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**CACHE COUNTY COUNCIL MEETING**  
**April 13, 2010**

The Cache County Council convened in a regular session on April 13, 2010 at 5:00 p.m. in the Cache County Council Chamber at 199 North Main, Logan, Utah.

**OPENING REMARKS AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE**

County Executive M. Lynn Lemon gave the opening remarks and led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance.

**REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF AGENDA**

**ACTION:** Motion by Council member Yeates to approve the agenda as written. White seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Buttars absent.

**REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

**ACTION:** Motion by Council member Yeates to approve the minutes of the March 23, 2010 Council Meeting as corrected and the minutes of the March 30, 2010 Special Council Meeting as written. Robison seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Buttars absent.

**REPORT OF THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE: M. LYNN LEMON**

**APPOINTMENTS:** There were none.

**WARRANTS:** Warrants for the period 03-12-2010 to 03-18-2010 and 03-19-2010 to 03-25-2010 were given to the clerk for filing.

**OTHER ITEMS**

- **All-Mail Precincts** – Executive Lemon asked County Clerk Jill Zollinger to explain a proposal for All-Mail Precincts to the Council. Zollinger indicated that there are five voting precincts in Cache County that have under 500 registered voters and the Utah Election Code has a provision allowing those precincts to be all-mail precincts. Zollinger would like to use the 2010 Primary Election as a trial all-mail election for the following precincts: Amalga, Benson, Clarkston, Cornish and Trenton. Other counties report that voters like the all-mail option and Zollinger feels it may save the county some money. Voter turnout is better in all-mail precincts as well. Voters will be sent a letter explaining the process and a signature card to sign and return to the Clerk’s office.

**ACTION: Motion by Council member Petersen to approve the County Clerk’s proposal to use the 2010 Primary Election as a trial for the Amalga, Benson, Clarkston, Cornish and Trenton Precincts to be All-Mail precincts. White seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Buttars absent.**

**ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST**

- **Employee of the Month** award was presented to Randy Crowther of the IT Department by Nancy Lucas as Jim Smith was out of town.

**PUBLIC HEARINGS, APPEALS AND BOARD OF EQUALIZATION MATTERS**

**PUBLIC HEARING: APRIL 13, 2010 – 5:15 P.M. – SECOND CDBG PUBLIC HEARING**

**ACTION: Motion by Council member Robison to open the Public Hearing – Second CDBG Public Hearing. Yeates seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Buttars absent.**

Executive Lemon explained that the purpose of the hearing is to inform citizens or interested groups about the specifics of the CDBG projects and give interested parties another chance to raise issues or concerns. Lemon stated there are three CDBG projects approved for funding:

Executive Lemon invited public comment. There was none.

**ACTION: Motion by Council member Yeates to close the Public Hearing – Second CDBG Public Hearing. White seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Buttars absent.**

- **Chamber of Commerce Economic Development Report – Sandy Emile** informed the County that the Chamber had less money this past year yet increased its services. Other items reported were business workshops, upgraded website and newsletter, Huntsman Business School interns, the

April 17, 2010 Business Expo at the Cache Valley Mall, ACCRA reporting, new business awards, relocation packages and certificates of origin for local businesses. Emile will be working on the following three projects this year: a branding program for Cache County, additional new retail business marketing and attempting to curtail the number of technological based industries in Cache County that are being bought up by other countries.

- **Children's Victim Special Report – Terry Warner** reminded the Council that the Victim Services Program has several grants including VOCA (Victims of Crime Act), VAWA (Violence Against Women Act) and a stimulus grant for a special investigator, Robert Bolton, which goes until April 2011. Warner gave a quick overview of the types of cases dealt with – child abuse, financial crimes and texting while driving. The Child Abduction Response Team (CART) is actively training and working towards national certification. Warner noted that her office is developing classes such as parenting empowerment and woman's empowerment as options to jail time. Warner thanked the Council for its support.

### **PUBLIC HEARINGS, APPEALS AND BOARD OF EQUALIZATION MATTERS**

**ACTION: Motion by Council member Yeates to convene as a Board of Equalization. Robison seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Buttars absent.**

**THE COUNCIL CONVENED AS A BOARD OF EQUALIZATION.**

**ACTION: Motion by Council member Robison to approve the property tax exemption requests. Yeates seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Buttars absent.**

**ACTION: Motion by Council member Petersen to adjourn from the Board of Equalization. White seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Buttars absent.**

**THE COUNCIL ADJOURNED FROM THE BOARD OF EQUALIZATION.**

**PENDING ACTION**

- **Discussion – Proposed Amendments to the Cache County Road Standards**  
Chairman Zilles noted this item will be continued to the next Council meeting as Director Runhaar was not in attendance.
  
- **Motion – Approving/Disapproving a Reasonable Accommodations Request for a Residential Facility for Persons with Disabilities located at approximately 8135 S 3600 W, Mt. Sterling** – Chairman Zilles explained that a residential facility housing four clients is permitted under the Cache County Code; however, this request is for a conditional use permit for a reasonable accommodation for twelve clients to be housed in the residential facility (Uinta Academy). The Council received a letter with over two hundred signatures opposing the conditional use permit. The Council's focus should be what is best for the clients served by Uinta Academy. Chairman Zilles asked Attorney Swink to state his opinion as legal council.

