberts of Jones Simkins P.C. reviewed the audit report and specific accounting recommendations with the Council.

Downtown Conference Center - Maridene Hancock/John Booth of the Travel Council and The Copper Mill Restaurant, respectively, informed the Council of plans for a possible addition to the restaurant that will function as a conference center meeting

and dining area. There is a pending agreement between Booth and Logan City of a land swap to facilitate the addition to the restaurant. Hancock said groups have chosen not to come to Cache Valley because of the lack of a sufficient sized conference center. Booth and Hancock asked that the restaurant tax request through the Tourist Council be a pass-through to The Copper Mill Restaurant in an amount equal to the tax generated by the restaurant - about \$20,000 to \$25,000 presently with an expected increase to \$50,000 after the conference center is completed. Hancock indicated this has been done in the past for the Utah Festival Opera and the Cache Valley Cruise-in.

<u>PUBLIC HEARING:</u> CREATION OF AGRICULTURAL PROTECTION AREA - ARDEN LARSEN AND SHIRLEY M. BODRERO TRUST - 42 ACRES WELLSVILLE, UTAH.

Chairman Petersen opened the Public Hearing and asked for public comment. There was none.

- Preliminary Plat Approval Foothill Subdivision
 Greenhalgh said the Planning Commission recommended denial, 4-1, for the following reasons:
 - 1. The density of the development is too extreme for the agricultural zone.
 - 2. The applicant has not provided a community water system as required by the Commission.
 - 3. Access is a third priority county road with a narrow driving gravel surface with inadequate services, maintenance and snow removal for a development of this size.

Petersen said this is not a public meeting, but invited some public comment.

Rob McFadden, owner of RAMAC - Foothills LLC which is proposing the subdivision, asked the Council to recommend approval saying he has done everything asked of him by the Commission or that is required by the State (in reference to the water system).

Tom Walbridge owns land on three sides of the subdivision and opposed it saying:

- 1. The water table will create problems for septic fields and water has flooded through this property in the past and will again.
- 2. Twenty wells on 35 acres is excessive and will affect existing wells in the area.
- 3. Urban developments of this size need to be tied to towns or cities.

Attorney Herm Olsen, representing McFadden, said Planning and Zoning created requirements outside of their discretion and the subdivision should be approved.

Lauren He witt, a resident living between Mendon and Wellsville, expressed concerns about the lack of infrastructure for a development of this size in the area.

Morley Cox sympathized with McFadden's plight and suggested the county have some method of informing people more completely prior to their investments of time and money.

Mike Morgan, a resident of Mendon, said this would be an island of development that will eventually be a part of Mendon. This may present problems because of the water system and possible flooding.

Lynn Lemon said that for fifteen years Cache County generally has wanted to encourage municipal development where municipal services are available. He also expressed concerns about the narrowness of the road, possible flooding and snow removal.

LaMar Clements, Planning Commission, said the Commission felt this was a request for an urban subdivision in the agricultural zone. Clements reiterated the county's view of development being encouraged in close proximity to municipalities and services.

Petersen thanked those who had commented and said this item was on for initial proposal and no action would be taken tonight.

Greenhalgh said the Planning Commission unanimously recommended approval for the following reasons:

- 1. There are existing year-round residential homes in the immediate vicinity.
- 2. Access to the proposed lots would be from a private road with no services or maintenance provided by the County.
- 3. The County school bus, garbage collection services and electrical power are available at the County road.
- 4. The property is currently in agricultural use and classified as greenbelt for tax purposes.
- 5. The Agricultural Zone boundary is contiguous to this property.

 <u>Discussion - Proposed 2005 Budget</u> - Lemon reviewed the portion of the budget concerning additional employees. The budget includes sixteen jail employees hired in early 2004 and the nine additional jail employees approved in October of 2004 and one

additional part-time attorney in the County Attorney's office hired in 2004. The budget also includes the additional employees who will be hired to operate the county ambulance system (CCEMS). Employees added were one full-time financial clerk in the Auditor's office, one financial manager in the Sheriff's office, a full-time EMS Coordinator, two other full-time EMT's and twenty part-time EMT's. Employees removed were the GIS technician, a part-time extension 4-H employee, the mental health officer in the senior citizens program, one secretary in the Sheriff's office, two patrol deputies in the Sheriff's office and three part-time secretaries in the Sheriff's office who were proposed to be moved to full-time, but who will remain part-time. The County web site will be moved from the County Council to the ITS budget with the addition of an intern. Cafeteria services for the charter school in North Logan is included in the budget. The capital improvements budget includes improvements to the county block in three phases – the east parking lot, the west parking lot and improvements around the Historic Courthouse. It also includes capital equipment and furnishings for the courthouse. There was much discussion on the additional financial manager for the Sheriff's office and the derk for the Auditor's office. Lemon will meet with Sheriff Nelson and Auditor Stones and come back with a final recommendation for these positions.
