#### OPENING REMARKS AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Council member Chambers gave the opening remarks and led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance.

#### REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF AGENDA

ACTION: Motion by Council member Buttars to approve the agenda with two additional Property Tax Hardship applications under Item 12a, one additional intra-departmental budget transfer under Item 9a, and one additional interdepartmental budget transfer under Item 9b. White seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Yeates absent.

#### REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF MINUTES

ACTION: Motion by Council member Robison to approve the minutes of the October 12, 2010 Council Meeting as written. White seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Yeates absent.

#### REPORT OF THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE: M. LYNN LEMON

**APPOINTMENTS:** Denise Ciebien Strong

Deputy Cache County Attorney

ACTION: Motion by Council member Petersen to approve the recommended appointment. Buttars seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Yeates absent.

<u>WARRANTS:</u> Warrants for the periods 10-01-2010 to 10-07-2010 and 10-08-2010 to 10-14-2010 were given to the Clerk for filing.

#### OTHER ITEMS

☐ HDR Engineering will be at the break site in the Logan Northern Canal on Canyon Road at noon on Wednesday, October 27, 2010 to review the feasibility of reconstruction at the site as a possible option for the NCRS canal project. The Council is invited to attend.

#### ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Western Counties Alliance Public Land Issue Update – Ken Brown shared charts for PILT (Payment in Lieu of Taxes) and Secure Rural Schools funding with the Council. PILT expires at the end of 2012 and Secure Rural Schools expires at the end of 2011 and WCA is working for reauthorization of the programs.

Brown also mentioned geothermal revenues for Iron, Beaver and Millard counties. Director Runhaar commented that he believes some Cache schools have put in geothermal pumps.

Brown also reviewed three wilderness bills: Red Rock Wilderness Bill (HR1925 & S799), Northern Rocky Ecosystem Protection Act (HR980) and the Wild Horse/Burro Program. Brown noted that the Wild Horse/Burro Program is a threat to livestock grazing. Brown attended a workshop sponsored by the BLM relative to this program where he discovered that the nine-member board for the program does not have any local government representation. Brown is pushing for a charter change that will place county elected officials on the board.

Executive Lemon's asked what revenue Cache County can expect to receive from the PILT and Secure Rural Schools funds up to the expiration times if it is not re-authorized? Brown said Cache County should receive about the same as in the past.

#### **UNIT OR COMMITTEE REPORTS**

★ Victim Services Report – Terryl Warner updated the Council on the Victim Services office. From July 1, 2009 to June 30, 2010 the office worked with 2,802 victims under the VOCS grant and 302 victims under the VAWA grant from January 1, 2010 to October 15, 2010. There is a yearly ten percent increase in the office's caseload.

Victim Services is working with Logan City on the "Stop the Main Distraction" program with Logan City. This program hopes to reduce the number of accidents on Main Street in Logan.

Warner was one of thirteen individuals from various agencies in Cache County who attended CART training in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Cache County will be applying for certification under the CART program.

This year's Family Summit targeted using community service programs instead of prison for some crimes.

Warner thanked the Council for the county's support.

★ VAWA Grant Report – Jared Keller gave an update on his work as the detective assigned to work with women who are victims of crime. The VAWA grant pays 40% of his salary and the county pays 25%. The grant was first received in 2003 to create a new investigative position with the Sheriff's office and the funds decrease annually. Keller is a member of several review boards, including the Coalition Against Domestic Violence and works closely with the Division of Health and Human Services. The application for the 2011 VAWA Grant has been submitted. Another reduction in funds is expected to bring the amount received down to about \$22,000.00.

Council member Chambers asked if there are domestic violence cases where the female is the perpetrator. Keller said yes, but they are under reported.

#### Council member Buttars left the meeting.

  The Cache County Planning and Zoning Commission will meet next week and this item was postponed until after that meeting
- ☐ Motion to approve removal of racetrack at Fairgrounds Council member Buttars asked if any new information has come forward since the Public Hearing on this issue at the October 12, 2010 Council meeting? Chairman Zilles said there was not.

ACTION: Motion by Council member Buttars to approve the removal of the racetrack at the Cache County Fairgrounds. White seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Yeates absent.

#### INITIAL PROPOSAL FOR CONSIDERATION

• <u>Hardship Applications</u> – Executive Lemon shared the additional information requested at the October 12, 2010 Council meeting. (Details are on file in the office of the Cache County Auditor.)

ACTION: Motion by Council member Buttars to approve the hardship application for No. 1423-0031. Robison seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Yeates absent.

• <u>Hardship Applications</u> – Executive Lemon indicated these two parties have had previous property tax hardship applications approved. (Details are on file in the office of the Cache County Auditor.)

