OPENING REMARKS AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Vice Chairman Hansen gave the opening remarks and led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance.

REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF AGENDA

ACTION: Motion by Council member Yeates to approve the agenda as written. Robison seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Gibbons absent.

REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF MINUTES

ACTION: Motion by Council member Robison to approve the minutes of the September 25, 2007 Council meeting as written. Yeates seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Gibbons absent.

REPORT OF THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE: M. LYNN LEMON

APPOINTMENTS: There were no appointments.

WARRANTS: The warrants for the periods 08-10-2007 to 08-16-2007, 08-17-2007 to 08-30-2007, 09-07-2007 to 09-13-2007, 09-14-2007 to 09-20-2007 and 09-21-2007 to 09-27-2007 were given to the Clerk for filing.

OTHER ITEMS

☐ <u>Cloud Seeding</u> – Executive Lemon said the 2006/2007 cloud seeding report was available for the Council to review.

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<u>Final Budget</u> – Lemon indicated a tentative 2008 budget will be presented at the October 23, 2007 Council meeting and the 2008 final budget will be ready for the November 13, 2007 Council meeting.
<u>Water Manager/Water Department</u> – Lemon reported he will have a recommendation for the County Water Manager position at the October 23, 2007 Council meeting and asked the Council for input on the funding method for the County Water Department. Should it be through a dedicated tax in a separate fund or left in the General Fund and earmarked for the Water Department? The Council, Auditor Stones, Executive Lemon and Attorney Daines discussed the pros and cons of the two options. Lemon will present this issue to the Council at a later date and receive the Council's recommendation at that time.
<u>County Block/Willow Park Agreements</u> – Attorney Daines indicated the agreement with Logan City on the County Block will be executed in the next few days and noted the cost of the center sidewalk will be \$29,000.00 more than originally estimated. Logan City has recommended some language changes in the Willow Park agreement; specifically, that portion which deals with the possible ownership division of the property. Logan has asked that the clause that states different admission/use fees would not be

charged for non-Logan City residents than for Logan City residents would apply only to the existing facilities and would not apply to future facilities that may be built on the properties. The other change would be that the water clause includes the statement that Logan City has no water shares except water shares that are in the Southwest Logan Irrigation Company which does not pass through the property and Logan City will work with Cache County to develop an irrigation facility for the property. Daines said these were minor changes and he has no concerns with them. Vice Chairman Hansen told

nd there were concerns with noncompliance on the property. The property has been cleared of the vehicles, etc. and is now in compliance. Other parcels are being cleared. Attorney Daines said the rezone can be approved as soon as a written agreement is signed concerning the clean up timing on the property owner's other sites. Vice Chairman Hansen said the rezone will be on the October 23, 2007 Council meeting agenda.

Petersen suggested a Public Hearing might be an appropriate forum for this item. Daines asked that Cameron Jensen do a cost analysis at present value for the Council's information. Lemon will inform the mayors in the county of North Logan's request and invite them to the Public Hearing.

Yeates seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Gibbons absent.

• <u>Initial Approval of CDBG Projects for County Sponsorship</u> – Lemon said the first CDBG Public Hearing was held and left open for anyone else who wanted to apply. Three entities have applied for sponsorship:

ACTION: Motion by Council member Yeates to approve the three applicants for CDBG sponsorship by Cache County with the general understanding that this will be the only three that will be received by Cache County. Robison seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Gibbons absent.

• <u>Chief Gary Roberts</u> addressed the Council at the request of Council member Robison on the topic of residential fire sprinklers. Roberts said residential fire sprinklers are recommended for any property over 500 feet from a hydrant. In the county Tenders are used with 3,000 – 5,000 gallons of water. A typical house fire consumes 1,000 gallons

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per minute. Fire sprinklers control the fire at its start and save property and lives. Water damage is much less with residential fire sprinklers because only the sprinkler at the fire source is activated initially and controls the fire until the fire trucks arrive.

Side A of Tape 2

Executive Lemon suggested recommending, but not requiring, residential fire sprinklers on homes built in the county.

Petersen asked what the additional cost to the home builder is for fire sprinklers? Roberts said it is 2% to 7% of the cost of the home.

Daines noted that city residents have hydrants which are paid for through their building fees and taxes so they are paying for the hydrants. In the county that cost is saved; does the county want to create a situation where there is less safety in the county? Residential fire sprinklers cost the developer less than hydrants.

Chambers asked Chief Roberts to check with other counties to see how they deal with this issue.

Daines said the Council needs to give the Planning Commission direction on this topic so it can be included in the Subdivision Ordinance.

• Final Plat Approvals – High Creek Junction Subdivision, Rocky Mountain Estates "A" Subdivision and Rocky Mountain Estates "B" Subdivision – Josh Runhaar said none of these final plats has approved culinary water rights assigned to the lots. Runhaar said the county ordinance requires the Council to approve/disapprove plats without approved culinary water rights assigned. The Planning commission had a long discussion on this issue and felt that the time for requiring water should be at the time of the building permit. Runhaar said that presents problems because the state can assign water rights but does not guarantee water will be available where the property owner drills a well. He recommends that the water approval must be received prior to the recordation of the final plat.