Attorney Swink concurred that the residential facility with four clients is permitted and persons with disabilities are a protected class. The County Ordinance provides for reasonable accommodation requests and the Council must consider what accommodation is reasonable and necessary in this case and what is in the best interest of the Uinta Academy clients.

Chairman Zilles invited Council members to offer their views.

Council member Petersen and Executive Lemon said the financial viability information offered the county was not at the level of professionalism expected and the pro forma statements were not as precise as anticipated. The Attorneys representing Uinta did well with the information provided to them by Uinta, but Petersen and Lemon felt Uinta should have supplied better defined numbers.

Council members were perplexed as to the number of clients Uinta stated it needs for financial viability and felt different numbers had been offered them at various times. Executive Lemon read a portion of a letter to Director Josh Runhaar and Attorney James Swink from Attorney Todd Hallock stating, "My client has calculated in order to simply break even financially, exclusive of any salaries paid to the owners, at least eight residents are necessary." Attorney Swink said he had received information from Uinta Academy stating they would be profitable at ten clients. Executive Lemon agreed that different numbers have been given Cache County concerning the number of clients needed to be financially viable. Petersen said the break even point was probably influenced by the choice of a very expensive property for the proposed residential facility. Swink indicated that whether the property is purchased or leased will also make a difference in the numbers and that decision has not yet been made.

Chairman Zilles referred to a study by the Child Welfare League of America citing the optimum number of clients in a residential facility to be six to eight for the best treatment experience.

Council member Chambers asked for clarification on the terms "scholarship" and "default" referred to by Uinta Academy. Attorney Hallock responded there are

not actual scholarships awarded, but if clients are unable to pay full fees, accommodations are made through lower monthly fees, etc. and are referred to as scholarships. These are done on a case-by-case basis. Some clients are referred by school districts or are covered by insurance which will only pay a set amount. The unpaid portion is covered through "scholarships" or "default."

Council member Yeates noted the Council's concern is what will be best for the clients of Uinta Academy and asked how the client benefit would be different between ten residents versus eight. Attorney Hallock replied that the study referred to by Chairman Zilles didn't necessarily preclude numbers higher than eight, only no more than twelve residents for the best experience to the clients and twelve residents allows for a better set up for therapy groups or treatment model.

Council member Robison stated she would be in favor of allowing eight residents.

Council member Chambers asked what monitoring is in place to insure that a residential facility operates with the approved number of clients? Attorney Swink said the state monitors the facilities.

Vice Chairman White stated he thought six was a reasonable accommodation.

Council member Petersen observed that the number of clients considered a reasonable accommodation should be based on what is best for the clients not for Uinta Academy's particular business model. Petersen felt eight was an appropriate number of residents. Petersen also stated concerns regarding the number of vehicles that are routinely seen at other Uinta Academy facilities in Cache County. Vice Chairman White agreed; he has seen sixteen or more vehicles at the Mendon Uinta residential facility.

**ACTION: Motion by Council member Yeates to approve a conditional use permit for reasonable accommodation for not to exceed eight (8) residents for a residential facility for persons with disabilities located at approximately 8135 South 3600 West, Mt. Sterling, Utah; with the stipulation that the Cache County Council reserves the right to restrict the number of parking vehicles and the Council will review and evaluate the parking issue in six months. Petersen seconded the motion. The motion passed, 5 aye – Chambers, Petersen, Robison, Yeates & Zilles and 1 nay – White. Buttars absent.**

- Ordinance No. 2010-03 – Adopting Procedures for the Application, Approval, and Issuing of Permits for Special Events** – Chairman Zilles asked Attorney Swink for an update on the committee's changes to the proposed ordinance. Attorney Swink reviewed the changes including changing the submission of an application from 90 to 45 days prior to an event; 200 being the number of participants triggering the need for a permit; definitions to help interpret athletic, political or special events; a seven-day time limit for review of applications to see if they need to be returned for additional information; have the application be accompanied by a nonrefundable fee established by the County Council instead of charging \$1.00 /person; clean-up fee determined by Council and the fee would be indicated on the application; the inclusion of a Class B

misdemeanor for violation of the application requirements; the Sheriff's office will be able to stop an event that does not have a permit or violates statutes or laws.

Attorney Swink said cities are supportive of the permitting process for events and it will be easier for event sponsors if the county requires the permit and event sponsors do not have to obtain permits from every city an event passes through.

Vice Chairman White questioned why some events are exempt when they have the same numbers attending? Shouldn't it be the same for all? Executive Lemon indicated that not all events create the problems. Swink said it is the use of public roads for large events that is the problem, not just the number of participants.

Other questions concerned some organizations being exempt from clean-up and the situation where an event crosses onto forest service land.

Council member Petersen suggested that if there are specific events that have had a history of problems, perhaps it would be wiser to review those yearly events and their accompanying problems and create an ordinance to address those particular problems rather than impose undue burdens on all events. Executive Lemon agreed that perhaps the county needs to rethink the permit process and not get into micromanaging every event.