ACTION: Motion by Council member Petersen to approve the two property tax hardship applications. Buttars seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Yeates absent.

• Hyde Park to North Logan Transportation Corridor Traffic Summary – Jeff Gilbert observed that he thought the report on the EIS by Loretta Markham of UDOT at a previous Council meeting had left questions in the Council members' minds as far as project worthiness was concerned and he wants to broaden the Council's view with other data and information on the project and reinforce the idea that it is a worthy project. Gilbert said the information Markham gave the Council didn't take into account the increased mobility the project would produce via roadway impacts other than Highway 91, i.e. 400 East and 800 East streets. Gilbert considers this a proactive project where property can be acquired before development and a roadway can be in place before the traffic situation is critical.

Council member Chambers asked what the long-term plans are for 200 East street to the south? Gilbert responded that eventually the old scout office building will be removed and 200 East will be put through that area and extend to Millville.

Gilbert said that a record of decision on the five option choices for 200 East in North Logan is expected in February or March 2011 and the CMPO has \$2.3 million to be used on right-of-way or design work in 2011 and 2012. In 2014 through 2016 there is an additional \$5.9 million. This will be a long-term project done in phases.

Gilbert gave the opinion that the segment between 2200 to 2500 North is the immediate critical concern. Gilbert said the good news is that UDOT and the Transportation Commission have allocated an additional \$14 million of federal funds to put on 1000 West which will build out the whole section to Airport Road with five lanes. The project extending 200 East street to 2500 North becomes critical in conjunction with the 1000 West project because the two work together.

Executive Lemon stated that he reads Table 4 and Table 3 as indicating that Alternative #5 will have a better effect on Highway 91 traffic and asked Gilbert if that is correct? Gilbert said that is correct.

• <u>2010 Tentative Budget – M. Lynn Lemon</u> reported that the only fund not presently in balance is the General Fund. This tentative budget includes the additional cost for medical insurance and retirement, but does not include any salary increases for employees. Executive Lemon said he hopes to have a balanced budget to present at the November 9, 2010 Council meeting.

Council member Petersen asked what a 1% increase in employee salaries would cost? Lemon replied it would cost about \$250,000.00 so a 2% increase would be about \$500,000.00.

Approval of 2010-2011 County Council Meeting Schedule and County
 Offices Holiday Schedule – Executive Lemon explained that the schedule
 includes a day in 2010 because New Years Day 2011 is on a Saturday, it is
 observed on Friday, December 31, 2010.

ACTION: Motion by Council member Petersen to approve the 2010-2011 County Council Meeting Schedule and County Offices Holiday Schedule. White seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous, 6-0. Yeates absent.

#### **COUNCIL MEMBER REPORTS**

<u>Craig "W" Buttars</u> reported that RAC (Secure Rural Schools Resource Advisory Committee) has received several proposals from other counties and Glen Thornley is working on a proposal for roadway improvements to the Smithfield Canyon and to create some walk-in camping areas. The funding will be from RAC with a match required from Class B Road funds from Cache County. Thornley is requesting a letter from the Council or a Council member supporting the project.

Executive Lemon thought the Forest Service was going to submit a proposal for a parking lot at the Birch Creek trailhead. Buttars indicated it is not on the list of RAC projects from the Forest Service. Buttars said the proposals need to be received by the end of September 2011, but an earlier priority submission date will probably be in April. This will give RAC the opportunity to determine which projects will be the most beneficial.

Chairman Zilles said the Council is amenable to providing a letter of endorsement for the proposed Smithfield Canyon project.

<u>Vice Chairman Jon White</u> asked for a report to the Council on the status of roads including Flint Grove Road, Coldwater Road, Davenport Road and Three-Mile Road. Attorney Swink said litigation is pending on the Davenport Road and it would be good to give the Council an update on that issue.

Executive Lemon agreed and will schedule a road report for the November 9, 2010 Council meeting.

Swink said the Mountain Roads Committee has pictures of improvements on several roads and could share those pictures with the Council as well.

<u>Brian Chambers</u> asked about the status of the Ruby Pipeline. Executive Lemon said people are concerned about the agreement Ruby signed with Western Watershed. The actual work on the pipeline is progressing rapidly.

Chambers feels the state legislature will take action on the Spice issue this session because of the actions Cache County and other cities and counties have taken.

- Traffic reduction on US-91 generally grows from just over 5% in 2025 (on average) to just under 10% in the year 2040 (on average).

- A parallel corridor east of US-91 provides the added capacity benefit of serving land uses while reducing driveways on US-91.