Parker informed the Council that Chairman Gibbons has requested that this issue be placed on the October 23, 2007 Council meeting agenda.

Daines said the AG Subdivision ordinance could cover this issue with either a running covenant indicating the water stays with the lot and cannot be conveyed separately or the water information could be recorded on the plat itself the same way easements are done.

ACTION: Motion by Council member Yeates to hold all three Final Plat Approvals until the October 23, 2007 Council meeting. Robison seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Gibbons absent.

COUNCIL MEMBER REPORTS

<u>Gordon Zilles</u> indicated he is ready to begin the work on the Agricultural Subdivision Ordinance. Zilles asked Attorney Daines to update the Council on the status of the Powder Mountain project. Lemon noted that the Planning Commission had recommended granting the requested extension. Daines said differences exist on the interpretation of the conditional use permit requirements.

<u>Craig Petersen</u> introduced Dr. Robert Davies and asked the Council if Dr. Davies could be scheduled to give a global warming presentation to the Council at a workshop in November. Petersen noted that Davis County has raised \$150,000.00 to be used to support the road tax question on the November ballot and he is looking at ways to raise some money in Cache County for the same purpose. Salt Lake County passed a road tax last year with 64% of the vote.

ACTION: Motion by Council member Petersen to set a Workshop on November 13, 2007 at 4:00 p.m. for Dr. Robert Davies' presentation. Yeates seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Gibbons absent.

<u>Vice Chairman Hansen</u> said Chairman Gibbons had suggested October 23, 2007 for a Council Social after the Council meeting. Yeates and Petersen would not be able to attend. Hansen said another date will be scheduled.

<u>Cory Yeates</u> said Janet Valle, US Forest Service, has been replaced by Interim Director Rick Schuler. He will be introduced at the next Council meeting.

<u>Kathy Robison</u> indicated she and Vice Chairman Hansen had attended a meeting with some of the Powder Mountain representatives. Attorney Daines cautioned Council members that this is a quasi-judicial proceeding and the Council should not meet with the proponents outside of a public meeting or without legal representation. Runhaar said the type of action is noted on all of their staff reports; i.e. legislative, quasi-judicial. Hansen and Petersen asked Daines to prepare a one-page memorandum on the various types of actions with appropriate guidelines for the Council.

CACHE COUNTY, UTAH ORDINANCE NO. 2007-10

AN ORDINANCE IMPOSING A 1% TOURISM, RECREATION, CULTURAL, AND CONVENTION TAX AND PROVIDING FOR THE PERFORMANCE BY THE STATE TAX DIVISION OF ALL FUNCTIONS INCIDENT TO THE ADMINISTRATION, OPERATION, AND COLLECTION OF THE TAX AND FOR THE USE OF THE REVENUES FROM THIS TAX.

The County Council of Cache County, Utah, in a regular meeting, lawful notice of which has been given, finds that Section 59-12-603, <u>Utah Code Annotated</u>, 1953 as amended, enables the County Council, as the legislative body of Cache County, to impose a tourism, recreation, cultural, and convention tax not to exceed 1% of all sales of prepared foods and beverages that are sold by restaurants and to apply the revenue there from, in whole or in part, to tourism promotion and the development, operation, and maintenance of tourist, recreation, cultural, and convention facilities as defined in Section 59-12-602, <u>Utah Code Annotated</u>, 1953 as amended. The County Council finds that it is in the best interest of Cache County and its citizens that a tourism, recreation, cultural and convention tax be imposed.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL FOR CACHE COUNTY, UTAH, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: TITLE

This ordinance shall be known as the "Tourism, Recreation, Cultural, and Convention Tax Ordinance of Cache County."

SECTION 2: PURPOSE

It is the purpose of this ordinance to impose a tourism, recreation, cultural, and convention tax for the purposes of financing, in whole or in part, tourism promotion, and the development, operation, and maintenance of tourist, recreation, cultural, and convention facilities as defined in Section 59-12-602, <u>Utah Code Annotated</u>, 1953 as amended.

SECTION 3: DEFINITIONS

As used in this ordinance:

- (1) "CONVENTION FACILITY" means any publicly owned or operated Convention center, sports arena, or other facility at which conventions, Conferences, and other gatherings are held and whose primary business or function is to host such conventions, conferences, and other gatherings.
- (2) "CULTURAL FACILITY" means any publicly-owned or operated museum,

theater, art center, music hall, or other cultural or arts facility.

- (3) "RECREATION FACILITY" or "TOURIST FACILITY" means any publicly owned or operated park, campground, marina, dock, golf course, water park, historic park, monument, planetarium, zoo, bicycle trails, and other recreation or tourism-related facility.
- "RESTAURANT" includes any coffee shop, cafeteria, luncheonette, soda fountain, or fast-food service where food is prepared for immediate consumption. In accordance with the provisions of Tax Bulletin No. 8-91, effective July 1,1991, as promulgated by the Utah State Tax Commission, a "restaurant" is any retail establishment whose primary business is the sale of foods and beverages prepared for immediate consumption. Examples include full-service restaurants, fast-food restaurants, and their drive-in windows, concession stands at malls or fairs, and employee or school cafeterias.