Attorney Swink pointed out insurance is an issue not provided for currently as well as the cost of services being provided by the county. Whether the county should pay for those costs or pass the costs on to the event needs to be addressed in the ordinance.

**Vice Chairman White left the meeting.**

#### **INITIAL PROPOSAL FOR CONSIDERATION**

- **Motion – Approval/Disapproval of Tax Hardship Request** - Executive Lemon noted that this property was up for tax sale last year and the owners were given one year to resolve the issue. They have not been able to make any payments as they are in extreme financial conditions, have two children and are caring for a paralyzed mother. If they had submitted a property tax hardship request, it would have been approved. Lemon recommended approval of this request and indicated that, if there is money in the poor and indigent fund at the end of the year, he would probably use it to pay some of the taxes. *(Details are on file in the office of the Cache County Auditor.)*

**ACTION: Motion by Council member Yeates to accept the recommendation of Executive Lemon and grant the property tax hardship request. Petersen seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 5-0. Buttars & White absent.**

**Vice Chairman White returned to the meeting.**

- **Motion – Approval/Disapproval-Rollback Tax Request** – Executive Lemon stated that the property was transferred to the current property owner's name due to the death of his father and he did not understand he needed to re-apply



for greenbelt status. Lemon recommended allowing the property owner to pay \$300.00 a month over a two-year period until the rollback tax is paid.

**ACTION: Motion by Council member Chambers to approve the recommendation of Executive Lemon to allow the property owner to pay \$300.00 a month over a two-year period until the rollback tax is paid. Yeates seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Buttars absent.**

- **Discussion – RAPZ/Restaurant Tax Applications** – Chairman Zilles reminded the Council that the RAPZ/Restaurant recommended allocations were in their packets Council member Petersen observed that this meeting is to review the recommendations and approval will be at the next Council meeting.

Council member Robison asked why some applicants had not received anything? Petersen said it was because Cameron Jensen determined they were not really qualified. Executive Lemon said that is the case on cultural and tourism applications; however, the large number of requests for recreation projects meant that some were simply not funded. Council member Petersen noted that some cities had multiple requests and the committee tried to find out the priority for the city and fund that one(s).

Chairman Zilles said Evan Olsen has lamented that unincorporated areas of the county have no way to apply for RAPZ/Restaurant Tax funding. The Council and executive Lemon assured Zilles that Olsen could apply, but the project must be either publicly owned or publicly operated.

The Council will review the recommendations and make a decision on the allocations at the April 27, 2010 Council meeting.

Executive Lemon said the recommended allocations are public information and anyone can view them.

- **Discussion – Road Tax** – Council member Petersen asked Executive Lemon the status of the road tax fund. Executive Lemon replied that the road projects approved last year are almost paid for which means that the current tax can build up for the rest of the year. Lemon is leery of bonding because it creates a large fund of money and everyone wants some of it and then the money does not accomplish what the Council and citizens intended when the tax was created. The intent was to fund projects that would reduce congestion on Main Street in Logan and to purchase right-of-ways for roads.

Petersen asked if the county will again solicit proposals to submit to the Council of Governments (COG) for review and recommendation this year? Lemon said that Jeff Gilbert and Mayor Hall (Chairman of the COG) are waiting until after the bid opening on the 100 East road project because then they will know what money is currently available. There will probably be about \$2.4 million available over the course of the year to be used on a project(s). Lemon would like to come back to the Council with those figures to determine if proposals will be solicited again.

Petersen observed that when the public voted for the road tax, it was stated it would be used to reduce congestion on Main Street and to purchase road right-of-ways at a cheaper rate now rather than in the future when they would become more costly. Petersen recommended the implementation of some tool that will make the purchase of road right-of-ways an active consideration. Perhaps ask Jeff Gilbert to look at what right-of-ways would be the most likely right-of-ways to purchase. Last year, none of the approved projects concerned right-of-way purchases.

Council member Chambers asked if the county is sure it wants to avoid bonding because road projects are all coming in under bid. Some building could be done cheaper presently than in the future. Lemon said the county needs to look at bonding seriously and be specific as to the purpose of bonding – to relieve congestion and to purchase right-of-ways. Lemon still worries about the money not being used for the intended purposes. If the county bonds for fifteen years, it basically does away with its revenue stream for projects for fifteen years.

### **COUNCIL MEMBER REPORTS**

**Brian Chambers** asked what mechanism or failsafe will be used to be sure Unita Academy's residential facility is reviewed in six months for parking compliance. Executive Lemon said he and Pat Parker will be sure to place that item on a Council agenda in six months.

**Jon White** praised the RAPZ/Restaurant Tax program saying it accomplishes a great service for small communities.

**Kathy Robison** reminded the Council of the Gallery Walk this Friday, April 16, 2010. The Historic Courthouse will be open and part of the Walk and the Safety Fair will be held on the county property on April 23, 2010.

**Executive Lemon** noted he will attend the UAC Management Conference this week.

**Attorney Swink** said the Petersen property annexation was approved and will be reviewed at the next Council meeting as it concerns the Schiess Ag Protection Area.

### **ADJOURNMENT**