SECTION 4: IMPOSITION OF TAX

There is hereby levied for collection a tourism, recreation, cultural, and convention tax on all restaurants, as defined herein, in Cache County, Utah, at the rate of 1% on all sales of prepared foods and beverages that are sold by restaurants for the period October 1, 2007 to September 30, 2008.

SECTION 5: USE OF REVENUES

The revenues received from the tourism, recreation, cultural, and convention tax shall be used solely for the purposes of financing, in whole or in part, tourism promotion, and the development, operation, and maintenance of tourist, recreation, cultural, and convention facilities as defined herein.

SECTION 6: COLLECTION

All taxes collected hereunder shall be collected by the Utah State Tax Commission pursuant to Chapter 12, Title 59, <u>Utah Code Annotated</u>, 1953 as amended, as and in the manner for other state and local sales and use taxes. The County Executive is authorized and directed to negotiate with the Utah State Tax Commission for and to execute the necessary contracts for the provision of such services by the Utah State Tax Commission. Taxes imposed under this ordinance shall be levied at the same time and collected in the same manner as provided for other state and local sales and use taxes in Chapter 12, Title 59, <u>Utah Code Annotated</u>, 1953 as amended.

SECTION 7: LICENSURE

All persons, companies, corporations or other similar persons, groups, or organizations engaged in or doing business as a restaurant or restaurants shall obtain from the Utah State Tax Commission a tourism, recreation, cultural or convention tax license; provided however, that no such additional license shall be required if the person, company, corporation, group, or organization has

already obtained and maintains a license pursuant to Section 59-12-106, <u>Utah Code Annotated</u>, 1953 as amended.

SECTION 8: ADVISORY BOARD

The Cache County Executive may establish an advisory board for the purposes of making recommendations for the allocation and application of revenues derived from the tourism, recreation, cultural, and convention tax. The board shall be advisory in nature only. The County Executive shall determine the composition of the advisory board; provided, however, that all appointments to that board shall be upon and with the advice and consent of the Cache County Council.

SECTION 9: ALLOCATION AND APPLICATION OF REVENUES

The Cache County Executive shall submit recommendations to the Cache County Council for the allocation and application of the revenues derived from the tourism, recreation, cultural, and convention tax. Acting upon such recommendations, the Cache County Council then, by resolution, shall approve the allocation and application of such revenues.

SECTION 10: EFFECTIVE DATE

This ordinance shall become effective upon approval and publication in the manner provided by law.

THEREFORE, the Cache County Council hereby adopts the following resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED that:

Section 1: Allocation of Tax to Logan City

The allocation of an amount equal to the principal and interest accruing on the P.C.I.B. loan as of July 2006, not to exceed \$77,165.00 from the 1% tourism, recreation, cultural and convention tax collected for the period October 1, 2007 to September 30, 2008, to Logan City for its exclusive application thereof to the Ellen Eccles Theater and Bullen Center which are under the management of the Capitol Arts Alliance (aka Cache Valley Center for the Arts) is hereby approved.

Section 2: Effective Date:

This resolution shall become effective immediately upon adoption.

Cache County Executive and Council Members:

Neighborhood Nonprofit Housing Corporation (NNHC) respectfully requests that Cache County sponsor our CDBG application for the construction of an office building. NNHC serves only very low- and low-income individuals, with an emphasis on first-time homebuyers, people with disabilities and seniors. Because our clients live on such limited incomes, we generally do not charge for our services. This means that we must obtain grant funding for our office lease and related overhead costs. Since the availability of grant funding changes from year to year, the NNHC Board and Executive Committee have determined it is in the best interest of the agency and the clients we serve that we acquire our own building. Initial design work has been completed; the building is expected to cost approximately \$482,680. NNHC has been awarded \$150,000 in RHED funding from HUD for the development of our office, and is requesting \$100,000 in CDBG funding for the same purpose. NNHC will provide an additional \$100,000 and obtain a mortgage from Wells Fargo for the remainder of the funding. The project is ready to proceed; NNHC owns land (and is not seeking reimbursement for this cost) that is zoned correctly; the building has been through design review and can now be issued a building permit.

NNHC will provide financial counseling to approximately 60 families working to become homeowners in the future, and create housing for approximately 93 families in 2008 through the following programs:

- 13 Self Help Homes in Nibley
- 12 Self Help Homes in Richmond
- 6 Self Help Homes in Corinne
- 10 homes in Logan
- 12 homeownership opportunities for people with disabilities throughout the state
- 12 units of rental housing for very low-income agricultural workers in Tremonton
- 22 Rental Housing units for very low-income developmentally disabled households in Brigham City

The State CDBG Office has determined that Cache County can sponsor this application, based on the people we serve and the portion of the building costs that are being requested. This request will provide NNHC the ability to continue to serve our clients should future grant funding opportunities be reduced.
